COMMEMORATING SIX DECADES OF GREATNESS

When I interviewed Junoon for the Dhaka International Folk Fest, the legendary Sufi rockers had asked me, "How is Miles doing? Are they still around?" Such is the greatness of one of Bangladesh's pioneering bands, Miles. The juggernauts of the industry are set to celebrate their 40th anniversary on December 24 at International Convention City Bashundhara (ICCB).

Coincidentally, that is the same day Artcell, the biggest rock band of the generation, will celebrate 20 years of their Pothchola. Their concert will take place at ICCB's Expo Zone.

Amidst many speculations about why the

concerts will take place on the same day, in the same venue, the bands broke the ice with an informal get-together at a restaurant in the capital. "There is, in no way, any animosity between us and Miles, we have always looked up to them," said Lincoln, Artcell's vocalist and riff guitarist. It was difficult, during the meet up, to get a serious conversation going, as the band members were constantly engaging in funny banters - a clear indication of the mutual respect and adoration between the two.

"As it is, it is very difficult to get a venue in these busy months," said Miles' vocalist Hamin Ahmed, "We only got to know that Artcell's concert was on the same date after our plans with our organisers were finalised."

The musicians, however, took the

coincidence positively. "This is a tremendous opportunity to witness two of the biggest Bangladeshi bands performing in parallel venues," said Shaju, Artcell's drummer. "We, ourselves are planning a tribute to Miles by covering one of their numbers."

The members of Miles have long acted as mentors for Artcell, who have grown into staples of the Bangladeshi music industry today. December 24 is going to be a date that is speculated to return listeners to the era of regular ticketed concerts, a much needed step in the right direction.

20 Years of Artcellism is being organised by Asiatic EXP, whereas Windmill is arranging the Miles 40 Years Anniversary Celebrations concert.

Legendary Indian actor Dilip Kumar, born as Muhammad Yusuf Khan in Peshawar to Ayesha Begum and Lala Ghulam Sarwar Ali Khan, turns 97 today. Popularly known as 'The Tragedy King' and 'The First Khan', he has been credited with bringing realism to film acting since his first film, Jwar Bhata, in 1944.

Kumar was an excellent method actor of his time, as noted by Satyajit Ray. In the 1952 film, Daag, produced and directed by Amiya Chakravarty, Kumar played the role of Shankar, who lives a life of poverty with his mother. He makes and sells mud toys to earn money. Being the lone bread winner of the family, Shankar is unable to meet the needs, and his debts start increasing when he gets addicted

to alcohol. Kumar also played the titular character in Bimal Roy's Devdas (1955), a film adaptation of Sharat Chandra Chattopadhyay's novel of the same name, set against the backdrop of rural Bengal during feudal times. Devdas is a young man from a wealthy Brahmin family in India, who descends into life-threatening alcoholism when his childhood love, Paro, marries another man. Shankar and Devdas are two of Kumar's most memorable roles. He has won nine Filmfare Awards and is the first recipient of the Filmfare Best Actor Award (1954).

His last film appearance was in Qila (1998). Recently, he has been hospitalised for pneumonia a few times, but he came out unscathed. We wish the actor good health and a very happy birthday!



Gems of Nazrul will release its tenth music video of the song, Tora Shob Joyoddhwani Kor, on Bangladesh's Victory Day (December 16). Established as an initiative to promote the National Poet Kazi Nazrul Islam's musical genius to audiences home and abroad, Gems of Nazrul has been regularly marking important occasions in the Bangladesh calendar with renditions of the poet's work.

The most recent production has been dedicated to the Martyrs of the Liberation War of 1971. Performed by senior and upcoming artistes, the spirited song will go on air on Channel i at the stroke of midnight on December 16.

Over 50 prominent and promising Nazrul artistes and singers from several institutions have been featured in the video. "Kazi Nazrul Islam's spirited songs not only symbolised our protest against British Raj in the Indian Subcontinent, but
