## Is this man top terror Joy?

A joint investigation by The Daily Star and Canada's Global News finds striking similarities between Ontario-based Indian businessman Tarekh Rana and Tanvir Islam Joy, a leader of Bangladesh's infamous crime syndicate Seven-Star Group in the '90s who vanished into thin air following police crackdown

One phone call from him would send shivers down the spine of businessmen in Mohammadpur, Dhanmondi and Hazaribagh areas.

He was Khandakar Tanvir Islam Joy, a leader of the Seven-Star Group that boasts of crime lords like Subhrata Bain, Mollah Masud and Murgi Milon.

The Seven-Star group along with the Five-Star Group -- which included notorious names like Pichchi Hannan, Kala Jahangir and Dakat Shahid and whose leader Zeesan Ahmed was nabbed in Dubai earlier this year -- terrorised businesses in the capital and its surrounding areas in the nineties and the last decade.

Joy's first reported arrest was in 1999. Posing as the son of the prime minister, he demanded tolls from industrial units at the Savar Export Processing Zone and the nearby Parjatan property, as reported in The Daily Star on January 4, 1999.

His modus operandi was he would ring businesses -- mainly cable TV service

providers, realtors and shopping complexes -- for tolls, ranging from few lakhs to crores, and then get his men to trail the targets to heighten the intimidation. If the targets refused to pay they would be murdered in cold blood.

So menacing did the two crime gangs become that the home ministry on December 27, 2001 put up a list of 23 most wanted criminals, drawing on leaders of the two gangs, and put up a bounty of Tk 50,000 and Tk 1 lakh for information that would lead to their capture.

Soon after the list was out the crime lords fled Bangladesh, as per various media reports at that time.

But their threats did not stop; they only intensified. For instance, Joy was involved in at least three high-profile murders, multiple bouts of extortions and tender manipulations since then.

This prompted the Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) later to put up the names of the criminals in Interpol's Red Notice. To date, 13 of the 23, including Joy, are at large,

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## Govt suspends list in face of protests

*A fresh one to be published March 26 after scrutiny and correction; rallies held to protest the flawed list*

Amid nationwide outrage and angry protests, the Liberation War affairs ministry yesterday suspended the controversial and flawed Razakars' list three days after its publication.

The decision came hours after Road Transport and Bridges Minister Obaidul Quader said Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina instructed the ministries concerned to "correct the list" by dropping the names of freedom fighters from it.

Many freedom fighters were utterly shocked to see their names on the list of Razakars who collaborated with the Pakistani occupation army in carrying out mass killings and atrocities against the Bangalees during the 1971 Liberation War.

The Daily Star found at least 25 freedom fighters or organisers of the war on the list published a day before Victory Day.

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Following this, freedom fighters and pro-liberation people have been staging demonstrations across the country, demanding cancellation of the list.

Yesterday, they held protest rallies and formed human chains in Sirajganj town, Barishal city and several other parts of the country.

"We have suspended the Razakars' list as there are allegations that it contains names of freedom fighters," Liberation War Affairs Minister AKM Mozammel Haque told The Daily Star over the phone last night.

"We will publish a fresh list on March 26 after scrutinising this one properly," he said without elaborating.

In a statement around 7:30pm, the ministry said they received felicitations for the list from various quarters and also drew huge criticism for mistakes in it.

Nineteen managing directors have adorned the top position at the state-owned Bangladesh Telecommunication Company Ltd in its life of 11 years. Of the 19, seven ran the company as the MD more than once. Mahfuz Uddin Ahmed was the MD three times.

At the BTCL Eskaton Garden office, a plaque names 25 MDs, including the ones who had been the MD multiple times.

Industry insiders said frequent change in top management was not desired and that MDs of BTCL had mostly been busy following government orders and unable to get the time to take care of the company's development and plan its future.

Due to this leadership crises, the BTCL became a loss-incurring company from a profitable venture, they said.

In 2008-09, BTCL's revenue was Tk 1,689.36 crore and net profit was Tk 106.15 crore. It incurred a loss of Tk 389.39 crore in 2017-18 fiscal.

The BTCL emerged as a company from state organisation Bangladesh Telegraph and Telephone Board (BITB) in July 2008.

Md Nur-Ur-Rahman recently became the secretary of the Posts and Telecommunications Division and also the chairman of the BTCL Board of Directors.

"Definitely it will be a challenge for anyone to run a company only for a few months and we will try to look into the matter in the coming days," he said.

## TRUMP IMPEACHMENT House begins historic debate

*President accuses Pelosi, Democrats of pursuing an 'illegal coup'*

The House of Representatives yesterday began debate ahead of a historic vote on two articles of impeachment against President Donald Trump charging him with abusing his office and obstructing Congress that would make him the third US president to be impeached.

The vote in the Democratic-controlled House is expected to fall almost entirely along party lines, underscoring the deep divide in Congress over Trump's conduct - and the larger political schism within the nation itself.

Trump would become only the third American president to be impeached, an extraordinary check on presidential power spelled out in the US Constitution for executives who commit "high crimes and misdemeanors." No president has ever been removed from office under its terms.

The vote, expected in the afternoon or early evening (local time), would result in a trial next month in the US Senate in which House members would act as prosecutors. That chamber is controlled by Trump's fellow Republicans, who have shown little interest in removing him from office.
