

Accords with Israel, US are void: Palestinian president

Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas has announced that his administration considers all agreements signed with Israel and the United States null and void, after Israel declared it would annex parts of the occupied West Bank, according to local media reports. Palestinian news agency Wafa reported that Abbas made the announcement during an emergency meeting held in Ramallah to discuss the Israeli plans. Abbas threatened to withdraw from agreements back in February, after US President Donald Trump unveiled his Middle East plan, which included the possibility of annexation. Al Jazeera correspondent Nida Ibrahim said the implications of the move remained unclear. During his address, which was broadcast on Palestinian television, Abbas also said he was still ready to negotiate with Israel and remains committed to ending the conflict on the basis of a two-state solution.

Singapore slammed for Zoom death sentence

Singapore was criticised for being 'cruel and inhumane' yesterday after a death sentence was handed down via video-conferencing platform Zoom. Malaysian drug trafficker Punithan Genasan was Friday sentenced to hang in a hearing conducted remotely due to restrictions in place to combat the spread of the coronavirus, court officials said. The 37-year-old had been found guilty over the trafficking of at least 28.5 grams (1.0 ounce) of heroin, a crime punishable by death under the city-state's tough anti-drugs law. The Supreme Court said that it was the first criminal case where a death sentence was handed down in a remote hearing. Singapore has reported over 29,000 coronavirus infections including 22 deaths.

Climate change is turning Antarctica green: study

Parts of the Antarctic Peninsula will change colour as "green snow" caused by blooming algae is expected to spread with increases in global temperatures, research showed yesterday. Although often considered devoid of plant life, Antarctica is home to several types of algae, which grow on slushy snow and suck carbon dioxide from the air. Researchers from the University of Cambridge and the British Antarctic Survey combined satellite imagery with on-the-ground observations to detect the current extent of green algae in the world's most barren continent. They identified more than 1,600 separate green algae blooms on snow across the peninsula, with a combined surface area of 1.9 square kilometres.

The brighter side of pandemic

Road accidents, crimes, pollution in check as Asia sees unexpected gains in lockdowns

As Asia starts to assess the damage caused by the pandemic, some countries are realising there have been unforeseen benefits.

Vietnam's nationwide isolation has seen a drop in crime, Hong Kong has hailed an early end to its annual flu season -- and now, Thailand is seeing a much-needed win in road safety.

"Accidents have gone down quite a lot," said Banjerd Premjit, chief of the Por Tek Tung emergency medical team operating just outside Bangkok.

He credited Thailand's virus-fuelled measures, including a ban on alcohol sales and a nighttime curfew.

Thailand has one of the highest rates of road fatalities per capita in the world, coming second only to war-torn Libya in 2015. But this year Thailand saw a 60 percent decrease nationwide, with the death toll dropping to 167 from 386 people the

year before.

Even Thailand's coffin makers have seen a dip in demand, with one factory reporting orders are down by a third.

Regional neighbours with traffic-clogged megacities are reporting similar trends. Deaths from road accidents in Japan fell by nearly 20 percent in April, while Malaysia saw daily fatalities decrease from 17 to five, according to official news agency Bernama.

This year's figures are even promising in India, which normally records 150,000 fatalities each year on its chaotic roads.

Police said the death toll in the state of Kerala sank by 90 percent during the lockdown, compared with the same period last year.

"Rapes also fell from 123 to 37 cases during the lockdown," Kerala police spokesman Pramod Kumar told AFP.

When the coronavirus hit Hong Kong in late January, residents scarred by memories of the 2003 SARS outbreak flocked to buy masks and immediately embraced social distancing. With millions practising better hygiene, doctors noticed the annual winter flu season came to an abrupt end in February -- nine weeks

early with less than a third of last year's deaths.

On the mainland empty roads and shuttered factories meant killer toxic pollutants dissipated.

Scientists estimate China's improved air quality averted more than 12,000 cardiovascular-related deaths, although, warned in the Lancet journal their results should be "interpreted with caution".

Global CO2 emissions from fossil fuels are set to drop by up to seven percent in 2020 because of the coronavirus pandemic, researchers reported Tuesday.

In early April, coronavirus lockdowns led to a 17 percent reduction worldwide in carbon pollution compared to the same period last year, according to the first peer-reviewed assessment of the pandemic's impact on CO2 emissions, published in Nature Climate Change.

Though the scientist are saying the reduction isn't enough, the environmental gains seen during a global lockdown have scientists and celebrities calling for a "radical transformation" to save the planet instead of a return to normal.

CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC**KEY UPDATES****CASES NEAR 50 MILLION**

The novel coronavirus has killed at least 323,370 people since the outbreak first emerged in China last December, according to a tally from official sources compiled by AFP at 1100 GMT yesterday. At least 4,910,110 cases of coronavirus have been registered in 196 countries and territories. The United States has the highest number of toll with 91,938 deaths, which is followed by Britain, which has recorded with 35,341 deaths. It is followed by Italy with 32,169 deaths, France with 28,022 death infections and Spain with 27,778 fatalities.

SCHOOLS REOPEN IN SOUTH KOREA

Hundreds of thousands of South Korean students returned to school as educational establishments started reopening after a coronavirus delay of more than two months. Students lined up for temperature checks and were given sanitisers for their hands as they entered school premises while teachers greeted them with smiles and occasional elbow bumps.

'CAPTAIN TOM' TO BE KNIGHTED

Hundred-year-old British World War II veteran Captain Tom Moore, who walked around his garden to raise nearly \$40 million for healthcare charities, is to be knighted, with Prime Minister Boris Johnson calling him a "beacon of light" during the coronavirus pandemic. The knighthood, which brings with it the title of "Sir", will be formally issued by Queen Elizabeth II.

CAMBRIDGE MOVES LEARNING ONLINE FOR A FULL YEAR

The University of Cambridge has said it will teach students online for the next full academic year, scrapping face-to-face classes in light of the pandemic. The university in the east of England says it expects social-distancing requirements will stay in place nationally for some time. Lectures will continue via video until summer 2021, while it may be possible for smaller teaching groups to take place in person if they "conform to social-distancing requirements," a spokesperson said. Exams will also continue to be carried out online. Cambridge can still charge full fees for online classes.

EARLY DATA ON MODERNA'S VACCINE 'INSUFFICIENT'

Data from a small, early-stage safety trial testing Moderna Inc's experimental COVID-19 vaccine does not provide the critical data needed to assess its effectiveness, health-focused Stat News reported on Tuesday, citing experts. Moderna said on Monday the vaccine candidate, the first to be tested in the United States, produced protective antibodies in a small group of eight healthy volunteers. Stat quoted health experts saying that Moderna had not provided enough data in its news release to judge the vaccine candidate. It cited lack of data on the rest of the 45-subject study, ages of the subjects, and date on how long any immunity produced by the vaccine might last.

Indian virus more lethal than Chinese'

Nepal PM says amid border row

In a latest shocker amid row over a "new map" claiming parts of Indian territory, Nepal Prime Minister KP Oli has said that "Indian virus looks more lethal than Chinese and Italian now".

In a speech in parliament, Oli has blamed India for the spread of coronavirus cases in his country.

"Those who are coming from India through illegal channels are spreading the virus in the country and some local representatives and party leaders are responsible for bringing in people from India without proper testing," the Nepal PM was quoted as saying by NDTV.

"It has become very difficult to contain COVID-19 due to the flow of people from outside. Indian virus looks more lethal than Chinese and Italian now. More are getting infected," he further said outraging officials in India.

The offensive comes as India and Nepal are engulfed in a diplomatic war over a disputed border area. The tensions erupted when India inaugurated a road link connecting Kailash Mansarovar, a holy pilgrimage site situated at Tibet, China, that passes through the territory which Nepal claims its own.

Nepal's Cabinet had on Tuesday endorsed a new political map showing Lipulekh, Kalapani and Limpiyadhura under its territory.

Taiwan says no to 'one country, two systems'

China says 'reunification' inevitable

Taiwan cannot accept becoming part of China under its "one country, two systems" offer of autonomy, President Tsai Ing-wen said yesterday, strongly rejecting China's sovereignty claims and likely setting the stage for an ever-worsening of ties.

China responded that "reunification" was inevitable and that it would never tolerate Taiwan's independence.

In a speech after being sworn in for her second and final term in office, Tsai said relations between Taiwan and China had reached an historical turning point.

"Both sides have a duty to find a way to coexist over the long term and prevent the intensification of antagonism and differences," she said.

Tsai and her Democratic Progressive Party won January's presidential and parliamentary elections by a landslide, vowing to stand up to China, which claims Taiwan as its own

and says it would be brought under Beijing's control by force if needed.

"Here, I want to reiterate the words 'peace, parity, democracy, and dialogue'. We will not accept the Beijing authorities' use of 'one country, two systems' to downgrade Taiwan and undermine the cross-strait status quo. We stand fast by this principle," Tsai said.

China's Taiwan Affairs Office, responding to Tsai, said Beijing would stick to "one country, two systems".

"Reunification is a historical inevitability of the great rejuvenation of the Chinese nation," it said. "We have the firm will, full confidence, and sufficient ability to defend national sovereignty and territorial integrity."

Taiwan has become a rising source of friction between China and the United States, with the Trump administration strongly backing Taiwan even in the absence of formal diplomatic ties.

60m people risk extreme poverty Warns World Bank over pandemic

The head of the World Bank has warned that the coronavirus crisis threatens to push some 60 million people into extreme poverty, wiping out the gains made over the past three years.

The global lending institution is already financing aid programs in 100 countries, under its commitment to spend \$160 billion over the next 15 months, bank president David Malpass said Tuesday.

Malpass said the bank anticipates a five percent contraction in the world economy this year, with severe effects on the poorest countries.

"Our estimate is that up to 60 million people will be pushed into extreme poverty, erasing all the progress made in poverty alleviation in the past three years, and our forecasts indicate a deep recession," Malpass said.

But Malpass stressed that the World Bank's efforts alone were insufficient, and urged donor nations to step up bilateral aid to poorer countries to ensure a durable recovery.

He said restoring the flow of remittance payments and tourism -- key sources of income for developing countries -- would be "critical steps in the reopening."

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
