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Hili. Pakistan army compelled to retreat.

By the evening, Akhaura and Shamsenagar in Sylhet officially came under the allied force's control.

## Red carpet but no cinema as Gaza film festival forced outdoors

In the Palestinian enclave of Gaza, without a cinema for 30 years, a few hundred people walk the red carpet to a rare film screening -- held on the street.

The opening of the Red Carpet Human Rights Film Festival on Wednesday evening had been expected to take place inside the Amer Cinema, which has been abandoned for three decades.

But it was moved at the last minute in unclear circumstances, with a screen erected in the street outside the cinema, a grey building with the letters peeling off.

The festival's executive director, Muntaser al-Sabaa, said organisers had been told by the cinema's owners that they could no longer use it as a venue.

"Suddenly they told us: 'We are sorry but the situation is dangerous'. They said: 'We are afraid'."

"What happened is incomprehensible. We don't know who told this partner to block the permit to open the cinema."

The organisers said that they had obtained the necessary permits to host the festival in the cinema.

The Gaza Strip is run by Islamist movement Hamas, which enforces rules based on a strict conservative interpretation of Islam.

Since seizing control in 2007 they have prevented events they consider immoral. The interior ministry in Gaza did not respond to a request for comment.

The week-long festival was scheduled to show 45 documentaries and is part-funded by the Palestinian Authority, based in the West Bank and dominated by the rival Fatah movement of president Mahmud Abbas.

"We chose Amer cinema for its strong symbolism and to send a message that cinema buildings still exist in Gaza and people have the right to enjoy shows," Sabaa said.

## Draft articles of impeachment against Trump

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by Republican lawmakers called the Democratic-led impeachment inquiry rushed and flawed.

Articles of impeachment represent formal charges against Trump and would originate in the Judiciary Committee before going to the full House. If the Democratic-led House passes articles of impeachment as expected, that would lead to a trial in the Senate on whether to convict Trump of those charges and remove him from office. Republicans control the Senate and have shown little support for Trump's removal.

White House spokeswoman Stephanie Grisham said on Twitter that Pelosi and other Democrats "should be ashamed," adding that Trump "has done nothing but lead our country - resulting in a booming economy, more jobs & a stronger military, to name just a few of his major accomplishments. We look forward to a fair trial in the Senate."

The three law professors chosen by the Democrats made clear during Wednesday's hearing that they believed Trump's actions constituted

impeachable offenses including abuse of power, bribery, obstruction of Congress and obstruction of justice.

The House Intelligence Committee this week submitted findings from its inquiry into Trump's push for Kiev to launch an investigation related to former US Vice President Joe Biden, a top contender for the 2020 Democratic presidential nomination. Trump also asked Ukraine to look into the discredited theory promoted by the president and his allies that Ukraine, not Russia, meddled in the 2016 US election.

Democrats have accused Trump of abusing his power by withholding \$391 million in security aid to Ukraine - a US ally facing Russian aggression - to pressure Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy to uncover the investigations.

"Our democracy is what is at stake. The president leaves us no choice but to act because he is trying to corrupt, once again, the election for his own benefit. The president has engaged in abuse of power, undermining our national security and jeopardizing the integrity of our elections," Pelosi said.

Trump has denied any wrongdoing and called the impeachment investigation a hoax.

The House may vote by year's end on the formal impeachment charges, but Democrats, who control the chamber, say no decision has been made at this point on the specific charges. Those could include abuse of power, bribery, obstruction of Congress and obstruction of justice.

Judiciary panel Democrats on Wednesday said they may look beyond Trump's relations with Ukraine to include Trump's earlier alleged efforts to impede former US Special Counsel Robert Mueller's investigation into his 2016 campaign's relations with Russia, but they stopped short of saying that could trigger a separate charge.

**IMPEACHMENT HISTORY**  
No president has ever been removed from office through impeachment, though Republican Richard Nixon resigned in 1974 after the House began the impeachment process in the Watergate corruption scandal. Two other presidents were impeached by the House but acquitted by the Senate.

The last impeachment effort in the

United States came in 1998 when a Republican-led House passed articles of impeachment against Democratic President Bill Clinton - charges arising from a sexual relationship he had with a White House intern. The Senate then acquitted Clinton in 1999, leaving him in office.

The other president who was impeached was Andrew Johnson, impeached by the House in 1868 - three years after the end of the US Civil War - but left in office by the Senate.

Trump's fellow Republicans in both chambers have stood by him, and have accused Democrats of seeking to overturn the 2016 election.

Republican Representative Andy Biggs, who sits on the House Judiciary panel, told Fox News earlier yesterday: "What we are seeing is a rush - rush - to impeachment."

Republicans in the Senate have given no signs they would break with the president now.

Ahead of Pelosi's statement, Trump urged House Democrats to move quickly if they were going to impeach him so that the Senate could take up the issue.

## Metro line-6 to link Kamalapur

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with 17 stations.

MAN Siddique, also a former secretary of Road Transport and Highways Division, said people coming from outside Dhaka were facing problems to get vehicles at Kamalapur Railway Station now.

"Considering this, the prime minister instructed us to extend the route up to Kamalapur, and we have already completed our topography survey," he said.

He said the existing street from Motijheel to Kamalapur was not viable for rail lines. So, they selected an alignment where most of the land is owned by Bangladesh Railway and Bangladesh Road Transport Corporation.

He added that they would have to acquire land of 31 buildings on the

alignment and as per the new acquire policy, owners of the land would be given three-time higher price than the existing price of land and they would get prices of their buildings. Besides, they would get some other benefits, he added.

Replying to a query, the DMTC MD said as per the plan, the work of MRT-6 would be completed by December 2021, around three years before the stipulated time, resulting to reduction of construction cost.

"We are hopeful that we will be able to complete the extension work with the money we can save by implementing the project before the stipulated time."

He, however, could not say when the construction of the extension work would start.

Asked whether Bangladesh Railway

has any reservation over the use of its land,

MAN Siddique said Kamalapur Station is an "iconic structure", and the BR wanted that the station of metro rail had to be built at a place so that it could not obstruct the structure view.

"We want to see this issue from a holistic approach, not from a single MRT-6 perspective," he said, adding that apart from the MRT-6 station, underground stations of MRT-1, MRT-2 and MRT-4 would also be built linking with the Kamalapur Railway Station.

Transport expert Prof Mizanur Rahman also welcomed the initiative, saying that more people would be benefited by the step.

He said all major inter-district bus terminals and Hazrat Shahjalal

International Airport have to be connected to other metro rail lines so that people coming from outside Dhaka could avail the rail service.

Prof Mizanur, also the director of Accident Research Institute (ARI) at Buet, however, said the government should not wait for completing the extension work; it should rather open MRT-1 with the deadline for reducing people's suffering.

He added that the extension would not hamper the plan already been taken regarding the country's largest railway station -- Kamalapur.

The government aims to build five metro lines -- an elevated, an underground, and three elevated and underground -- in the capital and its adjacent areas by 2030 mainly to reduce traffic congestion and air pollution.

## India set to start trial run next month

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for carrying Indian goods.

On the use of the roads, he said charges would be fixed by the Road Transport and Bridges Ministry.

Sources at the meeting said there were at least 50 types of charges and fees at the tariff schedule of the Chattogram and Mongla ports.

Shipping ministry insiders said they were considering charging Tk 1.97 to Tk 2.10 per tonne in line with a proposal of The Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Nepal (BBIN) Initiatives.

Abdus Samad said the Bangladeshi customs authorities at the ports would electronically lock Indian goods and the locks would be opened only at the

Indian destinations.

The two countries had signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) on the use of the Chattogram and Mongla ports in 2015, following years of persuasion from India. Subsequently, the countries signed an agreement last year and a standard operating procedure (SoP) during Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's visit to India in October.

According to the SoP, goods that reach Chattogram and Mongla sea ports would be carried by four road, rail, and water routes to Agartala (Tripura) via Akhaura; Dawki (Meghalaya) via Tamabil; Sutarkandi (Assam) via Sheola, and Srimantpur

(Tripura) via Bibirbazar.

The SoP covers waterways, roads and railways. It will allow the landlocked Assam, Meghalaya and Tripura states to access open sea trade routes through the Chattogram and Mongla ports.

India will also be allowed the use of Nakugaon Land Port in Sherpur to transit goods as the fifth route in line with agreement, according to Abdus Samad.

The decision was taken following a proposal from Bangladesh which was placed at the meeting.

As a result of this decision, Bhutan will also be able to use transit facilities using Chattogram and Mongla port

alongside India, added Abdus Samad.

At yesterday's meeting, the Indian side said that fees applicable on Indian goods moving under the agreement need to be specified in a transparent manner, so as to allow the trade to work out the costs involved in the movement and also to make necessary financial arrangements.

They said that fees and charges levied on transit movements are subject to GATT and WTO provisions.

Any charges levied on such cargo should be reasonable and meant to cover charges of transportation or administrative expenses, or to cost of services rendered.

## Austerity -- the backdrop to Britain's 'Brexit election'

As record numbers of Britons are forced to use food banks and homelessness soars, for many people rampant poverty, not Brexit, is the main issue in next week's general election.

In Slough, west of London and just four miles (6.4 kilometres) from Queen Elizabeth II's opulent Windsor Castle residence, ex-drug addict John unwraps Christmas chocolates.

"Without these people, we wouldn't be able to eat so... people like us couldn't really exist," he told

AFP at a food bank operating out of a Baptist church near a sex shop.

Anti-hunger campaigners the Trussell Trust, which runs the facility and more than 1,200 food banks like it, handed out a record 823,145 emergency parcels -- which each comprise food for three days -- in the six months to September.

That was the busiest half-year since the organisation was created in 1997 and marked a 23-percent surge from the same period of 2018.

In Slough, a large industrial town of 162,000 people best known in recent

years as the drab setting for comedian Ricky Gervais' cult comedy "The Office", the increase was 29 percent.

The jump in demand was partly from the working poor struggling to make ends meet.

As polls approach next Thursday, Conservative Prime Minister Boris Johnson and the main opposition Labour leader Jeremy Corbyn have both vowed to address glaring inequality.

But more than a decade after the global financial crisis that sparked a vicious worldwide recession, many cities, towns and villages across Britain

have yet to recover from harsh austerity. "Slough is in such a bad state," said John, who declined to give his real name.

"This place is full of poverty and where there's poverty there's drugs, and where there's drugs there's going to be addicts, and where there's addicts there's going to be burglaries..."

"What I find ridiculous is no (politician) is speaking about the main issues which (are) mental health and poverty and drugs addiction ... within communities that are receiving less money."

## Sun yields

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One puzzle concerns the corona itself which at one million degrees is many times hotter than the sun's surface at 6,000C, when it would normally be expected to cool the further from the heat source.

"So the corona finds a way to heat up. We are looking at the physical processes which allow that to happen," said Alexis Rouillard at France's National Centre for Scientific Research (CNRS) and co-author of one of four reports on the probe's initial findings published in the journal Nature.

"Even with just these first orbits, we've been shocked by how different the corona is when observed up close," said Justin Kasper, a professor of climate and space sciences and engineering at the University of Michigan.

A summary by the University of Michigan noted that it had been thought that oscillations in the Sun's magnetic field might have caused the corona to heat up and were expecting to get data to confirm that.

Instead, they reported much more powerful, "rogue" magnetic waves strong enough to switch the direction of the magnetic field completely that may be the energy source for the corona.

Scientists were also surprised by what they found about the acceleration of the solar wind, the outward stream of protons, electrons and other particles emanating from the Sun.

It was known that closer in, the Sun's magnetic field pulls this wind in the same direction as its rotation, so the team expected this effect would weaken further out.

"To our great surprise, as we neared the Sun, we've already detected large rotational flows -- 10 to 20 times greater than what standard models of the Sun predict," Kasper said.

"So we are missing something fundamental about the Sun and how the solar wind escapes.

"This has huge implications. Space weather forecasting will need to account for these flows if we are going to be able to predict whether a coronal mass ejection will strike Earth, or astronauts heading to the Moon or Mars," he added.

The premier distributed awards among successful persons with disabilities, parents, caregivers, social activists and organisations for their contributions to the society, particularly the disabilities.

Hasina also inaugurated newly-constructed Jatiyo Protibondhi Complex, "Subarno Bhaban", on the premises of National Foundation for Development of the Disabled Persons.

## Man burnt to death in freak accident
