# AL wins 80pc mayor posts

Voter turnout lowest in 5th phase

The ruling Awami League has won 80 percent mayoral posts in 230 municipality polls held so far in five phases. Mayoral nominees of the AL's archrival BNP won less than five percent posts and independent mayor candidates won 14 percent posts.

However, the voter turnout in Sunday's fifth phase of the elections was the lowest among the five phases.

According to Election Commission statistics, the AL mayor candidates won in 185 municipalities, BNP nominees in 11 and independent candidates in 32. Besides, one mayor hopeful each from Jatiya Party and Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal became victorious.

AL leaders said most of the independent candidates, who won the mayor elections, are rebels of the ruling party. Sunday's fifth phase elections to 30 municipalities saw 28 AL mayor nominees become winners, while one from BNP and one independent candidate came out victorious.

Speaking to The Daily Star, Shushashoner Jonno Nagorik (Shujan) Secretary Badiul Alam Majumdar yesterday said, "Such results have proven that elections have become a one-party affair."

The EC is holding municipality elections in six phases. Polls in five phases have already been completed on December 28, January 16 and 30, February 14 and 28 respectively.

#### CLASH WITH COPS **300 BNP** men sued, 13 placed on remand

Police yesterday filed a case against nearly 300 leaders and activists of BNP and its associated bodies over Sunday's clashes in front of the Jaitya Press Club during a protest over the death of writer Mushtaq Ahmed in custody.

Sub-Inspector Palash Saha filed the case with Shahbagh Police Station on charges of attempted murder of policemen, assault on police and carrying out vandalism, said Harunur Rashid, additional deputy commissioner (Ramna Zone) of Dhaka Metropolitan Police.

The SI named 48 leaders and activists as accused in the case. Also, there are 200-250 more accused who are unidentified leaders and activists.

# Stop giving publicity to 'nuisance'

Momen tells media about foreign missions' concern over internal matters

Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen advised the media not to provide publicity to foreign missions' statements expressing concern over Bangladesh's internal issues and termed it a nuisance.

"Bangladesh never expresses concern ver something in the US or elsewhere. this should be boycotted. You should stop giving publicity to this sort of nuisance," he told reporters at his office at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs yesterday.

He referred to a statement by 13 heads of foreign missions in Bangladesh on Friday, expressing concern over the death of writer Mushtaq Ahmed in Kashimpur jail and urging the government to launch a swift, transparent, and independent investigation into the circumstances of his

### Bangladesh flag hoisted at **Dhaka University**

In a historic student rally held at Dhaka University premises, the first Bangladesh flag was hoisted. The flag was dark green with a red sphere in the centre on which the outline of East Pakistan map was superimposed. It was unfurled by student leader ASM Abdur Rab on the rooftop of the western porch of the Arts Faculty of Dhaka University in front of hundreds of students and people. Saluting the flag, they all expressed their solidarity with the movement for liberation.

In the afternoon, the Pakistani flag was pulled down and the new flag was hoisted at Dhaka University and on the secretariat premises.

# Argentine titanosaur may be oldest yet

A colossal dinosaur dug up in Argentina could be the oldest titanosaur ever found, having roamed what is now Patagonia some 140 million years ago at the beginning of the Cretaceous period, scientists said Sunday.

The 65-foot (20-metre) lizard, Ninjatitan zapatai, was discovered in 2014 in the Neuquen province of southwest Argentina, the La Matanza University reported on its analysis.
