

Make that 27. Bangladesh faced a crushing

eight-wicket defeat to New Zealand after a helpless batting erformance, which saw them bundled out for 130 runs -- their among the very few countries lowest total after coming in to bat first in the last three years.

The hope of registering a first win against the hosts at their den on Saturday is still one Bangladesh can fulfill on the upcoming matches on the tour, but for that the Tigers will have to show far more authority, especially with the bat.

Going back to the opening game of the three-match ODI series in Dunedin on Saturday, Tamim and his troops had a batting approach that reminded Bangladeshi fans of age-old batting displays from the



in international cricket, surviving and struggling against quality seamers was a regular occcurence and Bangladesh's batting approach seemed exactly the same in the first ODI against the likes of Trent Boult and James Neesham.

Things went from bad to worse since then and despite some sort of fight from two experienced batsmen Mahmudullah Riyad and Mushfiqur Rahim -- who were the only two batters to go past the twenties -- there was nothing positive for famim.

"If we want to overcome such a situation, we need to score at least 270-280 runs so that the bowlers can get something to defend. As I said, one of the top five batters needs to score big and carry the innings. But if we are unable to do that from the top five, then its always difficult, especially in such conditions," said Tamim.

The Bangladesh fans back home, who woke up at 4:00am to watch the Tigers play, are perhaps still trying to overcome the hangover of the defeat, one that they will feel till the second game on Tuesday in Christchurch.

## We are a level above Nepal, says Jamal

Jamal Bhuiyan has said they could do well in the upcoming tri-nation tournament in Nepal as he feels Bangladesh are a level above the Nepal team at the moment.

The Bangladesh captain returned to the country on Friday following a satisfactory campaign with Kolkata Mohammedan Sporting Club and wasted no time getting to training with the Saif Sporting Club players yesterday ahead of the Nepal tournament.

"I don't know what's going on with the Nepal team (regarding their training), but I think we are one level above them, Jamal said after a practice session at the Saif Sporting Club ground.

Jamal said that since the players had been all busy with the league, there should not be any concerns regarding their fitness or quality.

"Everyone is fit as the league was on. The team is strong and there are some new players. I believe we can get a good result. Jamie (Day) selected the team based on performances," said the Bangladesh captain, adding that he could not comment on first-game opponents, a Kyrgyzstan U-23 team, since he did not have much knowledge about them.

Bangladesh will play their first match against Kyrgyzstan U-23 team on Tuesday before their second match against the hosts on March 27. The top two teams of the round robin stage, where each team will play against the other once, will meet in the final on March 29.

The Bangladesh team, which flew to Nepal on Thursday, engaged in an indoor

session at the gym and swimming pool session yesterday following a full-fledged training session on Friday. Jamal will join the team on Monday.

The Bangladesh captain said while being away from the team, he is working on fitness so that he can cope with the rest of the team right after reaching Kathmandu.

"The beginning in Kolkata was a bit tough because I had coronavirus. I was in isolation for almost 20 days in Qatar and then 10 days in India. So, I was out of practice and running for a month. Just got into the game after one practice session. But my fitness improved gradually," said the Bangladesh skipper, who played nine matches in the I-League for the popular Kolkata outfit.

While Jamal talked with affection about Kolkata football and how he was received wholeheartedly by the Black Panthers and their supporters, his parent club, Saif Sporting Club, were quick to extend his contract for the remainder of the season and the next season as well.

The club officials cut a cake to welcome their captain at the training ground and later completed formalities of the contract signing.

The club's managing director Nasiruddin Chowdhury said that the club would be Jamal's home for a long time.

"Jamal was always our player. He may have played for Kolkata Mohammedan on loan, but he will play the remainder of the season and the next season for us, Nasiruddin said.

Jamal said he is committed to contributing to Saif Sporting Club's success and that he would try to help the team finished at least second in the league.

Juventus forward Cristiano Ronaldo was named Serie A's Player of the Year for the 2019-20 season at the Gran Gala del Calcio on Friday.



### Overseas fans barred from Tokyo Olympics

Overseas fans will be banned from this summer's virus-delayed Olympics, organisers said Saturday, calling the decision disappointing but "unavoidable" as they try to hold the Games safely during the pandemic.

The unprecedented ban will make the Tokyo Games the first ever without overseas spectators, with organisers scaling back their ambitions for the pandemic Once billed as a party

to celebrate "proof of humanity's triumph over the virus", the Games are instead shaping up to be a largely television event, with little of the international party atmosphere that usually characterises an Olympics.

In a statement the Games officials said the virus situation in Japan and abroad remained "very challenging".

They said it was "highly unlikely" Japan could guarantee overseas visitors entry by the summer, and therefore the ban on spectators from abroad was necessary.
