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Faridpur man bounces back even after losing both arms

Even after losing both his arms in an accident, Kamrul Sheikh, 34, used the sheer power of will and determination to bounce back and change his own fate.

A resident of Faridpur's Sadar upazila, Kamrul is married with two children – a son and a daughter.

From a poverty-stricken family, he was only able to complete primary education, after which he began working to support his family. He would sometimes work as a carpenter, sometimes a rickshaw-puller, an electrician, or a day-labourer.

On August 15, 2018, while working as an electrician at the district's Khaleq Bazar area, Kamrul was electrocuted and lost both his arms in the accident.

"I climbed up an electric pole and set my ladder near the electric wires. I was repairing a faulty line. That is about as much as I can remember. When I regained my senses, I found myself on a hospital bed," said Kamrul.

From a local hospital, he was shifted to the burn unit of Dhaka Medical College and Hospital (DMCH), where he underwent treatment for around a month and half.

"Both my arms were badly damaged. They had to be amputated within three days of my admission [to DMCH]," Kamrul said.

"After the accident, my entire family was in financial trouble. The West Zone Power Distribution Company gave me Tk 2 lakh as compensation. I bought four rickshaws with that money and rented them out.

"But the income was not sufficient and I was getting worried. One day, a friend of mine, Lutfar Khalasi, suggested that I meet a man named Jashim, who, like me, does not have either of his arms but runs a shop himself."

Kamrul met Jashim and learned some techniques to work. "I sold my four rickshaws and opened up a grocery shop -- Zihad Varieties Store -- in

Earlier on Sunday, the same court allowed police to conduct DNA tests on Dihan, 18, and the victim's bloodstained clothes, following two petitions submitted by the IO.

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DEPORTATION FROM FRANCE

Bangladeshi averts it thru' pollution plea

In a rare case, a Bangladeshi man with asthma has prevented a deportation bid by the French authorities, arguing that he risked a severe deterioration in his condition, and possibly premature death, due to the dangerous levels of pollution in Bangladesh.

In a ruling believed to be the first of its kind in France, the appeals court in Bordeaux overturned an expulsion order against the 40-year-old man, reported The Guardian Tuesday.

"To my knowledge, this is the first time a French court has applied the environment as one of its criteria in such a case," the unnamed man's lawyer, Ludovic Riviere, said. "It decided my client's life would be endangered by the air quality in Bangladesh."

Yale and Columbia universities' Environmental Performance Index ranks Bangladesh 179th in the world for air quality in 2020, while the concentration of fine particles in the air is six times the World Health Organization's recommended maximum.

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Trump faces second impeachment move

House okays resolution calling to remove president despite Pence rejecting 25th Amendment push

A defiant Donald Trump rejected blame Tuesday for a deadly assault on Congress by his supporters, but cracks emerged in the president's Republican support with several now backing his removal on the eve of an all-but-certain historic second impeachment.

Vice President Mike Pence gave the besieged Trump a lifeline by saying he would not invoke the 25th Amendment that allows him and the Cabinet to strip a sitting president of his powers.

"I do not believe that such a course of action is in the best interest of our nation," Pence wrote in a letter to House Speaker Nancy Pelosi.

The House of Representatives delivered a stinging rebuke to Trump anyway, voting almost entirely along party lines to call on Pence to take action and remove the president.

But with the 25th Amendment avenue dead in the water, an impeachment of Trump later yesterday appeared virtually assured.

Pelosi quickly announced her managers for the process, and a House impeachment vote has been scheduled for roughly 3:00 pm (2000 GMT).

The single charge of "incitement of insurrection" -- over Trump's January 6 speech in which he claimed he was the real winner of the November election, then urged supporters to march on Congress and "fight" -- is all

All 22 accused denied bail, land in jail

A Dinajpur court yesterday rejected bail applications of 22 Barapukuria Coal Mining Company Limited (BCMCL) officials, including its six former managing directors, and sent them to jail in a case over the disappearance of 1.45 lakh tonnes of coal from the mine.

Special Judge Mahmudul Karim of the District and Sessions Judge's Court passed the order after the accused appeared before it seeking bail, said Court Inspector Israfil Hossain.

On July 24, 2018, Md Anisur Rahman, manager (admin) of BCMCL, filed the case with Parbatipur Police Station against 19 officials of the coal mine in Dinajpur. After investigation, the Anti-Corruption Commission pressed charges against 23 BCMCL officials, including seven MDs, over the coal

PK Halder's aide Abantika arrested

Placed on three-day remand in graft case

A Dhaka court yesterday placed Abantika Boral, an aide to PK Halder, on three-day remand in connection with a graft case.

The order was issued hours after Abantika was arrested in the capital's Dhanmondi around noon by a team of the Anti-Corruption Commission, said ACC Director (public relations) Pranab Kumar Bhattacharya.

The arrestee was first taken to the ACC office before being produced in the Senior Special Judge's Court.

On January 8 last year, the graft watchdog filed the case against Halder, former managing director of NRB Global Bank, over amassing about Tk 275 crore beyond his known sources of income.

Halder allegedly laundered over Tk 10,000 crore from four non-banking financial

SEWERS LINKED TO BURIGANGA

Wasa MD asked to inform HC about steps, plans

The High Court yesterday asked Dhaka Wasa to submit a report on what has been done to implement a 2011 order to stop dumping sewage in the Buriganga river.

The Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) was ordered by the court 10 years ago to seal off the drains and sewer pipes linked to the river.

The HC yesterday directed Dhaka Wasa Managing Director Taqsem A Khan to submit a report on what steps had been taken and what plans had been made to the court through swearing by an affidavit by January 21.

The HC bench of Justice Gobinda Chandra Tagore and Justice Mohammad Ullah passed the order during hearing a pending writ petition filed by rights organisation Human Rights and Peace for Bangladesh (HRPB) in May 2010, seeking necessary directives to seal of the drains and sewerage lines connected to the Buriganga and to save it from pollution.

Yesterday, the HC bench observed that Dhaka Wasa was very slow in implementing the 2011 directives.

At this pace, the directives will not be implemented and the pollution of the Buriganga will not stop, the HC bench said.

Earlier in the day, the MD of Dhaka Wasa submitted a compliance report to the HC through his lawyer Umme Salma, saying that the Wasa has sealed off several unauthorised sewerage lines in some areas of the capital, including Kalabagan and Palashi, and has handed over the responsibility of the canals to the city corporations.

Writ petitioner's lawyer Manzill Murshid told the HC

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
