

# Dhaka, Beijing discuss ways for early repatriation

DHAKA

Bangladesh and China yesterday discussed ways for "early repatriation" of Rohingyas -- currently taking shelter in Cox's Bazar district -- to their place of origin in Rakhine State of Myanmar.

"Ambassador Li met Foreign Minister Dr Momen for

further discussions on early repatriation of the displaced people [Rohingyas] and for an early date of return to their homeland," Yan Hualong, minister (counselor) and deputy head of mission of Chinese embassy in Dhaka told the news agency. The Chinese envoy yesterday also met Chairman of Red

Crescent Society of Bangladesh Hafiz Ahmed Mazumdar, and its Vice-Chairman Prof Dr Md Habibe Millat.

The two sides discussed humanitarian cooperation between Bangladesh and China, and early return of Rohingyas to their homeland.

# 3 expelled Buet students 'Govt abetting India can sit for exams: HC

Results to be scrapped if ragging charges proven STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The High Court yesterday directed Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (Buet) to allow its three students, who were expelled for their alleged involvement in ragging, to sit for the term final examination. The exams are scheduled to start tomorrow.

It also issued a rule, asking Buet authorities to explain in four weeks why the decision of its academic council should not be declared illegal. The court, however, imposed a condition saying that results of the expelled students will remain withheld till hearing of the rule, and if they

are found guilty their results will be scrapped. The HC bench of Justice JBM Hassan and Justice Md Khairul Alam came up with the order and rule following a petition filed by the three students

including Shobyashachi Das Dibya, challenging legality of the academic council's decision to reject their appeals. On December 24, the same HC bench issued similar orders and rules on 10 Buet students, who were expelled from halls and academic terms for

their alleged involvement in ragging, Deputy Attorney General Md Noor

us Sadik told The Daily Star. He said the university authorities had earlier expelled them on charges of their involvement in ragging. They filed separate appeals with Buet's academic council against the expulsion orders. The council at its 450th meeting on December 18 rejected those, he said.

## EC Mahbub's remarks 'deceptive': info minister

Information Minister Dr Hasan Mahmud yesterday criticised Election Commissioner Mahbub Talukdar for his comments about the election process, saying that his remarks were nothing but "deceptive".

"It would have been proper had Mahbub Talukdar made such comments after resigning from his post," the minister told a press briefing at his secretariat office in the afternoon, reports BSS.

EC Mahbub on Wednesday underscored the need for reforming the election process and said public representatives who are elected illegally

have no commitment to people or democracy, reports UNB. Yesterday, the minister said whatever reforms took place in the election process and Election Commission, were made following demands of Awami League.

# a dumping ground'

Says Mirza Fakhrul

UNB, Dhaka

BNP yesterday accused the government of "abetting India in turning Bangladesh into a dumping ground" only to stay in power.

"The foreign minister said they would accept if any Bangladeshi citizen returns from India, and will send back those who are non-Bangladeshi. This means they [government] admitted that push-in is happening," said BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir.

He further said, "The government is collaborating with India to turn our country into a dumping ground."

Fakhrul came up with the remarks while speaking at a press conference at BNP's Nayapaltan central office.

Fakhrul alleged that Awami League General Secretary Obaidul Quader took a stance against the country's people by supporting the remarks of Indian Home Minister Amit Shah and External Affairs Ministry Spokesperson Ravish Kumar -- incriminating BNP with the repression of women in 2002.

"We condemn and protest Obaidul Quader's comments," he said.

Fakhrul said the AL leader's comment is tantamount to threatening Bangladesh's independence, sovereignty, peace and security. "The entire nation is stunned and aggrieved as he [Quader] took a favouring position towards Amit Shah with his remarks about repression of minority communities," he claimed.

Fakhrul rejected remarks of Amit Shah, Ravish Kumar and Obaidul Quader -- accusing the BNP-led government of oppressing minority communities, saying that their comments were "absolutely false, baseless, discriminatory and motivated" to create division based on religion.

He said the comments of the trio are part of a "repulsive strategy to make gains in the internal politics of the two countries by BJP and Awami League".

By supporting Amit Shah's remarks, Quader not only took position against the interests of the countrymen, but also against Indians who will be affected following the enforcement of Citizenship Amendment Act and NRC.

He urged the ruling party to refrain from making any remarks that goes against the country's interests.

# to turn Bangladesh Work for 4-lane upgrade begins

Work for upgrading the 48km Dhaka Bypass Road to dual carriageway was inaugurated yesterday, aiming to improve connectivity between the country's north and northwest parts and the Chattogram Port.

Road Transport and Bridges Minister Obaidul Quader inaugurated the work at a ceremony near Kanchan bridge in Rupganj upazila of Narayanganj.

This is the first public-private partnership project of the Roads and Highways Department (RHD), and vehicles will have to pay toll to use the four-lane highway -- Joydevpur-Debogram-Bhulta-Madanpur, commonly known as Dhaka Bypass Road.

Once completed, it would take around 40 minutes to cross the road from Bhogra intersection on Dhaka-Tangail Highway to Madanpur on Dhaka-Chattogram Highway, officials said.

Talking at the programme, Quader, also general secretary of ruling Awami League, said the initial problem over funding has been resolved and work will go on in full throttle now.

The work would be completed within the stipulated deadline of 2022, the minister hoped.

Last December, Roads and Highways Department and a consortium of three companies signed a deal

The companies are Sichuan Road and Bridge (Group) Corporation Ltd of China, and Shamim Enterprise (Pvt) Ltd and UDC Corporation Ltd of Bangladesh. Of the total amount, the finance ministry would

provide Tk 223.79 crore while RHD would provide around Tk 500 crore, and the rest Tk 3,276 crore would be provided by the investors. The project includes designing, building, financing, operating, and maintaining the road by the private partner for a concession period of 25 years. The highway will have modern equipment

such as central control and command centre, variable message signs, full-length CCTV coverage and intelligent cameras for traffic count and classifications installed.

The road connects the Joydevpur-Tangail National Highway (N-4), Dhaka-Chattogram National Highway (N-1), Dhaka-Sylhet National Highway (N-2), Dhaka-Mymensingh National Highway (N-3) along with some regional highways and district roads.

Buses, trucks and other vehicles will be able to easily travel from northern and western parts of the country to eastern and southern parts without entering Dhaka city. There would be service roads on both sides, which would be toll-free.

# 5 survivors released from DMCH

Five workers, who sustained burns in Keraniganj fire on December 11, were released yesterday from the burn unit of Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH). They are: Aslam, Sazid, Jakir, Basir and Lal Miah.

Five other survivors are undergoing treatment at the burn unit. Three of them are expected to be released tomorrow, said DMCH Director Brig Gen AKM Nasir Uddin.

Two others are still on life support, but their condition have improved, said Dr Samanta Lal Sen, coordinator of Sheikh Hasina National Burn and Plastic Surgery Institute. Twenty-two employees of a factory have died in the

December 11 fire. "All the patients who were brought to the hospital had inhalation and deep burn injuries," said AKM Nasir Uddin.
