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New EC Guideline

Controversial posts stay, pay rises too

The Election Commission has drafted a guideline for imparting training to polls-related officials, keeping in it controversial positions like "special speakers" and "course advisers" amid allegations of financial corruption through such posts

In the draft guideline, it has also suggested raising allowances for those positions.

Chief Election Commissioner KM Nurul Huda, election commissioners and top officials of the EC secretariat attended training programmes as "special speakers" ahead of the 2018 national election and the fifth upazila polls in

Election commissioners and the EC secretary also attended the training programmes as "course advisers" and the director general of Electoral Training Institute (ETI) as "course director", according to EC officials.

The EC has been facing criticism from many eminent citizens and left-leaning political parties over alleged financial and other irregularities.

Forty-two noted citizens of the country have written twice to President Abdul Hamid, demanding formation of Supreme Judicial Council to probe allegations of "serious financial corruption and gross election-related misconduct" against the EC.

They said members of the EC under Huda's leadership indulged in misconduct and irregularities, including SEE PAGE 12 COL 1

No headway in nine years

Investigators seek time for 78th time

Another year of hopelessness passes for the families of journalist-couple Sagar Sarwar and Meherun Runi. Nine years on, justice still remains a far cry.

So far, the investigators have been approached at least 78 times to submit probe reports, but they could not make any headway in the sensational case.

Sagar, news editor at private TV channel Maasranga, and Runi, a senior reporter at ATN Bangla, were killed in the early hours of February 11, 2012, at their rented flat in the capital's West Rajabazar.

Bus-truck collision takes 10 lives

Six more killed in other road crashes

At least 10 people were killed and 14 others injured in a head-on collision between a bus and a truck in Jhenaidah, while six others died in separate road accidents in three other districts yesterday.

The death toll in Jhenaidah may rise, said Sheikh Mamunur Rashid, station officer at Fire Service and Civil Defence office in Kaliganj upazila

Of the dead, seven were men, two women and one girl child, said police. So far, the identities of only five victims were found. They are Reshma Khatun, 25, from Chuadanga Sadar upazila, the bus driver Úzzal Hossain, 48 and another bus passenger Mostafizur Rahman, Younus Ali, 27, from Jhenidah Sadar upazila, and Waliul Ali, 26, from Alamdanga upazila in Chuadanga.

Jhenaidah-bound bus collided head-on with a Jashore-bound truck, said

Mahfuzur Rahman, officer-in-charge (OC) of Kaliganj Police Station. After the collision, the bus turned turtle on the road, leaving nine people dead on the spot. Around 15 injured were rushed to different local

One of them succumbed to injuries at a local clinic, raising the death toll to ten. Of the other injured persons, the conditions of four to five

people were very critical, the police officer added. An eyewitness Shamsul Islam said, "I was working on a nearby cropland when I suddenly heard a bang and saw that a speeding truck rammed a

passenger bus." "Some other locals and I rushed to spot and found the passengers were screaming out. We then started recovering bodies and rescuing the injured," he told The Daily Star.

Vehicular movement on the road was halted for around an hour and SEE PAGE 12 COL 3

Court orders further probe in DSA case

Just days after police cleared Swedish-Bangladeshi journalist Tasneem Khalil, Hungarybased entrepreneur Zulkarnain Saer Khan and six others of all charges in a case filed under the Digital Security Act (DSA) last year, a Dhaka tribunal yesterday ordered further investigation into them.

Tasneem and Zulkarnain were featured in a recent Al Jazeera report, titled "All the Prime Minister's Men". The report caused a stir in the country and received a major backlash from the government.

A total of 11 people, including the two, cartoonist Ahmed Kabir Kishore, writer Mushtaq Ahmed, Rashtrochinta activist Didarul Islam Bhuiyan were prosecuted under the DSA by Rab-3's Assistant Director Abu Bakar Siddique on May 6 last year.

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UAE's Hope Probe enters orbit in first Arab Mars mission

The United Arab Emirates' first mission to Mars reached the red planet and entered orbit on Tuesday after a seven-month, 494 million-km (307 million-mile) journey, allowing it to start sending data about the Martian atmosphere and climate.

The Mars programme is part of the UAE's efforts to develop its scientific and technological capabilities and reduce its reliance on oil. The UAE Space Agency, the fifth globally to reach the planet,

even has a plan for a Mars settlement by 2117. "Contact with #HopeProbe has been established again. The Mars Orbit Insertion is now

Senate votes to proceed with trial

Republicans signal likely acquittal as Democrats set to detail case against ex-president

A divided US Senate voted largely along party lines on Tuesday to move ahead with Donald Trump's impeachment trial on a charge of inciting the deadly assault on the Capitol, but Republican senators made clear how difficult it will be to win a conviction.

The Senate voted 56-44 to proceed to the first-ever trial of a former president, rejecting his defense lawyers' argument that Trump was beyond the reach of the Senate after having left the White House on January 20.

Democrats hope to disqualify Trump from ever again holding public office, but Tuesday's outcome suggested they face long odds. Only six Republican senators joined Democrats to vote in favor of allowing the trial to take place, far short of the 17 needed to secure a conviction.

Convicting Trump would require a two-thirds majority in the 50-50 Senate.

Democratic lawmakers were set to detail their case against him yesterday. Under impeachment rules, each side is allowed up to 16 hours over two days to present their case. Senators will also be given a total of four hours for questioning.

Tuesday's vote capped a dramatic day in the Senate chamber. Democratic lawmakers serving as prosecutors opened the trial with a graphic video interspersing images of the January 6 Capitol violence with clips of Trump's incendiary speech to a crowd of supporters moments
