Excitement overwhelms fears as Games begin

The Bangabandhu 9th Bangladesh Games finally got underway yesterday after a one-year wait at the Bangabandhu National Stadium amidst the backdrop of promising performances and the threat of Covid-19.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina declared the Games open through virtually from Gono Bhaban and urged athletes and organisers to take measures to protect health safety.

"It is a part of the celebrations for the birth centenary of Bangabandhu, but it was suspended due to coronavirus. Although it came back afresh, I want the Games to be played by taking care of everyone's health," Hasina said in her short speech. "If any nation wants development, it needs to develop every sectors, including sport, which is really

essential because sports are especially vital for children and the younger generation."

SA Games double-gold medallist swimmer Mahfuza Akter Shila and golfer Siddikur Rahman lit the torch of the Games in the opening ceremony, which was mostly comprised of audio-visual displays but that

here was no shortage of enthusiasm, inspiration and eagerness among athletes although they were a bit worried about the spike in Covid-19 infection rates.

"I have been preparing for the Bangladesh Games for more than a year and am eagerly waiting to perform on the big stage," said boxer Mohammad Nasid from Kishorganj, who never participated in any national boxing championships in his playing career although he once participated in the Victory Day Boxing tournament.

Skating coach Asif Iqbal was busy maintaining his players during the march

past. Around 50 players had turned up Dhaka a month ago to undergo training for the Games.

"It is true that we haven't taken enough preparations due to limitations and the lay-off," Iqbal said. "We can't hide the fact that we are feeling anxious due to the current coronavirus situation, but we can't stop everything due to coronavirus. We have been following health guidelines such as wearing masks, sanitising hands and limiting outings."

Mahfuza Akter Shila of Bangladesh Navy believes the Games are going to be a platform for athletes from service teams.

"The athletes of service teams are in good shape because they have trained regularly whereas athletes outside service teams struggled to train amid the pandemic. From that perspective, there is little chance to get new performers outside of services teams in the Games," Shila opined.

Bangladesh went to New Zealand focused on getting a first-ever international win in the country against the hosts across any format. But the way Shoriful dropped a rather simple catch will only add to the cause of worries for the team management following batting and bowling debacles that saw them lose three ODIs and as many T20Is.

Head coach Russell Domingo, who tends to not excuse Bangladesh's after poor performances, will perhaps find some positives from the 65-run thrashing in the final game on the tour, which was reduced to 10-overs-a-side due to rain at Eden Park. Among the positives could be that the Tigers

"We are not playing good cricket in regards to batting and fielding. That is what cost us. We play in sub-continental tracks but here we need to think about how to play teams like New Zealand on bouncy tracks. We are learning; learning about the wicket and conditions and how to play here," the 26-year-old said after the defeat yesterday.

Surprisingly, despite having so many positives from an educational tour of New Zealand, Mahmudullah expressed disappointment, saying there was hardly anything to take from a side being bowled out for 76.

"We couldn't play our best cricket throughout the series. We even arrived in New Zealand with some time on our hands and prepared accordingly. We had a good camp in Queenstown and the boys worked really hard. But that was not reflected on the field," Mahmudullah said.

'Rude awakening for the German team'

Germany's performance was dubbed "embarrassing" after they suffered their first World Cup qualifying defeat for 20 years in a humiliating 2-1 home loss to North Macedonia on Wednesday which heaped pressure on coach Joachim Loew.

"The disappointment is huge," said a crest-fallen Loew after the final whistle in Duisburg on Wednesday. "This is a set-back. There were a lot of mistakes and we didn't find a way to break down the deep-standing North Macedonians.

"We also let them counter-attack and had

Loew was forced back to the drawing board to find quick fixes ahead of this year's European Championship after his team's shock home defeat.

Loew, who is stepping down after 15 years in charge at the end of the Euro 2020 tournament which starts in June, had imagined his last six months in charge

Germany, before being stunned by North Macedonia, had won 18 World Cup qualifiers in a row and were unbeaten in 35 since losing 5-1 to England in 2001.

differently.

Instead his team suffered only their third ever World Cup qualifying home loss, and the first since a 5-1 thrashing by England in 2001, after beating Iceland and scraping a win over Romania in their first two group games last week.

The defeat by North Macedonia, ranked 65th in the world, came only months after Germany's 6-0 thrashing by Spain, and will only pile more pressure on Loew.

Germany are third in Group J and level on six points with second-placed North Macedonia but behind leaders Armenia who have nine points. Only the group winners qualify automatically.

"We will review everything," said the coach. "We have to keep working. We have to find our consistency."

"What can I tell you? I can't, out of emotion, out of happiness. We made the North Macedonians proud and happy. This is like winning the European Championship."

Rangpur get first win ahead of indefinite postponement

Rangpur Division got their first win in the Bangladesh National Cricket League (BNCL), defeating defending champions Khulna by seven wickets in a Tier 1 clash on the final day of the second round yesterday, before news broke that the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) had decided to suspend the tournament indefinitely due to the upsurge in Covid-19 cases.

"We have decided to suspend the league for now as a safety measure. We will observe the Covid-19 situation before thinking of starting the league again," BCB CEO Nizamuddin Chowdhury told The Daily Star today.

At the Rangpur Cricket Garden, the hosts chased down a small target of 117. With 101 needed on the final day, an in-form Nasir

Hossain guided his side to the target for the loss of three wickets.

After scoring fifty in the first innings, he continued his good run with the bat and remained unbeaten on 48 while opener Jahid Javed added 37 to seal an easy win after Rangpur pacer Mukidul Islam's 12-wicket haul lay the foundation.

Mukidul bagged six wickets as Rangpur took the first-innings

Ramos suffers calf injury

Real Madrid captain Sergio Ramos has sustained a calf injury, the club said in a statement on Thursday.

Ramos was an 86th minute substitute in Spain's 3-1 win over Kosovo in a World Cup qualifier on Wednesday and said he picked up the injury in the post-game warm down.

The problem puts his participation in Tuesday's Champions League quarter-final first leg at home to Liverpool and the Clasico with visitors Barcelona on April 10 in serious doubt. The club did not say how long the problem will keep him sidelined but media reports suggest it will be up to a month.

SA begin march on 2023 World Cup

South Africa return to one-day international cricket for the first time in a year against Pakistan today with a history-making new captain at the helm and their sights set on the 2023 World Cup.

The Proteas have not played an ODI since completing a 3-0 home series win against Australia in March 2020. Following that series, South Africa went to India but the tour was aborted because of the Covid-19 pandemic.

A planned series against England last December was then postponed after two members of the touring party tested positive for coronavirus - results which later were declared as false positives.

As a result, South Africa have yet to secure their first points in the World Cup Super League which decides which seven teams join hosts India as automatic qualifiers for the 2023 World Cup.

The Proteas and the Netherlands are the only teams who have yet to play a match in the 13-team league. Seven teams already have three or more wins, so South Africa, under new captain Temba Bavuma, will be seeking to make up ground when they play Pakistan at SuperSport Park in Centurion on Friday in the first of three one-day internationals.

South Africa will be at full strength for the first two matches but will be without five leading players for the third match because of Indian Premier League commitments.
