

TOBACCO FARMING IN MANIKCHHARI

3 villages give it up

Toxic runoff from upstream polluted Halda river for years; a non-govt initiative helps famers return to other crops

Growing various crops was the only source of livelihood for the people of Gorkhana, Chodurkhil, and Haldarchar -- three villages in Manikchhari upazila of Khagrachhari where the Halda river originates.

Farming in remote, rugged territory, they had to struggle to find buyers and were often forced to sell off their produce at low prices.

In 2007, farmers in these villages were approached by representatives of tobacco companies who proposed that if they cultivated tobacco, it would be bought from them at twice the market price.

Saira Begum, 45, of Gorkhana village of Manikchhari upazila, told The Daily Star they were tempted as the tobacco companies supplied seeds, fertilisers, and pesticides to the farmers for free.

Most importantly, she said, the companies would buy directly from their village, ridding the farmers of the hassle they face in selling their produce.

The farmers started growing tobacco as a cash crop and while it provided a steady source of income for them, it led to an environmental problem which became evident over SEE PAGE 10 COL 1

Covid-19 claimed 11 more lives and another 446 got infected in Bangladesh in 24 hours ending at 8:00am yesterdav.

With the latest figures, the Covid-19 fatalities rose to 8,285 and the caseload to 541,038, according to the Directorate General of Health Services.

In a handout, the DGHS said the daily coronavirus infection rate in Bangladesh rose to 3.15 percent from Sunday's 2.53 percent, while the overall infection rate stood at 14.01 percent. However, the mortality rate remained almost steady at 1.53 percent for the past few days, said SEE PAGE 10 COL 6

A freedom fighter has sued nine people, including two policemen, for illegally lifting stones from his property in Jaflong of Sylhet's Gowainghat upazila.

Insan Ali of Jaflong Nayabasti area filed the case with Sylhet Senior Special Session Judge's Court on Sunday. Later, the court tasked the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) with the investigation, said Insan's lawyer Shah Alam.

Scientists have discovered life that "shouldn't be there" under a 900-metre-thick Antarctic ice shelf.

Immobile life forms including what appear to be sponges and possibly barnacles were spotted on a boulder beneath the Filchner-Ronne Ice Shelf, 260km away from open water that carries the food such organisms rely on.

The discovery was made after a team led by the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) drilled through the ice shelf and dropped a camera into the hole in order to explore the seabed below.

Huw Griffiths, a marine biogeographer at BAS, told the New Scientist there were "all sorts of reasons they shouldn't be there", since the creatures likely survive on photosynthetic organisms that require sunlight absent at the bottom of the giant ice shelf.

According to the study, published in Frontiers in Marine Science, Antarctic ocean currents suggest the animals' food source could be drifting SEE PAGE 10 COL 6

Driver of Directorate General of Health Services Abdul Malek alias Badal, who came to the fore for his alleged involvement in illegal recruitments, manipulating transfers and promotions and trading in fake currencies, was found to have

amassed about Tk 1.5 crore illegally, according to a case filed by the ACC.

His wife Nargis Begum has illegal wealth worth about Tk 1.10 crore, the graft watchdog said.

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) on Sunday night filed two cases against Malek and his wife.

ACC's Assistant Director Syed Nazrul Islam filed the cases, said Pranab Kumar Bhattacharya, ACC's public relations officer.

The ACC began an enquiry into Malek and his wife's wealth in 2019 but the enquiry got momentum after Rab arrested Malek on September 20 last year and seized a firearm, a magazine, five bullets, Tk 1.5 lakh in fake currencies, a laptop and a mobile phone from his possession.

The ACC asked Malek and his wife to submit their wealth statements.

In the enquiry, the anti-graft watchdog found Malek submitted a false statement.
