Hackers steal vaccine data in Europe

US tops 3,000 daily death mark;
Japan Covid cases hit daily record

US drugmaker Pfizer and its German partner BioNTech said on Wednesday that documents related to development of their Covid-19 vaccine had been "unlawfully accessed" in a cyberattack on Europe's medicines regulator.

The European Medicines Agency (EMA), which assesses medicines and vaccines for the European Union, said hours earlier it had been targeted in a cyberattack. It gave no further details.

Pfizer and BioNTech said they did not believe any personal data of trial participants had been compromised and EMA "has assured us that the cyber attack will have no impact on the timeline for its review."

It was not immediately clear when or how the attack took place, who was responsible or what other information may have been compromised.

The two companies said they had been informed by the EMA "that the agency has been subject to a cyber attack and that some documents relating to the regulatory submission for Pfizer and BioNTech's Covid-19 vaccine candidate" had been viewed.

Such documents could be extremely valuable to other countries and companies rushing to develop vaccines, experts said.

"When it comes to the data submitted to these kinds of

TK 148.41Cr GRAFT CASE HC rejects bail to MP Shahid's wife, daughter

The High Court yesterday rejected the bail petition of lawmaker Mohammad Shahid Islam's wife Selina Islam MP and their daughter Wafa Islam in a corruption case involving Tk 148.41 crore.

The court also ordered Selina, a lawmaker from reserved seats, and Wafa to surrender before the trial court concerned within 10 days in connection with the case.

The HC bench of Justice Md Nazrul Islam Talukder and Justice Ahmed Sohel came up with the order after virtually hearing their petition.

Lawyers Abdul Baset Majumdar and Sayeed Ahmed Raza appeared for the accused petitioners, while lawyer Khurshid Alam Khan argued for the Anti-Corruption Commission and Deputy Attorney General AKM Amin Uddin Manik

Dr Nurul Islam, deputy chairman of the planning commission, discloses today that the draft outline of the first five-year plan

would be announced by the middle of 1973 and different working groups are now working to prepare the outline. AutoX, an Alibaba (BABA)-backed startup, announced it had rolled out fully driverless robotaxis on public roads in Shenzhen. The company said it had become the first player in China to do so, nothing an important industry milestone.

HC grants
1-yr bail to
rape convict

*He married victim in
jail as per court-set
term for getting bail*

The High Court yesterday granted one-year conditional bail to a rape convict after eight years of his imprisonment as he married the victim in line with the court's directive.

The verdict read that the bail shall stand cancelled if convict Dilip Khalo denies the victim as wife during their conjugal and family life in this one year, said Deputy Attorney General Sarwar Hossain Bappi.

Dilip married the victim at the jail gate in Rajshahi following the court's directives.

The HC bench of Justice M Enayetur Rahim and Justice Mohammad Mostafizur Rahman came up with the order after examining documents sent by the Rajshahi jail authorities that confirmed Dilip married the victim on December 5, the deputy attorney general said.

On October 22, after hearing a bail petition of Dilip, the HC bench issued a condition that he would be granted bail in the case if he married the victim.

The bench also asked the Rajshahi jail authorities to arrange the marriage at jail gate if the convict agrees to marry the victim.

The court also asked the jail authorities to submit a report after complying the order within a month of the marriage, the deputy attorney general added.

Dilip was previously sentenced with a life imprisonment.
