Myanmar troops fire at funeral

Generals celebrate amid global fury over Saturday's massacre

Myanmar security forces opened fire yesterday, witnesses said, at people gathered for the funeral of one of the 114 people killed the previous day, the bloodiest day of protests since the military coup on February 1.

There were no immediate reports of casualties in the firing on the funeral in the town of Bago, near the commercial capital Yangon, according to three people who spoke to Reuters.

"While we are singing the revolution song for him, security forces just arrived and shot at us," said a woman called Aye, who was at the service for Thae Maung Maung, a 20-year-old student who was shot on Saturday. "People, including us, run away as they opened fire."

Coup leader Min Aung Hlaing and his generals still threw a lavish party on Saturday night for Armed Forces Day, drawing an angry response from some on social media.

A number of Twitter posts placed pictures of the party alongside images of victims.

Three people were killed in firing on protests yesterday in separate incidents elsewhere, witnesses and news reports said. One person was killed when troops opened fire overnight on a group of protesters near the capital Naypyitaw, Myanmar Now news reported.

Mobile 3G, 4G services shutdown at places

On top of being unable to communicate via Facebook and its Messenger app for over three days, people in certain areas in the country are not even getting half decent internet from mobile carriers.

There were reports of temporary shutdown of 3G and 4G internet services in some areas near Baitul Mukarram and Motijheel in Dhaka, Hathazari and Chattogram city since Friday. Later on, the services were shut down in Cumilla, Shaikupa, Khulna, Jashore, Beanpole and some other districts to prevent incitement of violence.

Thousands of subscribers of the carriers have been calling customer support with complaints of service disruptions.

The carriers assured them of working to solve the problem without mentioning what the problem was or how long it would take.

Govt officer found murdered in hospital

Tangail District Cultural Officer Redwana Islam was found murdered inside a hospital cabin on Saturday.



Police suspected that the victim's husband strangled her in the hospital in Mirzapur upazila.

Redwana, 34, daughter of Khandakar Rafiqul Islam, is from Rangpur Sadar upazila.

The victim's younger brother Arshadul Abid yesterday filed a murder case with Mirzapur Police Station against his sister's husband Delwar Hossain Mizan, a bank officer in Bhola, who went into hiding after the incident. Gias Uddin, inspector (investigation) of the police station, told The Daily Star.

Police recovered her body from a locked cabin of Kumudini Hospital in Mirzapur on Saturday night and sent it to Tangail General Hospital morgue for an autopsy, he said.

Quoting hospital authorities and relatives, Rizaul Haque Dipu, officer-in-charge of Mirzapur Police Station, said Redwana was hospitalised with labour

BANGABANDHU FLOWN TO KARACHI

In the evening, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman was flown via helicopter from the cantonment, where he was detained, to the Tejgaon Airport. Afterwards, he was flown to Karachi by a special military aircraft.

Siddiq Salik, then public relations officer in the Pakistan army at Dhaka, writes in his memoirs, "When complications arose about the final disposal of Mujib (such as international pressure for his release), I asked my friend Major Bilal who he had not finished him off in the heat of the action. He said, General Miha had personally ordered me to capture him alive."

NIXON-KISSINGER CONVERSATION
Today, US President Richard Nixon had a telephonic conversation with his Assistant for National Security Affairs



Henry Kissinger on the situation in Bangladesh. Kissinger informed the president that Yahya Khan had apparently got control of Bangladesh. Nixon commented, "Good. There's sometimes the use of power is..."

Kissinger agreed with him saying that the use of power against seeming odds pays off. "...all the experts were saying that 30,000 people can't get control of 75 million. Well, this may still turn out to be true but as of this moment it seems to be quiet," added Kissinger.

Nixon replied, "When you look over the history of nations 30,000 well-disciplined people can take 75 million any time. Look what the Spanish did when they came in and took the

ROHINGYAS GET NID 3 Cox's Bazar councillors held for helping them

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) arrested three councillors -- former and incumbent -- along with a Cox's Bazar municipality office assistant, yesterday for allegedly assisting some Rohingyas to get enrolled in the voter list through forgery.

Mahbub Alam and Sharif Uddin, deputy director and deputy assistant director from the ACC Chattogram integrated office-02, led the drive and arrested the four.

Incumbent councillor of ward-2 of Cox's Bazar municipality Mizanur Rahman, former councillors -- Javed Kaisar Novel and Rafikul Islam -- and office assistant Mohammad Didar were arrested from their respective homes.

Jupiter's winds are faster than a bullet

Jupiter's winds reach up to 900 miles per hour - three times as fast as those measured during the strongest tornadoes on Earth, a study has found.

Astronomers from the Laboratoire d'Astrophysique de Bordeaux tracked molecules left behind by comet Shoemaker-Levy 9 which slammed into Jupiter in 1994.

They discovered that some of the 900mph winds are so powerful they develop storms wider than the Earth and reach up to 560 miles tall.

In comparison, the most powerful winds on Earth reach only about 250 miles per hour and cover an area of up to three miles, causing devastating damage in their wake.

Jupiter is famous for its distinctive red and white

SC stays Erfan Salim's bail

The Supreme Court yesterday stayed for four weeks a High Court verdict that granted bail to Erfan Salim, son of Dhaka-7 lawmaker Haji Md Salim, in a case filed over attacking a navy officer in October last year.

Chamber judge of the Appellate Division of the SC Justice Obaidul Hassan passed the stay order following a petition filed by the state challenging the HC verdict.

The SC chamber judge asked the state to move a regular leave to appeal petition before its full bench in four weeks against the HC verdict.

Erfan Salim's lawyer Sayed Ahmed Raza told The Daily Star that his client cannot be released from jail following the apex court's stay order.

The SC chamber judge passed the stay order considering the allegation against Erfan Salim of attacking a navy officer in

Ninth grader injured in acid attack

A ninth-grader was injured in an acid attack in Cox's Bazar's Pekua upazila on Saturday evening, family sources said.

The injured, Mahima Akter, 15, daughter of Kabir Hossain, was rushed to the local upazila health complex, after which she was sent to Chattogram Medical College Hospital.

She suffered severe burn injuries on her face, said Kabir, the victim's father, adding that some masked people threw acid on Mahima through a window while she was watching television inside her house.

India records over 300 daily deaths

Covid cases at 163-day high; night curfew imposed in Maharashtra

India saw 62,714 new coronavirus infections in a day, the highest single day rise so far this year, taking the nationwide Covid-19 tally to 1,19,71,624, while the daily deaths crossed the 300-mark for the first time in 2021.

Registering a steady increase for the 18th day in row, active cases have increased to 4,86,310 comprising 4.06% of the total infections. The recovery rate has further dropped to 94.58%, according to the Union Health Ministry data updated yesterday.

The 62,714 new cases were reported in a span of 24 hours, the highest in 163 days, while the death toll increased to 1,61,552 with 312 daily new fatalities, the highest in around three months, the data showed.

Maharashtra recorded over 35,000 fresh cases for the third day in a row although the count was slightly lower than Friday's record surge of 36,902.

Authorities in the state imposed night curfews yesterday to tackle a record surge in cases with the financial capital Mumbai reporting 6,123 new cases, the highest single-day spike since March last year.

"We are seeing a higher Covid positive rate in high-rise residential buildings than in slums...to stop the spread only essential services will be allowed," said Kishor Pednekar, the mayor of Mumbai adding that hotels, pubs and shopping malls must observe the night curfew rules.
