



Because 'boys will be boys'

Rape is the easiest of all crimes and most probably the laxest too in our country.

It is never the rapist's fault, and it is safe to assume that he just has the urge to release himself, and the women, who are distastefully dressed in saris, or pants or burgas, are his game. After all, it is his animal urge and instinct over which he seemingly has no control. It is not his fault that he rapes, and then kills the woman, he must punish her because he is the dominant alpha.

It's almost a cool thing to do, the rapist believe, teaching women, the lowest of the low, a lesson. He must show them who rules; in his marital bed with his wife, with his girlfriend while having consent, even with the girl who sells her body every night for food and money.

He knows he is never considered a perpetrator; in fact, he is doing good to society by teaching these 'loose' women a lesson. Seemingly, it's his personal jihad



against obscenity. And he wins, because when he rapes a woman, the entire society is with him, it is of course the girl's fault to tease him by wearing tight shirts or hijabs.

In a report published in The Daily Star, it says according to Ain o Salish Kendra (ASK), at least 1,627 women were raped



and gang-raped across the country in 2020. Of them, 53 were killed after rape and 14 died by committing suicide. The number of rape victims was 1,413 in 2019, and 732 in 2018 — ASK mentioned in its 2020 annual

What can these Pritilata Brigade, or

banners like "Bangladesh against Rape and Injustice" do? Whenever the rapist commits this deed, few protest rallies are the only 'nuisance' talking against him. If by bad luck he is arrested, he gets out on bail, because it's no big deal to rape and kill a woman. Justice for the victims will never be served timely.

Manusher Jonno Foundation, in one of its recent studies, found that out of the 25 pending rape cases they were following during 2012 to 2017, among the 25 raped, three were physically and mentally challenged, four victims were children from the age group of 5 to 10, five children were between 11 and 15 years of age, 16 from the age group of 16 to 35.

About 20 of the rapists are out on bail, three of them are in jail, two of them are under the umbrella of influential people

and they remain scot free. The current situation of these cases is, most of them are in court under trial, four cases are inactive because of missing documents, and 20 of the accused are on bail. All the accused persons got bail within 24 hours to 15 days. As per law, police are bound to file charge sheet within 90 working days.

So, you see how easy it is the for rapist to commit this crime and go scot free.

In The Daily Star report, Taqbir Huda, research specialist at Bangladesh Legal Aid and Services Trust, who leads the Rape Law Reform Now Campaign, said "Whenever a rape gets reported, we see a large section of society normalising the crime and implying that the rape was almost inevitable.

"When you treat rape as inevitable by stretching the concept of 'boys will be boys,' you are essentially telling men and boys to go and rape a girl to death, because we'll always find a way to put the blame on her."

For these criminal mentality men, they believe it's their birth right to force a woman to subjugation, and raping her is just a way of ensuring it. And unfortunately, the majority of the society is somehow finding an excuse for the rapist, and blaming the victim.

Forcing yourself on a woman, even if you have consent for sex, is not a gentlemanly thing to do.

The perfect winter soups

After a whole year of scorching heat and suffocating humidity, winter is a season loved and welcomed by most. However, the negatives are those cold foggy mornings, the freezing cold tap water, the reluctance to get out from those warm beds, and coughs and colds.

We try to tackle the cold with layers of sweaters and jackets, scarves and fuzzy woollen socks, but nothing beats the cold like a steaming cup of tea or a piping hot bowl of soup. A bowl of delicious savoury soup will warm up your body and soul from the inside out, right down to those frozen toes.

I come from a family where everybody loves to cook, my late grandparents, my parents, and my siblings all have a passion for cooking. My childhood memory is filled with my father making different kinds of soups throughout the year, especially during winter.

Our house had an unbelievably long open veranda, with a garden at the front and a backyard. In the 1980s, there were only a handful of tall commercial buildings, which meant nothing blocked the sun, the rain or the wind. And cold draft blew throughout the house, through the gaps under the doors and froze everyone.

Back then, everyone sat together as a family and watched the programmes like *dharabahik natoks*, which aired on BTV, or a movie played on the VCR from a rented video cassette.

The electric heater was placed carefully



on the floor in a corner, away from hanging clothes and wooden furniture and us children were constantly warned not to touch the red hot glowing electric rods.

A tray filled with bowls of soup was passed around and we cradled our steaming bowls, warming up those frozen fingers, and let the delicious hot liquid warm us up right from the inside.

My father made all kinds of soups. Everyone had their own favourites. My favourite was, and still is, cream of chicken. He made it whenever I demanded or when I was sick because I would not eat anything else. Now, even though I'm all grown up and a mother of two, my father still makes cream of chicken soup for me during my pregnancies, or when I'm sick.

Another all-time family favourite was



cream of tomato soup. Back when cream did not come from a tin, and canned tomatoes were unheard of, my father made this soup from scratch, using fresh, good quality tomatoes that came out in winter and always served it with homemade croutons.

Nowadays, with all kinds of ingredients available, cooking has become so much easier, simpler and time saving. The recipes have evolved during transition from one generation to the next, the old ways embracing the new.

So, here is my take on my father's recipe of cream of chicken and cream of tomato soup.

Happy cooking everyone!

CREAM OF CHICKEN AND MUSHROOM Ingredients

- 1 cup boneless chicken (cut in cubes) ½ cup sliced mushrooms
- 2 tbsp finely chopped onions
- 2 tbsp butter
- 1 tbsp flour
- 250ml milk, thickened with powder milk
- 250ml hot water
- 2 tbsp oil
- 1 chicken cube Salt and pepper, to taste

Method

In a saucepan, add oil and sliced mushrooms. Cook till all the water released from the mushrooms have evaporated, and there's a slight golden colour. Add the onions and chicken, and cook, with a pinch of salt. Add the butter and stir till it melts completely. Add flour and stir. Cook the flour, along with the chicken and mushrooms, till it becomes light brown and fragrant.

Add the milk and simultaneously, stir vigorously. This will make a thick roux. Dissolve the chicken cube in the water and add. Add salt and pepper according to your taste. Serve with toast and butter.

Tip

If you find the flour has become too dry while frying, add more butter. Do not fry the flour till it's dark brown, this will change the taste of the soup, and you won't have a sweet silky cream base. Always be careful as flour burns quickly.

You can always use canned cream to make cream soup. In this case, eliminate the milk and cut down on the flour.

CREAM OF TOMATO SOUP Ingredients

500g tomatoes

- 2 tbsp finely chopped garlic
- 1 tbsp finely chopped onions
- 2 tbsp butter
- 1 tbsp flour
- 1 cup milk
- 2 tbsp oil
- 1 cups water Salt and pepper, according to taste

MethodIn a large saucepan add water, and bring

it to boil. Score crosses on the bottom of the tomatoes. In a large bowl, have ice water ready to use. Place the tomatoes in the pot of boiling water for 30 seconds to a minute, till the skin starts to peel back. Using a strainer transfer the tomatoes from the pot to the ice water.

Peal the tomatoes and chop into pieces. In a saucepan, add oil and garlic and fry till garlic is light brown and aromatic. Add onions and cook till translucent. Add the chopped tomatoes and cook till the raw taste and smell is completely gone. Take the cooked tomatoes off the heat and blend to make a smooth puree. In another clean saucepan, make roux with flour, butter and milk. (Detailed instructions are given in cream of chicken soup recipe).

Add the tomato puree. Cook till soup thickens to your preference. Add salt and pepper according to taste. Add water if required. Serve with croutons.

Tip

Always use tomatoes that are packed with flavour and bright in colour. The easier, hassle free way to make this soup is to use canned tomatoes, tomato paste or canned tomato puree. The garlic flavour should come through with the tomatoes. Taste, and add more garlic if needed. Instead of roux, you can add canned cream.

Banglapex 2020 – a haven for stamp collectors

The philatelic scene of Bangladesh is not hyped due to its lack of popularity among the general populace, but upon closer observation, one will realise that it is in fact abuzz with interesting events and activities. The most recent of which is Banglapex 2020 – the fourth national stamp exhibition that is currently being held virtually.

Organised by Bangladesh Philatelic Federation, the event was inaugurated on 19 December, 2020, by our Honourable Telecommunication Minister, Mustafa Jabbar. Although the official results had been published on 30 December, given its virtual nature, anyone can freely view the exhibition in the forthcoming months.

First held in 1984, followed by in 1992, and then after a lengthy gap again in 2019, this is the first virtual stamp exhibition of its kind to include a jury committee who assessed and awarded exhibitors accordingly. On this occasion, new stamps were issued, a first day cover and a special cover along with a couple of postmarks.

The jury consisted of seven members comprising both national and international jurors, who judged participants on the basis of presentation, rarity, knowledge, and condition, among various other criteria. Awards were distributed on various levels ranging from bronze to large vermeil, along with seven special prizes given out to the most deserving exhibitors.

Even non-philatelists would be awestruck by the compelling collection of stamps across 217 'frames' presented at the exhibition, because the category selection is in fact fascinating with some of the best stamp collectors taking part, among a total of 82 participants.

The exhibition consists of myriad categories that contain an impressive assortment of stamps, ranging from 'traditional philately' to 'thematic philately'.

Under the 'postal history' category, the exhibit named "Early Indian Postal Cancellations Victorian Era 1854 – 84" intriguingly displays fragments of history through postmarks and Victorian stamps of India.

Another exhibit named "Postal Stationeries of Independent Bangladesh (since 1972)" shows a copious assemblage of postcards, envelopes, and aerogrammes that were issued by Bangladesh Post Office after the country's independence, which recaps the country's postal annals since liberation by being a tell-tale of history.

The organising body, Bangladesh Philatelic Federation, has taken the initiative to host such an exhibition

annually in the upcoming years. This not only promotes philately on a national level but does so internationally as well. To be able to participate internationally, one must attend national exhibitions first and this platform creates the scope for philatelists to advance further.

"The philatelic presence of Bangladesh is showing good progress on an international context. Bangladesh has already won two large vermeil awards internationally in two different exhibitions and is on track to receive a gold level award as well," said Mohammed Monirul Islam, Bangladesh Jury Secretary at Banglapex 2020.

Many might argue that the philatelic scenario of Bangladesh is moribund but A T M Anowarul Quadir, Bangladesh National Jury, Secretary, and Exhibition Chief Coordinator at Banglapex 2020 begs to differ.

"There exists sufficient philatelic enthusiasm in our country and it is quantifiably evident as new stamps are being issued and sold frequently with a growing number of philatelists," he said.

However, he also voiced his opinion regarding the issuance of stamps stating that to stir more curiosity among people, stamps should be issued covering a broad spectrum of themes to include nature, environment, personality, and architecture that are thought provoking and interestingly convey the country's significance to people.

Albeit stamp collection may seem as a hobby superficially, it is much deeper than that. Stamps hold the power to beautifully narrate stories, allow to preserve history and epoch, provide the opportunity for cultural exchange, and most importantly represent a country's rich story and heritage.

But all is not lost; there are handfuls amongst us, as there have been all throughout time, to question the norm, defy the archaic rules and live life to their own terms and not by the rules that have been dictated to them, because it suits the rest of the world.

Here's the story of few such torchbearers who take every day as a challenge and light-up the pathways for the next generation — showing them that it is okay to be different. That different is normal and not evil like the way society depicts it to be.

Meher Afroz Shaon, the famed actor, director, playback singer and an architect laugh at the word 'evil' as she narrates her story to us.

Sohana Saba, actor and TV personality voices a similar opinion —

"These people, the ones who make nasty remarks are pretty unsuccessful in their own lives, so they hide behind the invisible veil of social media and make hateful comments. If they were not anything but unproductive and unsuccessful, they would be busy working outside, making attempts to uplift others or do something productive that benefits the society. So, my request to the youngsters of today and tomorrow would be not to pay any attention to these mean people and carry on doing great work — because at the end of the day, that's all that matters."

Azra Mahmood, renowned model,

fashion choreographer and television presenter joined in with her views.

"We learn about good manners from an early age and yet, we display the audacity to comment on other people's personal lives— even when we are not welcome; oddly – even to people who are absolute strangers! I don't understand the culture behind this.

"We comment on others randomly for every subject under the sun — when they should get married, have children or even maintain a certain height or weight, why should it be like that at all? What makes anyone think that they have the right to dictate other's lives? My lifestyle is my

My personal belief is that all of us need to learn to be content on our own and only then will we be able to spread love to others," said the veteran model.

All the ladies at the rendezvous agreed to an important fact that it was no use singling out the men because non-progressive women also join the bandwagon of degrading others, and try to drag-down everyone around.

Syeda Samara Mortada, a feminist activist, a writer and a mother as she proudly calls herself, reverberated in the same tone.

"I think a woman can do everything a man can do and that's what I am trying to

Ayreen Khan, researcher, founder — iCan Foundation — agreed to all the narratives with a silent nod.

She added, "I believe in humanity – it's as simple as that! Till date I haven't heard anyone say that – 'you can't do this because you are a human or you can do this because you are a human.' Instead they specify the gender. It's not about the gender at all, it's always about humanity, and that's what I believe."

She went on to say, "Harassment at any sector, including the workplace, should be dealt with courage and firmness. Because if you let go of something today — thinking that it is insignificant and would make you too uncomfortable to deal with, would only encourage the perpetrators to continue, increasing their level of aggravation every time. So modestly put, we must find the courage within ourselves to draw the line — 'this simple act' will put a halt to many untoward incidents in the future, if not to all", said Khan.

At the end of it all, the six ladies laughed on the insecurities that they once had. These ladies may have learnt it the hard way, but the obstacles actually made them the strong women that they are today—each successful in their profession and personal lives, following their own set of rules.

Tanziral Dilshad Ditan, the founder of KrayonMag and the initiator of the campaign revels in her achievement to get the stories of these wonderful ladies out there.

"The stories may be few but even if it reaches a handful of youngsters it would mean a lot. This would be a tiny way of encouraging these youngsters to be free, from imaginary shackles that they build around themselves. I would keep on working in this field, as long as I can, to let the next generation know what it means to live a life based on passion and free-will; free of inhibitions and full of courage," said the storyteller, as she loves to call herself.

At the end of our conversations, all the ladies put one point across — change lies within own selves. If we start with the change, then there's bound to be others to follow.

The activist also pointed out a fact that it was time for the modern woman, to fight against oppressors and perpetrators collectively.

"It's not right for people to pinch us, push us, and touch us, all because we are sitting in a public transport or walking on a public road. It is our right to do so, and everybody should learn to respect that. And these teachings actually begin at home. Teach your children that both men and women have equal civic rights and there's no other alternative to the thought process", she said.
