



UK enters new era

Exits EU single market

Britain yesterday began a new year and life outside the European Union after leaving the bloc's single market, with the first trucks crossing the Channel by ferry and rail reporting largely plain sailing despite new customs rules.

Brexit, which has dominated politics on both sides of the Channel since 2016, became reality an hour before midnight on Thursday, ending the United Kingdom's 48year obligation to follow Brussels' rules.

Free movement of over 500 million people between Britain and the 27 EU states ended.

More rigorous customs checks returned for the first time in decades, despite the hard-fought brokering of a tariffand quota-free trade deal.

But the approach to key port Dover, where ferries to and from northern France dock, was quiet as dawn broke.

"It's good to see the port's done its job and there's no backlog," said Alan Leigh, 52, of nearby Folkestone, taking an early morning stroll on the cliffs above Dover's docks.

Scores of heavy goods vehicles also passed through the Channel Tunnel connecting Britain and France by train "without any problem" early yesterday, its operator said. However, the British government, which is implementing

a phased introduction of checks, expects next week to be the true test, once the quiet holiday period is over.

New Year's Day newspapers reflected the historic but still deeply divisive change, which will have repercussions for generations to come.

The front-page photograph on the pro-Brexit Daily Express showed the White Cliffs of Dover -- an enduring symbol of Britishness -- with "Freedom" written on a Union flag.

Rohingya Lensman 51 eminent citizens call for release STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Fifty-one academics, human rights activists and lawyers have issued a statement demanding the release of Rohingya photographer Abul Kalam, who they claim was sent to jail on Thursday for taking photos of buses departing Kutupalong for Bhasan Char.

According to copies of court documents The Daily Star has obtained, Kalam was produced before the Senior Judicial Magistrate Court at Ukhiya of Cox's Bazar, and charged with a case filed following an incident that took place on May 28, 2020.

One of the signatories to the statement, Dr CR Abrar, said Kalam was sent to Cox's Bazar District Jail by the magistrate on Thursday. The Daily Star has not been able to independently verify from court sources if Kalam was sent to jail.

The poor suffer as cold wave sweeps North

Lowest temperature recorded at 7.6 degrees Celsius in Tentulia

Though the number of daily tests increased, a fall in the total number of coronavirus cases was seen in December compared to the previous month. In December, 4, 54,897 tests were done and 48,578

of them were Covid-19

positive. Some 4,36,439 tests were carried out in November and 57,248 of those were posit With the arrival of winter, Covid-19 positive cases started going up in the country. However, the death toll from the virus rose last month. In November, the death toll was 721, while the figure was 915 last month, according to the daily reports of Directorate General of Health Services. Alongside the drop in the number of total

'Justice will be served'

Iran says Qasem Soleimani killers 'not safe on Earth'

Iran's judiciary chief yesterday warned that Qasem Soleimani's killers will "not be safe on Earth", as the Islamic republic began marking the first anniversary of the top general's assassination in a US strike.

Ebrahim Raisi, speaking at an event in Tehran to pay tribute to Soleimani, said not even US President Donald Trump, who ordered the strike, was "immune from justice".

Soleimani was killed in a US drone strike at Baghdad airport on January 3, ratcheting up tensions between decades-old arch foes the United States and Iran.

"They will witness a severe revenge. What has come so far has only been glimpses" of it, Raisi told the gathering at Tehran University.

"Do not presume that someone, as the president of America, who appeared as a murderer or ordered a murder, may be immune from justice being carried out. Never," he said.

"Those who had a role in this in this assassination and crime will not be safe on Earth."

The event was attended by Iranian officials, and speakers included representatives from allied regional countries and forces, namely Syria, Iraq, Lebanon, and Yemen.

A separate event is expected to be held in the coming days in Kerman, Soleimani's hometown where he is buried.

Soleimani headed the Quds force, the foreign operations arm of the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps.

Top Iranian authorities, including supreme leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, had previously said that all those involved in his killing would face retribution.

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
