

Twice as many men use cellphone than women

Says study by ActionAid and Sanem

Eighty percent of male youth in rural and urban areas have their own mobile phones, whereas only 40 percent of the female youth do so. On the other hand, only six percent of households have access to computers and less than four percent of women have ever used a computer.

The findings were revealed at a webinar titled “Gender and Youth Inclusiveness in Technology in Bangladesh,” which was jointly organised by South Asian Network on Economic Modeling (Sanem) and ActionAid Bangladesh. The paper was presented by Mahtab Uddin, research economist of Sanem. Prof Selim Raihan and Sakil Ahmmed were co-authors for this paper.

He pointed out that in case of access to computers, Bangladesh lags behind other South Asian countries. Fifty percent urban households have computers while the ratio falls to 30 percent in rural areas, while only 10 percent of women have ever used the

internet.

He also said that 24 percent of the females from the poorest income decile own mobile phones, while the rate is 73 percent for the richest income decile. On the other hand 72 percent of male youths from households in the poorest income decile own a mobile phone compared to the 92 percent in the top income decile.

“It is evident that the male-female gap is 44 percentage points in the poorest income decile and 19 percentage points in the richest income decile,” said Mahtab Uddin.

Chief guest of the program, Deputy Minister of Education Mohibul Hassan Chowdhury said that gender discrimination in technology is often a result of patriarchal and conservative culture.

“When women use technology they often have to face stigma and digital harassment, without a change in [people’s] mentality it would be difficult to overcome this discrimination,” he said. Acknowledging the growing spread of fundamentalist, misogynistic and anti-Liberation War ideas

online, he called on all to work together to overcome the stigmas and uphold social values and tolerance.

Anir Chowdhury, policy adviser of a2i, shared findings from a2i’s research and explained that despite efforts from the government to spread education through digital platforms, it has been difficult to include certain demographics such as low-income groups, women, persons with disabilities, displaced people and people in remote areas.

The webinar was chaired by ActionAid Country Director Farah Kabir and moderated by Research Director of Sanem, Prof Sayema Haque Bidisha. Special remarks were delivered by Prof Selim Raihan, Executive Director of Sanem. Joint Secretary (technical) of Education Ministry Ayatul Islam; Deputy Secretary of Youth and Sports Ministry Md Sayed Ali, and Senior Vice President of Bangladesh Association of Software and Information Services (BASIS) Farhana Rahman were also present.

Nirapotta Jote. She stressed that women should step out of the attitude of accepting violence in the pandemic, and there should be a massive campaign that establishes violence against women as a serious offence. “It can’t be a normal incident that someone is beating his wife just because he is hungry or has things to worry about,” she said.

Shehla Pervin, additional inspector general of police and joint secretary of Bangladesh Police Women Network said since many women are not being able to reach police stations for making a complaint amid the pandemic, they can seek help using the helpline 999.

“Besides, there are also apps like BD Police Helpline and Hello CT, through which the women can send audio and video messages to ask for help,” she said.

Shehla also urged victims of violence to not settle the cases out of court.

Speaking as chief guest, lawmaker Meher Afroze Chumki, also president of the Parliamentary Standing Committee on the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs, said if a strong committee can be formed in

every upazila, consisting of representatives of organisations working for women’s rights, ministry officials, representatives of union parishad (female UP members and vice-chairperson), women can get support from them, without the hassle of going to multiple agencies or organisations.

“They can also contact over phone and the members will visit their homes,” she added.

Md Shawkat Hossain, additional district and sessions judge at a Shariatpur court, stressed on increasing the budget and logistical support of the judiciary in order to ensure proper justice and speedy trial. He also suggested that police should keep a database of the sexual offender like other developed countries, as history says child molesters do this type of crime repeatedly.

MB Akhter, co-chair at WE Can; Afroza Mahal, Dhaka and country portfolio manager at Plan International Bangladesh; Nasimun Ara Haque Minu, president, Centre for Women Journalists and survivors of violence spoke at the event as well.

Zinat Ara Haque, executive coordinator of We Can, moderated the webinar.

Bazar Bandhu supports flood victims

Bazar Bandhu, a micro-merchant project run by ekShop and Synesis IT, has raised fund and relief for distribution among flood victims, says a press release.

A woman said she heard from a rickshaw-puller that he got Tk 50,000. “While urinating on the sewer bank, the rickshaw-puller noticed money flowing in the drain,” she said. “I came here to see it with my own eyes after hearing it directly from him.”

Nibaran Chandra Barman, officer-in-charge of Boalia Police Station, said they have looked into the matter, but did not take any action as the area was out of their jurisdiction.

The railway police avoided the incident too. OC Shah Kamal of railway police said since the location of the sewer is outside the railway boundary, they took no action in spite of being informed of it.

Even though he is not certain, Road Transport Owners Group’s Matuil referred to an old incident and said the money might have something to do with it.

Three years ago, Bipul, an employee of the organisation, lost about Tk 2.5 lakh belonging to a bus owner. He kept the money inside his desk drawer at the group’s office, but later said he couldn’t find it.

Bipul is still repaying the lost money to the bus owner from his salary. The group has also given him a grant of Tk 1 lakh to complete the repayment. But whereabouts of the money remained unknown, he added.

“We think that the person who took the money hid it in the pile of paper. But our office was under CCTV camera network and no one dared to go there, get the money, and get out. When the papers were dumped in the drain, the money might have gone along with them,” said Matuil.

However, Matuil said the total money collected by locals would not be more than Tk 3,000.

Asked whether sharing photo or videos of the project was causing any problem, he said, “Yes, this is causing some problems.”

Many people are posting on social media or uploading video on YouTube mixing some true and false information regarding the project, he said.

“We have asked our officials not to share photo or document on social media,” he said.


Construction of the Padma Bridge started in November 2014 to connect the country’s southwestern region with the capital through road and rail links.

The current deadline of the project is June 2021. The project cost rose to Tk 30,193 crore following several revisions of deadline.

The current deadline is going to be deferred further due to the Covid-19 pandemic and strong current in Padma, officials said. The overall progress of the project was around 80 percent till June this year.

Once opened, the 6.15km-long bridge will connect the capital with 21 southern districts. It is expected to boost the country’s gross domestic product by 1.2 percent.

and are now being detained in Kashimpur jail, allegedly for violation of Section 54 of the Code of Criminal Procedure.

Most of them were previously arrested in the host countries for committing administrative infractions such as overstay of visa or work permit, or petty crimes, they said.

Thereafter, they all obtained state pardon in the host countries after serving at least two-thirds of their sentences, they added.

“If these 225 returned Bangladeshi migrant workers are being detained solely for ‘suspicious acts’ during their period of quarantine and ‘for tarnishing the image of the country’ for acts they committed in Qatar, Kuwait and Bahrain, and for which reason they were charged, imprisoned, and subsequently pardoned by those states, we... would like to appeal to the government of Bangladesh to immediately cause the release from imprisonment of these 225 returned Bangladeshi migrant workers for they have not committed any new crime,” they said in the statement.

The organisations said the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) Guidance for Covid-19 highlights that states should urgently explore options for release and alternatives to detention to mitigate the risk of harm within places of detention.

Besides, as one of the country signatories to the International Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Members of Their Families, the Bangladesh government is duty bound to protect the human rights of migrant workers and members of their families, they further said.

Lawyers Beyond Borders is an international network of legal experts interested in advocating for the rights of migrant workers, brought together by Migrant Forum in Asia.

After his Namaz-e-Janaza took place at Gulshan Azad Mosque post-Asr prayers, he was buried at the Mirpur Martyred Intellectuals Graveyard. He left behind his wife, a daughter and a son, and a host of fans and well-wishers.

Born in Rajshahi on September 9, 1958, Mrinal Haque was best known for making murals on the streets of Dhaka. He immigrated to USA in 1995, and began his sculpting career there. He returned to the country in 2002, and settled here permanently.

The sculptor built the Balaka sculpture in Motiheel on his own initiative. The Golden Jubilee Tower, built on the golden jubilee of Rajshahi University in 2003, is one of his best works of art.

Besides, he has done a plethora of sculptures all over the country, including Ratnadwip in front of the Prime Minister’s office in Dhaka, Rajsik in front of Hotel Sheraton, Janani O Gorbato Bornomala at Paribagh, Kotwal at Eskaton and Mayur at Satrasta. He is also the creator of various other sculptures including Atolantike Boshoti at the Navy Headquarters, Arghyo at Science Laboratory, and more.

State Minister for Cultural Affairs KM Khalid, MP has expressed his condolences at the death of Mrinal Haque.
