# 12 killed in Myanmar

Civilian vice-president vows resistance to junta: US, allies vow to restore democracy

Myanmar security forces killed at least 12 people, witnesses and media reported, as the acting leader of a civilian parallel government yesterday vowed in a first public address to pursue a "revolution" to overturn the Feb 1 military coup.

Five people were shot dead and several injured when police opened fire on a sit-in protest in Mandalay, Myanmar's second-biggest city, witnesses told Reuters.

Another person was killed in the central town of Pyay and two died in police firing in the commercial capital Yangon, where three were also killed overnight, domestic media reported.

"They are acting like they are in a war zone, with unarmed people," said Mandalay-based activist Myat Thu. He said the dead included a 13-year-old child.

Si Thu Tun, another protester, said he saw two people shot, including a Buddhist monk. "One of them was hit in the pubic bone, another was shot to death terribly," he

In Pyay, a witness said security forces initially stopped an ambulance from reaching those who were injured, leading to one death.

A truck driver in Chauk, a town in the central Magwe Region, also died after being shot in the chest by police, a

#### Sri Lanka to ban burga

Says minister, set to shut more than 1,000 madrasas

Sri Lanka will ban the wearing of the burga and shut more than a thousand Islamic schools, a government minister said yesterday, the latest actions affecting the country's minority Muslim population.

Minister for public security Sarath Weerasekera told a news conference he had signed a paper on Friday for cabinet approval to ban the full face covering worn by some Muslim women on "national security" grounds.

"In our early days Muslim women and girls never wore the burqa," he said. "It is a sign of religious extremism that came about recently. We are

definitely going to ban it.' The wearing of the burga in the majority-Buddhist nation was temporarily banned in 2019 after the bombing of churches and hotels by Islamic militants

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#### PAPUL'S VACANT SEAT

#### AL nominates Nuruddin

Awami League yesterday nominated Nuruddin Chowdhury Nayan, the party's Laxmipur district unit general secretary, to contest the Laxmipur-2 by-election.

The ruling party picked the candidate

at a meeting of its Local Government Nomination Board at the Gono Bhaban, with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, also the AL president, in the chair.

The parliamentary seat (Laxmipur-2) was declared vacant after independent lawmaker Mohammad Shahid Islam alias Kazi Papul was sentenced by a Kuwaiti court for a criminal offense.

on April 11.

The Parliament Secretariat on Monday issued a gazette notification declaring that the seat fell vacant on January 28.

According to the gazette, Papul is ineligible to remain an MP as he was sentenced by a Kuwaiti criminal court to four-year rigorous imprisonment on January 28.

Papul, now behind bars in Kuwait, was arrested in the Gulf country in June last year on charges of human trafficking, trading of residency visa and money

He was convicted by the Kuwaiti court in a bribery case.

### Sea slugs lose bodies to rid parasites

Japanese researchers have shown that a type of sea slug are able to self-decapitate and regrow their bodies, a discovery that could have ramifications for regenerative medicine. The mechanism is believed to be an extreme

method for the organism to rid itself of parasites, researchers Sayaka Mitoh and Yoichi Yusa wrote in a study published in Current Biology this week. The green slugs have algae cells in their skin, so they can feed off light like a plant until they develop a new body, which takes about 20 days.

Mitoh, a doctoral researcher at Nara Women's University, noticed one day that a sea slug, known as a sacoglossan, had spontaneously detached its SEE PAGE 10 COL 6

#### India to review side effects

Reports no report of blood clots

India will carry out a deeper review of postvaccination side effects from the AstraZeneca shot next week although no cases of blood clots have been reported so far, an official told AFP yesterday.

New Delhi decided to conduct the review after several countries suspended rollout over blood clot fears even as the World Health Organization said there was no reason to stop using AstraZeneca's Covid-19 jab.

## **Businesses** hit hard

Traders said they are incurring losses in crores due to the volatile situation

In most restaurants of Companiganj's Basurhat, an instruction is clearly written on the walls: "Conversations over politics are strictly prohibited."

But what seems is that politics controls everything in Basurhat, the municipality which drew attention of the whole country after recent activities of Abdul Quader Mirza, younger brother of ruling Awami League General Secretary Obaidul Quader, and consequent clashes between two factions of ruling AL that left two people dead.

Two people, including a local journalist, were shot dead during clashes over establishing dominance in the area. One group was led by Basurhat municipality Mayor Quader Mirza and another by Mizanur Rahman Badal, organising secretary of Companiganj upazila AL.

Locals said they have never seen so much use of firearms before in Basurhat.

The worst sufferer is the businesses there. Political clashes, mayoral election, use of firearms, killings, hartal, and section 144 -- all took a heavy toll on businesses. The traders said they have incurred losses in crores of taka in the volatile political situation in Noakhali's Companiganj over the last two months.
