Shut down all polluters

HC asks govt as DoE identifies 52 illegal washing plants on Buriganga shore

STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The High Court yesterday ordered the Department of Environment (DoE) to shut down all illegal industries, factories, and organisations on the Buriganga that are polluting the river.

During the hearing of a writ petition, the HC also directed it to submit a complete report by January 8 after complying with the order.

At the same time, the court ordered the Dhaka Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) to properly implement its undertaking about

the first progress report by January 8.

Earlier in the day, the DoE submitted a report that said 52 fabric washing plants without any environmental clearance certificate (ECC) and effluent treatment plant they were polluting the river. (ETP) were illegally operating on the south shore of the river, polluting its water and the environment.

Besides, some factories and organisations which have no ECC and ETP were running their operations on the north shore of Buriganga in Dhaka metropolitan area. An inquiry is going sought the complete compliance sealing off drains and sewerage lines on in this regard, the DoE said in the
