Cry for water in the south

Safe drinking water a distant dream for 73pc people in five salinity-prone upazilas in Khulna-Satkhira region

Roksana Khatun moves aside dirt and floating leaves from a pond, slowly lowers her earthen pitcher into it and fills it with around 20 litres of water. Collecting the water, she carefully climbs the muddy, steep stairs of the pond and walks around 45 minutes to return home. She holds the heavy pitcher against her waist or on her head the entire time.

Only to fetch water for her family, she does this arduous task every day, twice, throughout the year, except for a few months when it rains and she can store some drinking water, she told The Daily Star, while on her way home from the pond recently.

"I've a tubewell, but it does not work. I've no other option ... I need water for my family of six. I've been doing this for years, Roksana, aged SEE PAGE 2 COL 3



COVID-19 VIRUS IN BANGLADESH

Researchers find 34 infection rate unique mutations

SARS COV-2, the virus that causes Covid-19, mutated 4,604 times in Bangladesh from April to the first week of December last year, and of the mutations, 34 were unique meaning they do not match any other mutations found in other parts of the world.

A team of Bangladeshi researchers in collaboration with Monash University in Malaysia came up with the findings after analysing 371

genome sequences of the virus. They named the 34 unique mutations of SARS COV-2 as "Bangla

Sharp rise in

2,172 new cases, 22 deaths in 24 hours

The country saw a sharp rise in Covid-19 infection rate yesterday.

The daily rate went up to 10.29 percent in the 24 hours ending at 8:00am yesterday. On the previous day, the positivity rate was 9.39 percent.

After a month-long declining trend until March 8, the positivity rate started rising again.


World leaders have frequently used the word "war" to describe the fight against the coronavirus primarily to emphasise how precious every second, every minute or every strategic decision is in combating the invisible killer.

Even slight delays in making and implementing decisions can jeopardise the whole effort, as has been seen in the case of numerous countries around the world in the last 15 months since Covid-19 was first detected in the Chinese city of Wuhan in December 2019.

Bangladesh is no exception.

The country's health officials identified a few cases of the UK variant of Covid-19 back in January, but this information was published only on March 10. The government also acknowledged the presence of the variant but has not explained the delay in sharing the information.
