Bagerhat farmer dreams big with colourful fish farming

Fish farmer Hafizur Rahman of Bagerhat Sadar upazila has found success in producing colourful tilapia and Ruposhi Rui at his fish farm.

High demand in the area has produced sales of around 50 thousand pieces of the two fish varieties over the last couple of years.

Hafizur's 17-year-old fish farm 'Naim Fish Farm' -- situated on two acres of land in Sundarghona-Kanthaltala village -- has earned a good reputation among fish farmers in nearby districts -- including Bagerhat, Pirojpur and Khulna -- for producing quality larvae of popular fish species such as Koi, Shing, Magur, Gulisha, Pabda and Vietnamese pangas.

Gaining confidence from his experience at the farm, Hafizur collected larvae of colourful tilapia and Ruposhi Rui from fisheries department at Mymensingh

Agricultural University two years back. Within a year, he succeeded in rearing the two fish at his farm.

The two colourful fish can be profitable for a fish farm as they sell well in all stages and sizes. People buy the smaller ones for displaying them in aquariums or fish tanks, while the larger ones for consumption, Hafizur said.

Both the fish grow as much as one kilogram every year and not only they look more attractive than the regular varieties, they taste better too, he also said.

The colourful tilapia even spawns in the pond and the offspring grow well naturally in the pond.

On the other hand, Ruposhi Rui, with its origin in Australia and a bright golden outer coat, grows well with other fish in the same pond. Its demand as aquarium fish indoors or decorative fish in large fish tanks outdoors is high and each kg of it sells for

between Tk 300 and Tk 500, Hafizur also said.

He hopes to increase production of the colourful tilapia and Ruposhi Rui by next year when he will be able to sell each small fry of colourful tilapia for Tk 3 and Ruposhi Rui for Tk 10.

If supply of quality fish feed is ensured in the area and financial support provided to farmers, there is a good prospect in earning revenues from overseas through export of the two fish varieties after meeting local demands, Hafizur added.

Contacted, Ferdous Ansari, senior upazila fisheries officer in Bagerhat Sadar, said while they mostly concentrate on providing assistance to conventional fish farmers, they were also trying to develop a market system where unconventional fish farms would be able to eliminate intermediaries and sell their fish to end customers.

Where radio still a culture

Radio has played an active role during the Liberation War. Bangladesh Betar was the only means that time to transmit a message. But nowadays a few people are seen listening to radio in the arena of technology. Most of those who still listen to the radio are pre-independence generations.

Many people still have to keep radio as traditional culture. They have formed a radio listeners' club named Malibari Radio Listeners' Club at their village Malibari in Panchagram union of Lalmonirhat Sadar upazila. The club has 50 members.

The club has been formed by the elders in this village. Each of the club members has a radio at home. When they get time, they come to the club with radio to hang-out.

Panir Uddin, 75, president of Malibari Radio Listeners' Club, said he set up the first radio listeners' club in the village after independence. Its activities remained halted for some years.

Again in 2008, he formed the Radio Listeners' Club and registered it with Rangpur Radio Station, he said, adding that their club is doing well at present.

He also added that the members of Malibari Radio Listeners' Club feel comfortable listening to agricultural and health related programmes. They also love to listen to Rangpur region's interesting folk songs-- Bhawaiya.

Their culture is intertwined with radio, said Panir.

Mantosh Chandra Roy, 66, general secretary of the club, said there is no radio listeners' club anywhere in Lalmonirhat. It is only in their village. Each of the members of the club has a radio at home.

"Usually radio is not available in the market and there is no radio makers like before. So, we have to face trouble while buying new radio or repair it," he said, adding that "All the members of our radio listeners' club are over 60 years of age."

Freedom fighter Maqbool Hossain, 69, a member of the club, said "Radio played an important role in the country's great Liberation War. It was the preferred means of communication for our forces at that period."

Asma Begum, 63, a member of the club, said women are also members of the club. They come here and listen to the radio. Women also listen to agricultural programmes to help their families.

After the case was filed yesterday, police arrested the three accused from different places of Bogura Sadar upazila, said SI Sohel Rana of the sadar police station, who is the investigation officer of the case.

Indonesian 737 crashes into sea

2018, killing all 189 people aboard the Lion Air flight. Older 737 models are widely flown and do not have the system implicated in the MAX safety crisis.

A Boeing spokeswoman said, "We are aware of media reports from Jakarta, and are closely monitoring the situation. We are working to gather more information."

Reliable tracking service Flightradar24 said the Boeing jet took off at 2:36pm local time (07:36 GMT) and climbed to reach 10,900 feet within four minutes. It then began a steep descent and stopped transmitting data 21 seconds later.

A transport ministry spokeswoman said air traffic control at Soekarno-Hatta International Airport had asked the pilot why the plane was heading northwest instead of on its expected flight path just seconds before it disappeared.

There were no immediate clues on what may have caused the sudden descent and safety experts stress most air accidents are caused by a cocktail of factors that can take months to establish.

DISTRAUGHT RELATIVES

Indonesian television channels showed pictures of suspected wreckage.

"We found some cables, a piece of jeans, and pieces of metal on the water," Zulkifli, a security official, told CNNIndonesia.com.

Distraught relatives waited at Pontianak, around 740 km (460 miles) from Jakarta.

Yaman Zai, a father of three children who were aboard the plane with their mother, said that he was at the airport in Pontianak waiting for them, when he heard the news.

"I will never meet her again," he said, holding up a photo of his oldest daughter.

Indonesia's KNKT safety agency was expected to launch an immediate investigation. The US National Safety Transportation Board will automatically be part of the probe, since the plane was designed and built in the United States.

Founded in 2003, Jakarta-based Sriwijaya Air group flies largely within Indonesia. The airline has a solid safety record until now, with no onboard casualties in four incidents recorded on the Aviation Safety Network database.

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political circles with some of his recent remarks, is also contesting the municipality polls, slated for January 16, with an AL ticket.

"A lawmaker from Gopalganj has termed me insane. He is a former minister. But he was not made a minister this time because he was involved in different irregularities," said Mirza.

"Besides, another leader from Kushtia said I do not act responsibly. But what have you been doing while criminals vandalised the statue in Kushtia?"

Mirza also claimed that Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina was "helpless" because "there is an international conspiracy to kill her. Besides, fundamentalists and communalists are hatching conspiracies inside the country. Sheikh Hasina alone is resisting the conspiracies."

Flatterers and corrupt people are misguiding Hasina round the clock, he claimed.

Mirza then said some people brought illegal firearms to his municipality to cause violence during the election.

"A consignment of arms has arrived in Kabirhat of Noakhali from Chatogram. I have informed the deputy commissioner and superintendent of police of Noakhali. But they did not pay any heed to it ... If there is violence during the polls, the DC

and SP will have to take the responsibilities."

He then urged voters to resist voting irregularities. "You will cast your vote. If anyone tries to stop you from going to the voting centre, break his leg. I will take the responsibilities."

Unveiling his election manifesto on December 31 last year, he brought allegations against some local lawmakers and AL leaders of corruption, tender manipulation, and recruitment scams.

He claimed that the district AL committee was formed, excluding the party's devoted and tested leaders.

"With regret, I want to say some sycophants often claim that the BNP's bastions in Noakhali and Laxmipur have been destroyed because of certain leaders.

"Have the BNP's bastions really been destroyed? If elections were held in a fair manner, our MPs, except for the ones in three or four constituencies in greater Noakhali, would not have found ways to flee. That's the truth," he had said.

Mirza's remarks have put the AL top brass in an awkward position. Cashing in on the situation, BNP leaders said Mirza's remarks proved that the government has been deceiving people, using the Election Commission.

Bangabandhu's homecoming

Delhi on January 10 in 1972, after 290 days of confinement in Pakistan jail.

The Homecoming Day of Bangabandhu this year came with an extra significance as it coincided with Father of the Nation's birth centenary celebrations, just three months ahead of the golden jubilee of the country's independence.

All programmes marking the day this year will be observed maintaining health guidelines in face of the global pandemic coronavirus.

On the night of March 25, 1971, Pakistan army arrested Bangabandhu from his Dhanmondi residence and sent him to a West Pakistani jail the following day.

Bangabandhu was subjected to inhuman torture in the Pakistan jail where he had been counting moments for the execution of his death sentence that was pronounced in a farcical trial.

"I was a prisoner in the condemned cell awaiting hanging. From the day I went into jail, I didn't know whether I was to live or not. I was mentally ready to die. But I knew Bangladesh would be liberated," Bangabandhu spoke emotionally about his ordeal in Pakistani prison at a news conference in London.

On the Pakistani army's slaughter of Bengalis, Mujib declared, "If Hitler could have been alive today, he would be ashamed."

Earlier on March 26 in 1971, Bangabandhu

proclaimed independence of Bangladesh and urged people from all walks of life to participate wholeheartedly in the nation's War of Liberation.

Immediately after the proclamation of independence, Bangabandhu was arrested by Pakistani military junta and then flown to West Pakistan to keep him in prison there.

Though the final victory in the nine-month-long Liberation War was achieved defeating Pakistani occupation forces on December 16 in 1971, the nation's expectations were fulfilled and the people got the real taste of victory with the homecoming of Bangabandhu on January 10, 1972.

On reaching the capital's Tejgaon airport in the afternoon on January 10, Bangabandhu was greeted by tens of thousands of jubilant people who had been eagerly waiting to see their beloved leader since the final victory on December 16 in 1971.

From airport, Bangabandhu was moved to the Racecourse Maidan (now Suhrawardy Udyan) where he addressed a spontaneous reception accorded to him by the cheerful countrymen believed to be one million.

He recalled with respect the contribution of all during the war and urged the people to rebuild the war-ravaged country.

Bangabandhu took oath of office as the country's prime minister on January 12, 1972.
