Polls to Municipalities

Elections spoilt by violence again

BNP, independent candidates pull out; 10 hurt in Tangail

Elections to 62 municipalities in 36 districts ended yesterday amid reports of clashes, stuffing of ballot boxes and driving polling agents out of voting centres.

Besides, five polling officers were withdrawn over neglecting their duties in two districts. BNP nominated and independent mayoral candidates

boycotted elections in many municipalities brining allegations of vote rigging against ruling Awami League men.

A total of 229 candidates ran for mayor of municipalities,

2,360 for ward councillor and 755 for reserved seats of women ward councillors, according to statistics of the Election Commission.

In Tangail, at least 10 people were injured in a clash between supporters of two coucillor candidates at Kutubpur

Government Primary School polling centre of Bhuiyanpur municipality around 11:30am.

Voting was suspended at the centre for around 35

minutes due to the clash, said officials.

Meanwhile, an upazila level AL leader was arrested in Bhuiyanpur on charges of capturing a polling station and creating charge in the election, police said.

The arrestee is Tahirul Islam Tota, acting general secretary of Bhuapur upazila AL.

Lowest daily Covid cases in 9 months

17 more die, 363 get infected

UNB, Dhaka

The health authorities confirmed 17 more new coronavirus-related deaths and 363 new cases in 24 hours till 8:00am yesterday.

With the latest fatalities, the total number of deaths from the virus in Bangladesh reached 8,111 while the mortality rate stands at 1.52 percent, the Directorate General of Health Services said in a handout.

The DGHS had reported 312 new cases on April 19, 2020

Yesterday, it said the Covid-19 infection rate in the country is now 3 percent.

Meanwhile, the new cases pushed up the national tally to 534,770 while the current overall detection rate is 14.69 percent. A total of 479,297 patients (89.63 percent of the total reported cases) have recovered until yesterday morning.

'Bomb police station, frame lawyer'

MP Shaheen heard asking OC in leaked phone conversation

Jeshore-6 MP Shaheen Chaklader is facing criticism after a phone conversation between him and Keshabpur OC leaked in which he was heard asking the OC to "bomb" the station and frame a lawyer for it

In the conversation, reportedly of a couple of weeks ago, Jashore Awami League General Secretary and MP Shaheen instructed Keshabpur Officer-in-Charge Jashim Uddin to bomb the police station and file a case framing Saifullah, an environmental activist.

Saifullah who worked closely with Bangladesh Environmental Lawyers Association (BELA), recently filed a writ petition with the High Court against an illegally built brick kiln called "M/S Super Bricks" in the area, which irked the lawmaker.

The Daily Star has obtained a copy of the phone conversation but could not identify the source of the audio clip.

In the clip, the MP called and asked the OC if he knew Saifullah of Satbaria. In

Indian farmers begin hunger strike

Mobile internet services blocked in several areas surrounding Delhi to 'maintain public safety'

India blocked mobile internet services in several areas around New Delhi yesterday as protesting farmers began a one-day hunger strike after a week of clashes with authorities that left one dead and hundreds injured.

Angry at new agricultural laws that they say benefit large private food

buyers at the expense of producers, tens of thousands of farmers have been camped at protest sites on the outskirts of the capital for more than two months.

At the main protest site near the village of Singhu on the northern

At the main protest site near the village of Singhu on the northern outskirts of the city, there was a heightened police presence yesterday as hundreds of tractors arrived from Haryana, one of two states at the centre of the protests.

"Many farmers' groups have joined the protest site since last night," said Mahesh Singh, a 65-year-old farmer from Haryana. "They have come to show their support and more farmers are expected to come in the next two days."

India's interior ministry said yesterday internet services at three

locations on the outskirts of New Delhi where protests are occurring had been suspended until 11:00 pm (1730 GMT) today to "maintain public safety".

Indian authorities often block local internet services when they believe there will be unrest, although the move is unusual in the capital. Farm leaders said the hunger strike by hundreds of protesters, primarily

at Singhu and two other protest sites and designed to coincide with the anniversary of the death of Indian independence leader Mahatma Gandhi, would show Indians that the demonstrations were non-violent.

Modi may visit Tungipara in March

Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi may visit Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman's memorial in Tungipara during his visit to Bangladesh in March if a proposal under discussion fructifies, diplomatic sources in New Delhi said yesterday.

If the proposal materialises, Modi will be the first Indian PM to pay homage at Bangabandhu's memorial at Tungipara.

The idea of the PM's possible visit is under discussion and no decision has been taken, the sources said.

Modi, who has described Bangabandhu as one of the greatest personalities of the last century, will be visiting Dhaka on March 26 on the occasion of Bangladesh's Independence Day.

Car bomb kills 5 in pro-Turkey north Syria

A car bomb in the Turkishcontrolled region of Afrin in northern Syria yesterday killed five people including a child, a British-based war monitor said.

The car, which contained explosives, blew up in a neighbourhood where workshops are located, killing the child, three other civilians and an unidentified person, the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said.

Observatory chief Rami Abdel Rahman said the death toll could rise as 15 other people were wounded, some of them in critical condition.

Turkish forces and their Syrian proxies grabbed the region of Afrin from Kurdish fighters in 2018.

Afrin and other areas in northern Syria under Turkish control are regularly rocked by such bombings.

There is usually no claim for them, although

Don't repeat 'bad history'

WHO warns vaccine hoarding would only drag out pandemic; EU backs off jab threat in Britain row

Rich countries squabbling over Covid-19 vaccine supplies must consider the situation in poorer parts of the world, WHO said, as the EU backtracked on a threat to restrict exports of shots to Northern Ireland in its growing row with Britain.

Outbreaks are raging around the globe with Covid-19 deaths nearing 2.3 million, while there are fears the less privileged will not get access to vaccine for a long time.

WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus decried the skirmish in wealthy countries to secure large amounts of various vaccines against the coronavirus while few doses have yet to reach poorer nations.

"The pandemic has exposed and exploited the inequalities of our world," he told journalists on Friday, warning that there now was "the real danger that the very tools that could help to end the pandemic -- vaccines -- may exacerbate those same inequalities."

"Vaccine nationalism might serve short-term political goals. But it's ultimately short-sighted and self-defeating,"

The WHO co-leads the COVAX facility, which is working to procure vaccines and ensure doses are delivered equitably around the world.

The facility expects to begin delivering doses within a few weeks, and Tedros said the aim was for vaccination of health workers and older people to be underway in all countries within the first 100 days of 2021.
