

17 project directors of BR changed

Ministry hopes it will speed up implementation of schemes

In a rare move, the railways ministry yesterday changed director of 17 projects of Bangladesh Railway, aiming to facilitate their quick implementation.

The ministry made the decision to execute the prime minister's directive for taking steps to ensure "one project, one project director," officials said.

However, 15, out of the 17 project directors, have to carry out their new roles as additional charges along with their main tasks, due to shortages of necessary manpower, they said.

In this regard, two circulars were issued yesterday, the last day to inform the Prime Minister's Office about the measures respective ministries and agencies taken to implement the PM's directives, they added.

"We have already informed the [PMO] after executing the prime minister's directives," Khaled Hussain, joint secretary (development-2) of railways ministry, told The Daily Star yesterday.

As per the existing rules, each development project will have a permanent project director. But the PMO saw different pictures as a single official was found discharging the duties of PD in more than one projects.

In a letter sent to different ministries

and agencies, including Implementation Monitoring and Evaluation Division, on January 20 this year, the PMO said it has found that an official of the Road Transport and Highways Division was working as PD of 14 projects.

Two officials were PD of 13 projects each, five officials were PD of 10 or more projects each, while 38 officials of the Local Government Division were PD of at least two or more projects each, reads a IMED document.

The PMO said similar pictures were found in the ministries of power, energy and mineral resources, railways, water resources, and housing and public works.

"The prime minister termed it 'worrying' and gives directives to take immediate action," reads the IMED document, citing the PMO letter.

In this situation, the railways ministry yesterday made the massive changes in project directors, three officials of the railways ministry and BR told this correspondent.

The BR is now implementing 36 development and three technical assistance projects at a cost of Tk 1,41,883.70 crore.

Several BR officials have to discharge their responsibilities as PD in more than one projects, which is considering as one of

US reaches 5 lakh deaths from Covid

Mumbai imposes fresh curbs as fears of new wave grow; Italy's virus cases rising again

The US death toll from the coronavirus topped 500,000 yesterday, according to an NBC News tally — a milestone that underscores the grave threat the virus still poses even as more people are vaccinated.

The coronavirus has killed more than 2,462,000 people worldwide, according to data compiled by Johns Hopkins University. More than a fifth of all deaths worldwide have occurred in the the US, which has less than five percent of the global population.

President Joe Biden last month warned that "well over" 600,000 people in the US could die from the virus.

"It's terrible. It is historic. We haven't seen anything even close to this for well over a hundred years, since the 1918 pandemic of influenza," Biden's chief medical advisor Anthony Fauci told NBC's "Meet The Press."

"It's something that is stunning when you look at the numbers, almost unbelievable, but it's true," Fauci added.

Meanwhile India, the world's second worst-hit nation in terms of infections, passed a bleak threshold yesterday by registering its 11 millionth case following a renewed rise in cases.

Fresh restrictions on gatherings came into force in the western state of Maharashtra, home to financial capital Mumbai, which has logged almost 52,000 deaths since the start of the pandemic.

Maharashtra chief minister Uddhav Thackeray said he was "worried about the severity of a second wave if it hits the state."

The vast nation's inoculation drive is creeping slowly, and India's Serum Institute -- the world's biggest vaccine maker -- has urged other countries to be "patient," saying it has been told to prioritise the home market.

In the capital New Delhi, vegetable vendor Radhekrishna Negi spoke for many around the world, telling AFP: "I am fed up of corona."

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VIOLENCE IN NOAKHALI Probe takes back seat as cops busy ensuring calm

Four days have passed but police are yet to arrest anyone in connection with Noakhali's Companiganj violence that killed a journalist and wounded around 19 others.

Police said they collected CCTV footage to identify the criminals.

A chaotic situation is prevailing in the area. So, law enforcers are now prioritising law and order to ensure public security, said police.

The clash on February 19 was between two factions of ruling Awami League over establishing supremacy in Companiganj. One group was led by Abdul Quader Mirza, younger brother of AL General Secretary Obaidul Quader, while the other was led by Mizanur Rahman Badal, organising secretary of upazila unit AL.

Both the groups used firearms in the clash and police also fired around 10 to 12 bullets to bring the situation under control.

A day later, journalist Borhan Uddin Muzakkir, 30, of online portal Barta Bazar, who was hit by bullets while covering the incident, died at Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

Newborn killed as ambulance, bus collide

A newborn was killed and at least 15 others were injured when an ambulance collided head-on with a bus in Barishal's Babuganj upazila yesterday afternoon.

The accident happened on Barisal-Dhaka highway in Rampatti area around 1:30pm, said police.

Seven of the injured were admitted to Barishal Sher-e-Bangla Medical College Hospital.

Sub-inspector Mehedi Hasan of Babuganj Police Station said the bus, carrying 30 people, was coming from Faridpur's Boalmari. The people were going to Charmonai to attend a mahfil (religious gathering) there. The ambulance with the critically ill three-day-old baby was going to Dhaka from Barishal Sher-e-Bangla Medical College Hospital for better treatment.

Italian envoy killed in DR Congo attack

Italy's ambassador to the Democratic Republic of Congo was among three people killed yesterday when a UN convoy came under attack in the troubled east, DRC sources and the Italian government said.

Luca Attanasio died of his wounds after a World Food Programme (WFP) convoy came under gunfire near Goma while he was on a field trip, a senior diplomatic source said in Kinshasa.

The Italian government confirmed Attanasio's death and said an Italian policeman, Vittorio Iacovacci, as well as a driver it did not identify, had also died.

President Sergio Mattarella lashed what he called a "cowardly attack."

"The Italian republic is in mourning for these servants of the state who lost their lives," he said in a statement.

Foreign Minister Luigi Di Maio expressed his "great dismay and immense sorrow", breaking off from a meeting in Brussels with EU counterparts to make an early return to Rome.

"The circumstances of this brutal attack are not yet known and no effort will be spared to shed light on what happened," Di Maio said.

Attanasio, 43, had been representing Italy in Kinshasa since 2017, first as head of mission, and then as ambassador from October 2019.

The envoy suffered "gunshot wounds to the abdomen" and was taken to a hospital in Goma in critical condition, the diplomat in Kinshasa said.

The DRC's army said its troops were searching the area for the assailants.

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
