## DNCC mayor warns of action against noncompliant contractors

Dhaka North City Corporation (DNCC) Mayor Atiqul Islam yesterday warned individuals and institutions of penalties starting December 20, if they fail to follow compliance during any development work.

He made the announcement at a roundtable titled "Unplanned pollution in Dhaka: Citizens reflect" at Jatiya Press Club.

"We have sought more magistrates from the government to conduct drives against polluters. We are also asking traders who are running different types of operations, polluting environment, to stop their businesses," said Atiqul.

He said, "Contractors of city corporations, Rajuk, Wasa and other organisations have to be environmentally compliant in Dhaka. If you (contractors) cannot abide by that, our magistrates will take action."

The mayor also warned businessmen who deal with plastic bottles and chips, saying: "You [businessmen] will either have to change your mode of conducting business, or find an alternate way to dispose or recycle plastic bottles."

He further said citizens are the ones who

suffer from waterlogging due to plastic bottles in the streets, which should not happen.

It is the responsibility of producers to ensure that plastic bottles do not end up on the streets, causing harm to the

environment, Atiqul added. "We are creating a death trap during our development works. Pollution is one of the main causes of cardiac arrest," said public

health expert Dr Lelin Chowdhury. Every year, around 2 lakh people suffer cardiac arrests in the country, he said.

Lelin suggested necessary assessment before starting development works, to reduce pollution.

"We have always been in the top four of the list of unlivable cities in the world, and are still maintaining the position," said The main cause of air pollution in Dhaka

is brick kilns around the city, and the second is black smoke of vehicles, he said.

Suggesting the mayor to ensure environment-friendly businesses in the city, architect Iqbal Habib, joint secretary of Bangladesh Poribesh Andolon, said former

## needed for returnee migrants labour market reopening

Speakers tell nat'l consultation

Dalia (23) returned home in August from Saudi Arabia, with a broken spinal cord and leg from jumping off the fourth floor of a building to save herself from torture by her employer there. With dreams of a better future, she

had gone to Saudi Arabia in July last year. However, she is now abandoned by her husband, as a "disabled" woman -- a burden for his family.

Moktar Hossain (28), who returned from Malaysia a few months back, was a little luckier than Dalia. He got a head injury as a result of torture, which has not fully cured.

However, he has managed to get job in a catering service in Dhaka with the help of the migration department of Brac.

Dalia and Muktar are just two of the hundreds of returnee migrant workers, who find it difficult to find ground beneath their feet after coming back from a life of misery there.

In most cases, these returnee migrant workers fail to be reintegrated socially as well as economically. In fact, the government has no

comprehensive programme for them. The government should initiate a

comprehensive programme integrating civil society organisations (CSO) to this end, speakers at a national-level consultation said yesterday.

The migration department of Brac organised the event at its headquarters in the capital. Shariful Islam Hasan, head of Brac's migration programme, presented a concept paper on "Returnee reintegration and CSOs' role", where he termed returnee migration a "new crisis".

# Comprehensive programme Uncertainty looms over Malaysian

Expatriates' Welfare Minister Imran Ahmad yesterday said he is not sure when the Malaysian labour market will reopen to Bangladeshi workers.

"I cannot provide a timeline," he said, adding that he had earlier mentioned it would reopen soon.

The minister said it has been deferred a couple of times so far, due to requests from Malaysian authorities.

"We have no problem at our end... If they ask, I will say I'm ready," he further said, hoping the market will be reopened soon.

A joint working group meeting between the two countries aimed to sign an agreement for the market's reopening on November 24-25 in Dhaka. The meeting was postponed.

On November 6, the two countries issued a joint statement following a meeting in Kuala Lumpur. In the statement, they agreed to discuss and finalise the "Draft Protocol Amending the Memorandum of Understanding 2016" at the Dhaka meeting.

Bangladesh has sent some 10.56 lakh migrant workers to Malaysia since 1978.

suspended Malaysia recruitment from Bangladesh in September last year, alleging monopoly by a syndicate of 10 recruiting agents and high cost of migration.

The minister was addressing a press briefing at his office, organised to inform the media about the government's preparations International Migrants Day -- being observed globally today.

He said the government was waiting for post-mortem reports of migrant workers who died during

their stay abroad. "We receive many questions

regarding post-mortem. There has been confusion over many deaths [of migrants workers]," he said.

The ministry wants the reports so that it can "check and counter-check" the reasons behind the deaths, he labour added.

> "Deaths of young migrant workers are disturbing," Imran Ahmad said.

Responding to a query, he said about 40 percent of Bangladeshi migrant workers are less-skilled. The government is working to increase the number of skilled workers, he said.

About the situation of female migrant workers in Saudi Arabia, he said they have already spoken to Saudi authorities and expressed hope that all issues will be resolved soon.

He said the ministry is working as

## HC questions legality of some ACC rules

The High Court yesterday questioned the legality of a few sections of Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) rules, that

curtail police's authority to directly record corruption cases. The court issued a rule asking the ACC and the government to explain in four weeks why the sections concerned of the Anti-Corruption Commission (Amendment) Rules-2019 should not be scrapped, as the sections allegedly damaged people's right to lodge

corruption case with the police station. Secretaries to the ministries of law and home and to the parliament secretariat, chairman and secretary of the ACC, and inspector general of police have been made respondents to the rule.

The bench of Justice Moyeenul Islam Chowdhury and Justice Khandaker Diliruzzaman came up with rule following a writ petition jointly filed by Supreme Court lawyers Subir Nandi Das and Noshin Nowal on November 13.

According to the petition, the ACC on June 20 this year issued a gazette notification amending the Anti-Corruption Commission Rules-2007.
