### Spainish PM seeks 'flexible' lockdown

Spain's Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez has said he would ask parliament for a 15-day extension until May 9 of the lockdown imposed in one of the world's worst coronavirus' outbreaks, but said the restrictions would be more flexible.

"We have left behind the most extreme moments," Sanchez said at a press briefing. But he added: "These achievements are still insufficient and above all fragile. We cannot put them at risk with hasty solutions".

Spain's death toll from the coronavirus rose at a slower pace on Saturday but surpassed 20,000 fatalities, the Health Ministry said. It increased by 565 deaths, down from 585 on Friday, while the number of coronavirus cases rose to 191,726 from 188,068.

Spain began this week to ease a strict lockdown imposed on March 14 by opening up some sectors of the economy, including manufacturing. But most people are still confined to their homes except for essential outings such as food shopping, and not even children are allowed out for exercise.

The country with the third highest coronavirus death toll will move slowly, carefully and progressively towards the "new normality", Sanchez said.

But he warned it would be a complex task and that the economic consequences of the outbreak will be "very negative"

Asked if citizens would be able to have regular summer holidays, the Socialist leader said he hoped so but that he could not give an answer, signalling the uncertainty on the scope of any de-escalation phase.

## India's virus cases nears 16,000

Maharashtra allows some economic activity REUTERS, New Delhi/Mumbai

India's Maharashtra state, the country's largest regional economy, will allow a limited number of sectors to resume business today, after a weeks-long shutdown to slow the spread of coronavirus left millions

Maharashtra, home to financial centre Mumbai, has the biggest share of India's caseload of 15,713 infections, including a large number now ripping through its densely-packed slums.

Chief Minister Uddhav Thackeray yesterday told a news conference on that some activity would be permitted in the least-affected parts of the state while observing a strict lockdown in the red zones that have the maximum number of cases.

"We need to start the economic wheels again. We are giving selective permissions from tomorrow, especially in orange zones and green zones," he said, referring to areas with lower levels of infection.

Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi has extended the nationwide lockdown that began late last month until May 3, but the federal government has allowed states to restart activity as amid economic distress in rural areas.

Lady Gaga responded to this tweet,

saying: "I am so humbled to have been a part of this project.'

The proceeds will be given to the WHO's Covid-19 Solidarity Response



The concert was divided into two parts, a 6-hour "pre-show" and a main 2-hour show hosted by Jimmy Fallon,

Jimmy Kimmel and Stephen Colbert. "To all of our frontline healthcare workers, we are with you. Thank you for being there for us," an on-screen caption read at the start of the show. Those who performed also

added their tributes, with Lady Gaga expressing her thanks for medical workers who are "putting their lives at risk for us right now. Other musicians also spoke about

the need for solidarity during the pandemic. Before performing "Lean on Me" in tribute to his late friend Bill Withers, Stevie Wonder said: "During hardships like this, we have to lean on each other for help."
Taylor Swift, Elton John, Paul

McCartney and Jennifer Lopez were among others who gave performances from their homes.

"Tonight, through the universal language of music, we salute the bravery and sacrifice of health heroes and others," said UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres in a clip played during the broadcast. "And please join our call for a global ceasefire to focus on our common enemy -- the virus."

**DEATH TOLL CROSSES 160,000** The worldwide death toll from the novel coronavirus pandemic rose to 160,952 vesterday.

University at 1000 GMT. More than 2,331,099 declared cases have been registered in 193 countries and territories since the epidemic first emerged in China in December. In the United States, now the epicentre of the pandemic, the death toll stood at 39,090 with 735,287

infections. Italy is the next most-affected country with 23,227 deaths from 175,925 infections. It is followed by Spain with 20,639 fatalities from 194,416 confirmed infections, France with 19,349 deaths and 152,978 infections and Britain with 15,498 deaths from 115,317 cases.

#### **'LOWEST' DEATHS IN NY**

New York state, the epicenter of the coronavirus pandemic in the United States, has experienced its lowest one-day death toll in two weeks, Governor Andrew Cuomo announced Saturday. Cuomo said 540 people had died in his state of 20 million inhabitants in the preceding 24 hours, and he suggested New York may now be on the downslope after a recent plateau in deaths.

#### **ISRAEL EASES RESTRICTIONS**

Israel on Saturday approved some easing to its tight coronavirus restrictions while pointedly avoiding announcing the first stage of an exit from lockdown. In a televised address, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu outlined "a responsible and gradual" plan which would allow the return of some workers to offices and industry. He also promised to reopen some high street shops and allow a return to school for children with special educational needs, in groups of up to three.

#### **ONLY 8 CASES IN S KOREA**

South Korea yesterday reported single digit new coronavirus cases for the first day in two months with eight new infections. Of the new cases, five were imported from overseas. The figure brings its total infections to 10,661.

#### **'CAPTAIN TOM' RAISES \$31M**

Captain Tom Moore, a 99-year-old British war veteran, has now raised more than 25 million pounds (\$31.3 million) for the health service by walking 100 laps of his garden. The World War Two veteran, who has used a walking frame with wheels since breaking his hip, set himself the target of walking the 25 metres around his garden 100 times before his 100th birthday on April 30. He completed his task on Thursday.

### Several killed in Libya clashes

Libya's internationally-recognised government has said its forces have killed eight fighters loyal to eastern-based renegade military commander Khalifa

The announcement by military came as forces aligned with the United Nations-recognised Government of National Accord (GNA) ramped up their offensive against Haftar's forward bases in western Libva

GNA troops have in recent days retaken a string of strategic cities located west of Tripoli, including Sabratha, Surman and al-Ajaylat.

Libya, a large oil producer, has been engulfed in chaos since 2011 when longtime leader Muammar Gaddafi was killed in a NATO-backed uprising. It is now split between two rival

administrations: The Tripoli-based GNA, led by Prime Minister Fayez al-Sarraj, and the House of Representatives allied to Haftar and his self-styled Libyan National Army (LNA).

Lifts limit on mosque congregations

Pakistan has lifted restrictions on congregational prayers at mosques, but coronavirus in the country, a statement said on Saturday.

### 44 jihadists found dead in Chad jail

A group of 44 suspected members of Boko Haram, arrested during a recent operation against the jihadist group, have been found dead in their prison cell, apparently poisoned, Chad's chief prosecutor announced Saturday.

Speaking on national television, Youssouf Tom said the 44 prisoners had been found dead in their cell on Thursday.

An autopsy carried out on four of the dead prisoners revealed traces of a lethal substance that had caused heart attacks in some of the victims and severe asphyxiation in the others, he said.

The dead men were among a group of 58 suspects captured during a major army operation around Lake Chad launched by President Idriss Deby at the end of March.

A security source, speaking on condition of anonymity told AFP that "the 58 prisoners were placed in a single cell and were given nothing to eat or drink for two days".

### Japanese health system face collapse as sick denied care

Hospitals in Japan are increasingly turning away sick people as the country struggles with surging coronavirus infections and its emergency medical system collapses.

In one recent case, an ambulance carrying a man with a fever and difficulty breathing was rejected by 80 hospitals and forced to search for hours for a hospital in downtown Tokyo that would treat him.

Another feverish man finally reached a hospital after paramedics unsuccessfully contacted 40 clinics.

The Japanese Association for Acute Medicine and the Japanese Society for Emergency Medicine say many hospital emergency rooms are refusing to treat people including those suffering strokes, heart attacks and external injuries.

Japan initially seemed to have controlled the outbreak by going after clusters of infections in specific places, usually enclosed spaces such as clubs, gyms and

meeting venues. But the spread of virus outpaced this approach and most new cases are untraceable.

The outbreak has highlighted underlying weaknesses in medical care in Japan, which has long been praised for its high quality insurance system and reasonable costs.

Apart from a general unwillingness to embrace social distancing, experts blame government incompetence and a widespread shortage of the protective gear and equipment medical workers need to

The "collapse of emergency medicine" has already happened, a precursor to the overall collapse of medicine, the Japanese Association for Acute Medicine and the Japanese Society for Emergency Medicine said in a joint statement.

There are no enough protective gowns, masks and face shields, raising risks of infection for medical workers and making treatment of COVID-19 patients increasingly difficult, said Yoshitake Yokokura, who heads the Japan Medical Association.

With some 10,000 cases and 170 deaths, Japan's situation is not as dire as many other countries, but there are fears its outbreak could become much worse.

A government virus task force has warned that, in a worst-case scenario where no preventive measures were taken, more than 400,000 could die due to shortages of ventilators and other intensive care equipment.

Shinzo Abe, the prime minister, has said the government has secured 15,000 ventilators and is getting support of Sony and Toyota Motor Corp. to produce more.

Japanese hospitals also lack ICUs, with only five per 100,000 people, compared to about 30 in Germany, 35 in the US and 12 in Italy, said Osamu Nishida, head of the Japanese Society of Intensive Care Medicine.

Italy's 10-per-cent mortality rate, compared to Germany's 1 per cent, is partly due to the shortage of ICU facilities,
