Bangladesh one of three large recipients

Says EIU global report

Bangladesh became one of the three large remittancerecipient countries that registered a rise in inward remittance last year, according to a new report of the Economist Intelligence Unit.

Last year, Bangladesh received about \$19.8 billion in remittance compared to \$18.4 billion it received the year before, said the report.

The other two countries that saw rise in inward remittance last year are Mexico (\$40.5 billion) and Pakistan (\$24.1 billion). Their inward remittance in 2019 was \$39 billion and \$22.2 billion respectively, added the report which also used World Bank data.

With the figure of \$19.8 billion, Bangladesh is the eighth highest recipient of remittance among the 10 countries listed by the recently published EIU report -- "Covid-19 and Migrant Remittances: A Hidden Crisis Looming?" Other large remittance recipients in the list -- India,

China, the Philippines, Egypt, Nigeria, Vietnam, and Ukraine -- saw decline in inward remittance last year. Globally, inward remittance declined by \$50.5 billion

last year with countries receiving \$666.2 billion compared to \$716.7 billion the year before, the report said. "The World Bank estimates that global remittances fell

by 7 percent in 2020, surpassing the 5 percent decline seen during the global financial crisis in 2009."

30 JU students hurt in clashes with villagers

At least 30 students were injured in clashes between students of Jahangirnagar University and villagers in Savar's Gerua Bazar yesterday evening.

Hundreds of students, both male and female, who live in messes in Gerua Bazar due to closure of the university amid the pandemic, were trapped in their rooms as intermittent clashes continued till filing this report at 10:30pm.

Sources said the clash broke out in the rening over a cricket match dispute The match between students and locals was held on February 11. A scuffle took place between a JU Chhatra League man and some locals during the match. Tensions were high in the area since then.

After Maghrib prayers yesterday, villagers armed with rods, sticks and other local weapons gathered in Gerua Bazar. They were called in through loudspeakers of a local mosque, said witnesses.

"It's a matter of our honour. Come out of your homes with whatever you have," a speaker was heard saying through loudspeakers.

Nasa rover on Mars to find life

After seven months in space, Nasa's Perseverance rover overcame a tense landing phase with a series of perfectly executed maneuvers to gently float down to the Martian soil yesterday and embark on its mission to search for signs of past life.

"Touchdown confirmed," said operations lead Swati Mohan at 3:55 pm Eastern Time (2055 GMT), as mission control at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena erupted in cheers.

The autonomously guided procedure was in fact completed more than 11 minutes earlier, the length of time it took for radio signals to return to Earth. Shortly after landing, the rover sent back its first black-and-white images, revealing a rocky field at the landing site in the Jezero Crater, just north of the Red Planet's equator.

More images, video of the descent and perhaps the first sounds of Mars ever recorded by microphones are expected in the coming hours as the rover relays data to overhead satellites.

Eight people died from Covid-19 in 24 hours till 8:00am yesterday, according to a press release issued by the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).

With the latest deaths, the total number of fatality reached 8,337 and the death rate stands at 1.54 percent. At least 406 new

infections were recorded

in the meantime, taking infected to 542,674, added the release. The current positivity

rate is 2.85 percent while the total positivity rate stands at 13.83 percent.

'Super plant' that helps soak up pollution

Experts have identified a "super plant" commonly found in the UK which can help soak up pollution on busy roads.

Scientists at the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) looked at the effectiveness of hedges for soaking up air pollution, comparing different types of shrubs including cotoneaster, hawthorn and western red cedar.

They discovered the denser, hairy-leaved Cotoneaster franchetii was at least 20 percent more effective at soaking up pollution from roads with heavy traffic compared to other shrubs, although it SEE PAGE 4 COL 4

3 Bangladeshi students killed in Canada

Three students from Bangladesh died on Thursday morning in a car crash south of Arborg, Manitoba in Canada, reports CBC News Canada.

The deceased were identified as Al Numan Aditta, Aranoor Azad Chowdhury, Risul Badhon, all Bangladeshi students studying at the University of Manitoba.

The three were returning from a trip to see the northern lights early on Thursday morning. A car travelling north on Highway 7 collided with the students' southbound car about 10 kilometres south of Arborg, a town about 115 kilometres north of Winnipeg, just before 6:30am Thursday [6:30pm Bangladesh time], Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) told CBC News Canada.

The three students in the southbound car -- Al Numan, Aranoor and Risul -- were pronounced dead at the scene. Police said two of the men were 23, but did not have an age for the third man, the report said.

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
