Hetmyer, Hope silence India



Centuries from Shimron Hetmyer and Shai Hope powered West Indies to an eight-wicket win over

India after chasing down a target of 288 in the first one-day international on Sunday.

Hetmyer, who hit a career-best 139, and Hope, unbeaten on 102, put on a key 218-run second-wicket partnership as West Indies eased to victory with 13 balls to spare and lead the three-match series 1-0.

The left-hander completed his fifth ODI ton in 85 balls to take control with Hope, a right-handed wicketkeeper-batsman, after the early fall of Sunil Ambris for nine.

Hetmyer, who hit his second hundred against India, smashed 11 fours and seven sixes in his 106-ball knock.

"We know the talent that he (Hetmyer) has," said skipper Kieron Pollard. "He has been struggling a bit in the last nine months and he has been under a lot of pressure. As a management group, we have faith in him."

Earlier, Shreyas Iyer and Rishabh Pant made half-centuries to guide India to 287 for eight after they lost early wickets following West Indies' decision to bowl first.

Iyer, who made 70, and Pant, who hit 71, put on 114 for the fourth wicket after India were left struggling at 80 for three.

Keemo Paul broke through with the wicket of Jadhav, and there was drama on the very next ball with Jadeja run out after a delayed umpire call.

Roston Chase hit the stumps at the bowler's end where Jadeja was running and South African umpire Shaun George did not call for the third umpire.

But replays suggested Jadeja was short of his crease, prompting the on-field official to refer it to the TV umpire who then gave it out, as an angry Kohli shook his head in disapproval in the dressing room.

"The thought is simple, the fielder asked 'how is that' and the umpire said 'not out'. The dismissal ends there," Kohli said.

"The people sitting on the TV outside cannot tell the fielders to then tell the umpire to review it again. I've never seen that happen in cricket.

"I don't know where the rules are, where the line is drawn. I think the referee and the umpires have to take that up, see that incident again. And figure out what needs to be done in cricket. **SCORES IN BRIEF**

Packaging there, cricket not quite

The first Dhaka leg of the Bangabandhu Bangladesh Premier League (BBPL) ended on Saturday after four

days of double-headers at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur and the show moves to Chattogram from tomorrow. The cricket in the Dhaka phase was distinctly underwhelming and of a standard lower than that seen in previous editions, but there was a positive in that the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) did manage to raise broadcasting standards.

None of the eight matches so far have been edge-of-the-seat thrillers, which is the biggest selling point of the T20 format. Most matches, except the of sparse crowds in Mirpur and that perhaps has a lot to do with the lack of star power in this edition, which the BCB chose to hold on their own steam without the involvement of the franchises seen in previous editions due to a dispute with the latter. While previous editions boasted players like Steve Smith, David Warner, AB de

Villiers and Evin Lewis, the biggest foreign names in this edition so far are Andre Russell and Mohammad Amir. Added to that have been low scores on good batting pitches and the common epidemic of dropped catches.

There has been a silver lining -- in the absence of foreign star power local players have stepped up. Chattogram Challengers' Imrul Kayes has ended the first leg as the joint highest scorer along with teammate Chadwick Walton. There have been fine batting performances from youngster Mohammad Naim for Rangpur Rangers, while Mosaddek Hossain and Mohammad Mithun have enhanced their reputations for Sylhet Thunder. And there has been a welcome return to form for Dhaka Platoon's star opener Tamim Iqbal after a prolonged Dhaka's Anamul Haque has also shown some promising form.

Taking a bit of the gloss off that silver lining has been the generally poor quality of bowling and fielding, with dropped catches continuing to be a feature of Bangladesh's flagship T20 league. In that light, apart from the aforementioned performers, it is even

'Open to AB comeback'

With South African cricket in a transition phase and the T20 World Cup in Australia next October, newly appointed coach Mark Boucher said he was to talking to retired great AB de Villiers to persuade him to make a comeback.



Kiwis succumb to Starc fire

Australian captain Tim Paine praised his undermanned attack after the home side recorded one of their biggest wins over

New Zealand on the fourth day of the first Test at Perth Stadium on Sunday. Having trailed by 250 runs on the first innings, the Kiwis were set a

mammoth 468 to win -- which would have been a record chase in Test cricket -- on a deteriorating pitch after Australia declared at 217 for nine in their second innings. The visitors were never in contention

after losing their first wicket with just six runs on the board and were unable to push the match into a fifth day after Mitchell Starc and Pat Cummins cleaned up the Kiwi tail under lights in Perth's first-ever day-night Test. New Zealand were dismissed for

171 and were beaten by 296 runs, the last five wickets falling in a hurry for just 17 runs. It was just one run shy of their biggest losing margin to Australia -- in runs -- in a match where both teams batted twice.

Australia's biggest win, other than innings victories, was by 297 runs in Auckland in 1974.

Starc (4-45), who claimed nine wickets for the match, and Cummins (2-31) used the pink ball to good effect to bring the match to a quick conclusion after none of the recognised Kiwi batsmen offered significant resistance.

In match that Paine said had a Bodyline feel at times as the Kiwis used short balls regularly, he applauded a massive effort by the bowlers given the loss of opening bowler Josh Hazlewood early in the match

"It was a particularly solid performance given we were a bowler down for two innings," he said.

"That was an awesome effort. I am
