UNO in CHT leases khas land illegally

The upazila nirbahi officer of Ramgarh upazila in Khagrachhari allegedly misused his power to lease five acres of khas land illegally for a personal project.

Ramgarh UNO ANM Badruddoza's actions went viral recently on social media where it was revealed that he, on behalf of a cooperative, took lease of 18 acres of land in the upazila -- including five acres of khas land -- for a period

"Since 2003, khas land settlement for personal interest was completely stopped in Chattogram Hill Tracts following a circular of the CHT affairs ministry," said Pratap Chandra Biswas, deputy commissioner of Khagrachhari district.

Contacted, UNO Badruddoza said, "We took 18 acres of land, including five acres of khas land, from locals in the area in the name of Friends Fund Shomobay Samity for 30 years on April 1 this year.

"I am a member of the Samity and the other fourteen members are my friends."

Badruddoza, a BCS cadre from the 29th BCS, joined his current posting in Khagrachhari on February 23 this year, according to the local government website.

He took the lease at Tk 10 lakh, according to the documents obtained by this newspaper. The UNO also allegedly installed a government solar-

powered panel for his personal use and levelled a hill to make a road on the land last month.

Md Saiful Islam, a local journalist who visited the site, said, "The UNO razed a hill with an excavator around a month ago and had been using a government solar-

5 officials of correction centre held

Superintendent suspended over killing of 3 boys

Police arrested five people, including Abdullah Al superintendent Masud, of the Jashore juvenile correction centre, on Friday night in connection with the incident of torturing three boys of the centre to death.

The four other arrestees are Masum Billah, assistant superintendent, Mushfikur Rahman, psychosocial counsellor, and physical instructors Shahanur and Omar Faruk, police said.

On Friday, police took 10 people, including several officials and inmates of the correction centre, in custody for interrogation.

Of the 10, five were arrested as police primarily found their involvement in the murder, said Hossain, superintendent

Russia makes first batch of vaccine

Says report as US developing virus strain for human 'challenge' trials

Russia has produced the first batch of its new vaccine for Covid-19, the Interfax news agency quoted the health ministry as saying yesterday, hours after the ministry reported the start of manufacturing.

President Vladimir Putin on Tuesday announced it had been first in the world to approve a vaccine. But the announcement was met with caution from scientists and the World Health Organization who said it still needed a rigorous safety review.

The first batch of the novel coronavirus vaccine developed by the Gamaleya research institute has been produced," the health ministry said in a statement quoted by Russian news agencies.

Putin said the vaccine was safe and that one of his own daughters had been inoculated, though clinical trials were not yet complete and final stage testing involving more than 2,000 people only started this week.

Bangabandhu is improving satisfactorily In London, according to a health bulletin issued by his personal

physician. Despite weakness the prime minister is meeting his visitors and taking interest in various issues of national interest. He spent a very busy day today. Among those who called on him today are Indian Foreign Secretary TN Kaul,

Secretary General of Amnesty International Martin Ennals and President of Bangladesh National League Ataur Rahman Khan. The prime minister is expected to receive some more British ministers before he leaves for Switzerland.

Bangladeshis arrested in Malaysia

Malaysian Immigration Department has reportedly busted a "document forgery" ring and nabbed four of its members, including three Bangladeshi men.

One of the Bangladeshis, aged 39, was claimed to be the "mastermind" of the ring, who would earn between RM 8,000 and RM 10,000 a month from the forged documents.

The syndicate was crippled following two months of surveillance.

Malaysian Englishlanguage daily The Star vesterday ran a report on its online version on the incident, after the country's national news agency Bernama ran a similar report on Friday.

Grey reef sharks form long-term friendships

Sharks have a reputation for being heartless killers, but at least one species forms long-lasting "friendships," scientists have discovered.

Grey reef sharks are swift, large-eyed predators that frequent coral reefs in the Pacific and Indian Oceans.

They often head out to the open water at night to hunt. But during the day, they return to the same spot on their reef, congregating in clusters of up to 20 individuals.

To study this social behaviour, marine biologists at Florida International University tagged 41 grey reef sharks near the Palmyra Atoll, a remote Pacific island more than 1,000 miles from the coast of Hawaii.

2nd virus wave threatens Europe

S Korea reports spike in cases as NY museums, galleries to reopen from Aug 24

British holidaymakers returning home from parts of Europe began having to quarantine under new restrictions yesterday, as a second wave of virus infections threatened

more disruption and economic chaos on the continent. The UK opted to remove France, the Netherlands, Malta and several other countries from its list of places exempt from self-isolation rules, sparking a rush for plane, train and ferry tickets by Britons desperate to get back before the 0300 GMT change.

All travellers arriving from the three countries -- as well as Monaco, and Caribbean island states Turks & Caicos and Aruba -- after the deadline must quarantine for 14 days.

French student Antoine, 23, cut short his holiday to rush back to Bristol, in southwestern England, where he

"I'm a waiter in a small cafe near college, I can't afford to spend 14 days in the house," he said at London's St Pancras railway station after arriving on a Eurostar train.

in China late last year and has so far infected over 21 million people and killed more than 766,000 globally. French authorities have reported more than 2,500 new cases on each of the past three days -- levels not seen since

France is facing a resurgence of the disease that emerged

Meanwhile Germany added most of Spain -- where cases have also surged in recent weeks -- to its list of regions from where arrivals must show a negative Covid-19 test or quarantine for two weeks.
