BIWTA ignores MP's resistance, presses on

On the second day of an ongoing eviction drive yesterday, Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority ignored resistance from Dhaka lawmaker Aslamul Huq and continued recovering a large area of the Buriganga river in Charwashpur near Basila Bridge.

The lawmaker earth-filled a total of 20 acres of the river when he built two extensions to his Maisha power plant -- the Dhaka North Power Plant and Dhaka West Power Plant -- and a sprawling leisure retreat, said BIWTA Joint Director AKM Arif Uddin.

As the BIWTA team started the drive yesterday morning, the lawmaker came to the area with around 80 people and asked the executive magistrate to stop the drive, Arif said.

"They were forced to flee the scene as law enforcers chased them away, and we continued the eviction," Arif told The Daily Star.

The lawmaker had earth-filled 15 acres area of the river's main channel at the confluence of the Buriganga and Turag rivers, and 5 acres of a Buriganga offshoot in Chawrashpur, he said.

Arif added that the structures built by Aslamul, lawmaker of Dhaka-14 (Mirpur), have blocked the entire 450-feet breadth of the Buriganga offshoot that stretches 14 kilometres across Hazratpur and converges with Dhaleswari river.

As a result, that branch of the Buriganga is now dead and has been grabbed by other encroachers, he said, adding that all the grabbed areas of the river are documented in

New gas field discovered in Cumilla

Bangladesh Petroleum Exploration and Production Company Limited (Bapex) on Tuesday announced the discovery of a new gas field at Srikail in Cumilla's Muradnagar upazila.

Drilling began at Srikail East-1 gas field, the country's 28th gas field, on October 28 last year.

"After four months, Bapex found a gas layer on Tuesday night," said Mohsinur Rahman, in-charge of the gas field.

Bapex is considering the discovery as a ray of hope amid news that the country's gas reserve is depleting fast, he said.

Bapex, the state-owned gas and oil exploration entity, says it expects to produce 20 million cubic feet per day from the gas field located 3,065 metres below the surface.

An analysis is being conducted to estimate the gas reserve and the pressure of water and gas in the field, Mohsinur said.

The production work

12 cops sued over sexual harassment

Twelve cops, including two OCs of two police stations in the capital, were sued yesterday over sexual harassment of two women.

They are among 16 people accused in two cases filed with two Dhaka courts under the Women and Children Repression Prevention Act.

The accused include three sub-inspectors, two assistant sub-inspectors, five constables and four other people.

A woman filed one of the cases with Women and Children Repression Prevention Tribunal-3 in Dhaka. She accused Jatrabari OC Mazharul Islam, SI Osman Ali, and civilians Md Sohel, Miraz Ali and Md Zihad of attempted rape and extortion.

After hearing the complaint, Judge Jayasree Samadder of the tribunal took the case into cognisance.

The court asked the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate of Dhaka to conduct a judicial enquiry into the complaint.

According to the case statement, Miraz, Sohel and Zihad forcibly entered the complainant's home on Kajla New Road in the capital's Jatrabari area around 11:30pm on February 14 and attempted to rape her.

Nasa has asked for applications to go to the moon. It is the first time in four years the space agency has asked for new astronauts. DELHI VIOLENCE SC asks HC to hear plea tomorrow

Says long adjournment 'not justified'

The Indian Supreme Court yesterday asked the Delhi High Court to hear tomorrow a plea seeking lodging of FIRs against some BJP leaders for alleged hate speeches which purportedly led to recent violence here and said it may also explore the possibility of "peaceful resolution" of the dispute.

The apex court, which said it "wants to see if peace is possible", observed that adjournment of hearing by the High Court for "such a long period" in April on separate petitions related to the violence in northeast Delhi was not "justified" and such matters should not be delayed for long.

A bench headed by Chief Justice S A Bobde requested the Chief Justice of the High Court to dispose of these matters "as expeditiously as possible"

Biden gains big on Super Tuesday

Sets up one-on-one battle against Sanders; Bloomberg quits race

A resurgent Joe Biden seized the momentum in the race to become the Democratic challenger to President Donald Trump with a string of Super Tuesday victories, including key prize Texas, against rival Bernie Sanders.

Sanders, a 78-year-old leftist who wants to reshape America's economy, had been the clear leader and was looking for a knock-out blow on the most consequential voting day on the primary calendar.

Instead, the results signalled a remarkable comeback for Biden, a former vice president under Barack Obama who was projected to win at least nine, and possibly 10, of the nomination contests held across 14 states.

Meanwhile, billionaire and former New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg ended his US presidential campaign yesterday and endorsed Joe Biden.

In another move that could reshape the race to find the Democrat who will face Republican President Donald Trump in the Nov 3 election, candidate Elizabeth Warren is "talking to her team to assess the path forward," a campaign aide said. The liberal US senator from Massachusetts, who was seeking to become America's first female president, had disappointing results across the board on Tuesday.
