

Crash test dummies - how cars are tested for safety

A crash test is one where a car is intentionally driven into obstacles, hit by a myriad of objects and then tested for how well it protects the passenger. Features like airbags, collapsing steering columns and crumple zones (just a few of the safety features on modern vehicles) work together to move the passenger out of harm's way, and crash test dummies are used to determine how well the systems work in combination. There's a whole host of testing standards, such as the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS), EuroNCAP and ASEAN NCAP. If you're confused about which one to follow, the EuroNCAP is one of the most comprehensive automotive safety tests ever devised – just know that European vehicle specs may not always match yours, so dig deeper as the safety rating is just a start.
