Don't give the scope next fiscal year

Experts urge govt

A number of renowned economists and industrialists have urged the government not to give the scope for whitening black money in the next fiscal year.

Only a handful of individuals are reaping the benefits of Bangladesh's astounding GDP growth due to the discriminatory provision of whitening black money. This is escalating economic disparity in the country, they said at a webinar yesterday.

Eminent economist Rehman Sobhan, chairman of the Centre for Policy Dialogue, said, "Corrupt individuals who have amassed astronomical amounts of money are getting amnesty just by paying a nominal amount of money as tax.

"This money whitening process will sharply increase economic discrimination in the country," he pointed out at the webinar titled "Black money being whitened: Beneficial or harmful for the economy?" organised by Citizen's Platform for SDGs.

Dr Debapriya Bhattacharya, distinguished fellow at the CPD, said, "Money earned by committing crimes and corruption is being termed undisclosed income and being whitened by paying tax.

This contradicts the constitution because it has been clearly stated in the charter that the state will create such conditions that none will be able to possess and benefit from unaccounted income, he noted.

Have EC probed by judicial council

101 SC lawyers ask president

One hundred and one Supreme Court lawyers yesterday sent a letter to President Abdul Hamid, requesting him to constitute the Supreme Judicial Council to probe allegations of "financial corruption and gross misconduct" against the CEC and other election

commissioners. They also requested the president to remove the CEC and other commissioners from their posts.

In the letter, the SC lawyers urged the president to take away the post of chief election commissioner from KM Nurul Huda and hand his responsibilities to an election commissioner while an inquiry takes place into the allegations.

The 101 lawyers, who signed the letter, include AM Mahbub Uddin Khokon, a joint secretary general of the BNP and also a former

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2 govt officials held for stealing Tk 2.20cr

Police arrested two government officials in Dinajpur on Monday for transferring around Tk 2.2 crore digitally from the state treasury over the last two years by forging documents, user IDs and passwords.

The arrestees are Amirul Islam, 34, cash officer of Dinajpur M Abdur Rahim Medical College Hospital, and Mahfuzur Rahman, 42, audit officer of the district accounts and finance department.

Officials of Detective Branch of police n Dinajpur interrogated the duo and produced them before a court, seeking seven days' remand each, said Imam Zafar, officer-in-charge of Dinajpur DB.

The remand hearing will take place today, he added.

Saiful Islam, the district accounts and finance officer who first detected their scheme on January 31, filed the case with Kotwali Police Station on Monday night.

In the first information report (FIR), Saiful mentioned that Amirul used to handle payments of more than 700 employees, including doctors, nurses, officials and staffers of the hospital. As part of his job, he was connected

Russian court jails Navalny

West demands his release; Kremlin critic calls allegations absurd, politically-motivated

A Russian court jailed Kremlin critic Alexei Navalny yesterday in a ruling which the opposition politician blamed on what he called President Vladimir Putin's hatred and fear of

The Moscow court handed Navalny a threeand-a-half-year sentence but his lawyer said the anti-corruption blogger would serve only two years and eight months in jail because of tim has already spent under house arrest.

The widely anticipated ruling, which followed nationwide protests calling for Navalny's release, is likely to further strain relations with the West, which is likely to consider imposing sanctions on

Russia over its handling of the case. The United States, Britain and Germany urged Moscow to immediately free Navalny, with US Secretary of State Antony Blinken saying Washington

would coordinate closely with allies to hold Russia accountable.

A Navalny ally had urged the West before the hearing to hit Putin's inner circle with personal sanctions.

Navalny's supporters urged people to gather in central Moscow though riot police had already taken up position. His lawyers said they would appeal the ruling. Navalny, one of Putin's most prominent critics, was arrested on January

17 for alleged parole violations after returning from Germany where he SEE PAGE 10 COL 3

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12 more die, 525 get Covid

Bangladesh's Covid-19 fatalities rose to 8,149 as the health authorities recorded 12 more coronavirus-related deaths in 24 hours till yesterday morning.

The mortality rate is now 1.52 percent, the Directorate General of Health Services said in a handout.

Meanwhile, 525 new cases were detected during the same 24-hour period, pushing the national tally to 536,107

The daily detection rate has dropped to 3.63 percent. The current overall detection rate is 14.57 percent.

Dhaka urges KL to finalise protocol

Bangladesh has urged Malaysia to finalise the protocol amending the MoU between the government of Malaysia and the government of Bangladesh (G-to-G plus) on the employment of workers.

Bangladesh also requested Malaysia to take back the stranded Bangladeshi workers who could not return to Malaysia due to Covid-19 lockdown.

professionals in Malaysian economy and society. She assured Dhaka of taking up the issue of worker's return with her government.
