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Govt eyes expanded circular rail

Rail minister asks for further study to see if Keraniganj, Purbachal can be covered

Railways Minister Nurul Islam Sujan has directed the authorities concerned to do further study on whether Keraniganj and the entire Purbachal area can be brought under the proposed circular rail network.

He came up with the directives at a meeting yesterday on the draft feasibility study report on the construction of the circular rail line around Dhaka city, said three meeting participants.

Officials of the railways ministry, Bangladesh Railway, and different government agencies concerned took part in the meeting held at the capital's Rail Bhavan, they said.

As per the draft feasibility study report, the 80.89km circular rail would go along the existing inner ring road and eastern bypass embankment of the capital and part of Narayanganj district.

The proposed route is Biswa Ijtema Ground-Uttara-Dhaka Zoo-Gabtol-Mohammadpur-Sadarghat-Postagola-Fatullah-Chashara-Adamjee-Demra-Trimohini-Purbachal-Tongi. The project's estimated cost is \$8.37 billion.

A China-Bangladesh joint venture firm conducted the feasibility study at a cost of Tk 24.56 crore and submitted

Kerry recognised the extraordinary challenges faced by Bangladesh due to climate change and frequent natural disasters, while stating that the next COP26 (UN conference on climate change) might be the world's last chance to hit the target of carbon emission.

He assured US' firm engagement to achieve the goal, said a foreign ministry statement yesterday.

ACC summons 10 for quizzing

They allegedly collaborated with PK Halder

The Anti-Corruption Commission has summoned ten businesspersons for quizzing over laundering of about Tk 2,000 crore from People's Leasing and Financial Services Limited (PLFSL).

ACC's Deputy Director Gulshan Anwar Prodhon issued a notice to the businesspersons to appear before the Commission's Segunbagicha headquarters between February 2 and February 3.

The ACC summoned owners, managing directors and directors of a dyeing factory, real estate and agro-base companies, and a solar power company.

ACC sources said the those summoned had laundered the money from PLFSL allegedly in collaboration with former managing director of NRB Global Bank and fugitive Proshanta Kumar Halder alias PK Halder.

Earlier this week, the ACC filed five cases against 33 people, including Halder, for laundering around Tk 346 crore of International Leasing and Financial Services Limited (ILFSL).

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BANGABANDHU'S IDEA OF SECULARISM

It's different from western concept

Says Nobel laurate Amartya Sen

The best way to honour Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman is building an egalitarian and secular Bangladesh where all will have equal access to opportunities, and religion will not be used for political purposes, two leading economists said yesterday.

Nobel Laureate Prof Amartya Sen said the idea of secularism that Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman held is that people will have freedom of practising religions, but its political use will be prevented -- which is quite different from the western concept of secularism that speaks against religion.

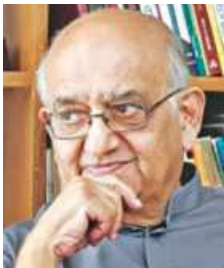
"The countries in the Indian subcontinent can learn from Bangabandhu's idea of secularism," the Indian economist said at the Bangabandhu Birth Centenary Talk on "Bangabandhu and Visions of Bangladesh" organised by the Bangladesh High Commission in UK and the South Asia Centre of the London School of Economics (LSE).

Amartya Sen said Bangabandhu was a great political leader and most admired by the people in Bengal. His ideas of secularism, equality and leadership emanated from his love for the people who faced repression during the Pakistani regime since 1947 when India and Pakistan were

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Covid daily infection rate drops

The Covid-19 infection rate in the country fell to 3.36 percent yesterday, the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) said in a handout.

The health authorities confirmed 17 new coronavirus-related deaths and 528 new cases in 24 hours till yesterday morning.

With the latest fatalities, the death toll rose to 8,072. "The mortality rate is now 1.51 percent," DGHS said.

Meanwhile, the new cases pushed up the national tally to 533,444. The current overall detection rate is 14.82 percent.

VACCINATION IN POOR NATIONS

GAVI asks for political support

EU grapples with vaccine delays

Political support is needed for a global scheme to vaccinate people in poor and middle income countries as wealthier nations strike fresh bilateral deals with developers to secure limited supplies, the head of the GAVI vaccine alliance said.

"There is almost a sense of vaccine panic," Seth Berkley, CEO of the GAVI alliance that co-leads the COVAX multilateral vaccine facility with the World Health Organization (WHO), told a press conference for UN correspondents in Geneva on Tuesday.

"The headlines this week clearly just told us how changeable supply scenarios are right now even for well-resourced governments," he said.

The European Commission said earlier it would finalise a proposal by the end of the week to require pharmaceutical firms to register their vaccine exports from the European Union, while insisting it had no plans to impose an export ban.

EU countries learnt late last week that deliveries of the vaccine from AstraZeneca would be some 60% lower in the first quarter than initially indicated. There have also been reduced deliveries of a vaccine jointly produced by Pfizer and BioNTech.

Berkley said that a global political consensus was needed behind the COVAX facility, which he said now aimed to deliver 2.3 billion doses by year-end, including 1.8 billion doses to lower income countries at no cost to their governments.

"We are currently on track to meet our initial objective of vaccinating 20% of the population of each and every lower

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
