# Aim gets lowered

Authorities plan to cut up to 25pc casualties by 2024 after failing to halve them in 10yrs

As road safety authority failed to achieve the target to halve the number of road accident fatalities by last year, it is now going to extend the

deadline by another 10 years.

As part of a new action plan, the authority wants to reduce 20 to 25 percent of road accident fatalities and injuries by the end of the 2024 by setting the National Road Safety Strategic Action Plan-2021-2024 into motion.

A draft of the action plan has already been prepared and is expected to be placed before today's meeting of National Road Safety Council (NRSC) for approval, said Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA) Chairman Nur Mohammad Mazumder while speaking to The Daily Star yesterday.

Asked whether they would evaluate why they couldn't meet the target, he said that could be done later.

Like the previous action plan, the fresh one would have nine individual sectors to address the road safety issues of



Bangladesh, which witnessed two major movements in the past three years for ensuring road safety, officials said. Road Transport and Bridges Minister

and Bridges Minister Obaidul Quader, also the chief of the

NRSC, will preside over the meeting at the BRTA's head office in the capital.

Several ministers, secretaries, leaders of transport associations, and experts and road safety campaigners are the members of the apex body formed in 1995 to take policy decisions over road safety issues. DRAFT ACTION PLAN

Since 1997, total of eight action plans were approved by the NRSC with the last and eighth one approved in November 2017 and 2020.

The goal of the eighth action plan was to achieve the SDG (Sustainable Development Goal) target and reduce the number of road accidents fatalities and injuries by 50 percent with the year 2020.


But the target could not be achieved, officials and experts said.

Twenty public universities have decided to hold uniform admission tests, likely in June-July.

Besides, Chattogram University of Engineering and Technology (Cuet), Rajshahi University of Engineering and Technology (Ruet) and Khulna University of Engineering and Technology (Kuet) have set June 12 as a tentative date for a single entry test.

The decisions were made at a virtual meeting of Bangladesh Bishwabidyalaya Parishad yesterday, Jagannath University Vice-Chancellor Prof Mizanur Rahman, a joint convener of a committee working to hold the cluster entry tests at the 20 universities, told The Daily Star.

## Transport workers attack BU students in private dorms

25 hurt; students block highway, torch bus

Several private dorms for Barishal University students in the city's Rupatli area were attacked early yesterday, leaving at least 25 students injured. BU students said the attack was carried out by a group of transport workers in the district.

It happened after university students vandalised a BRTC bus counter and blocked the Barishal-Kuakata regional highway for two hours till 5:00pm Tuesday, protesting the stabbing of a fellow student, they said. University sources said BU student Sajol and a female student went to

University sources said BU student Sajol and a female student went to the counter to go to Khulna on Tuesday afternoon. At that time, they got into an altercation with a transport worker named Rafiq. At one point, Rafiq allegedly stabbed Sajol.

### Covid Vaccination Minimum age to remain 40

Says health minister; 15.86 lakh vaccinated so far

The minimum age for Covid-19 vaccination will remain 40 for now, Health Minister Zahid Maleque said yesterday. The minister was talking to journalists

following his speech at an event in the capital's Dhaka Dental College yesterday noon.

He said some 20-25 lakh doses of Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine from Serum Institute of India (SII) would reach the country on February 22. About vaccination, he said, "Due to much rush at some of the vaccination centers, people who have registered there, are not getting SMS. But everyone will receive vaccine gradually." As of yesterday afternoon, around 25.5 lakh people registered on www.surokkha. gov.bd for the Covid-19 vaccine.

After the attack on students' accommodations, agitated students demonstrated throughout the day yesterday, demanding arrest of the attackers.

Meanwhile, the BU authorities suspended all exams till today. After the attack, at least 13 injured students were admitted to Barisal Sher-e-Bangla Medical College Hospital, while the rest took first aid.



Sixty-six million years ago, a huge celestial object struck off the coast of what is now Mexico, triggering a catastrophic "impact winter" that eventually wiped out three-quarters of life on Earth, including the dinosaurs.

A pair of astronomers at Harvard say they have now resolved long standing mysteries surrounding the nature and origin of the "Chicxulub impactor."

Their analysis suggests it was a comet that originated in a region of icy debris on the edge of the solar system, that Jupiter was responsible for it crashing into our planet, and that we can expect similar impacts every 250 million to 750 million years.

The duo's paper, published in the journal Scientific Reports this week, pushes back against an older theory that claims the object was a fragment of an asteroid that came from our solar SEE PAGE 10 COL 3

A Noakhali court yesterday framed charges against two accused in a case filed for raping a woman in Begumganj upazila. The video of the rape incident had triggered widespread outrage in

social media. The accused are: "Delwar Bahini" chief Delwar and his accomplice Abul Kalam. Judge Joynal Abedin of the Women and Children Repression Tribunal-1 heard the case and set March 24 for the next hearing.
