



Five killed as tanker rams motor launch

Witnesses say over 10 feared drowned in the Shitalakkhya

The bodies of five women were recovered after a Munshigani-bound launch, carrying over 50 passengers, capsized in the Shitalakkhya river in Narayanganj yesterday.

The bodies were recovered at different times after the launch capsized in the evening, said Nahida Barek, upazila nirbahi officer of Narayanganj Sadar upazila.

Four of the deceased were identified as Sukhina, 45, Protima Sharma, 53, Sunita Saha, 40 and Sauda Akter Lata, 18. Their bodies were handed over to their families, the

Babu Lal Baidya, assistant director of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) at Narayanganj Launch Terminal, said the launch named Sabit Al Hasan left Narayanganj Launch Terminal for Munshiganj with nearly 50 passengers at 5:56pm.

The launch sank near the third Shitalakkhya Bridge at Koylaghat of Syedpur area when it was hit by a tanker, he

Talking to this correspondent, family and relatives, who were at the spot, claimed that 10 passengers of the launch were missing since the incident.

Witnesses said locals rescued 30 passengers of the 50 from the spot.

However, authorities are yet to comment over the number of missing people.

HC observes; says specific rules need to be formulated

The High Court has observed that restricting or interfering with citizen's free movement because of "arbitrary or whimsical desires" of the government or state authorities is unconstitutional.

The HC bench of Justice M Enayetur Rahim and Justice Md Mostafizur Rahman made observation in the 12page full text of one of its verdicts, which was released yesterday.

Following a writ petition, the HC bench had delivered this verdict on March 16 saving that a specific law or rules need to be formulated soon regarding imposition of embargo on corruption suspects or accused leaving the country.

There are no specific laws or rules banning people against whom enquiries or

Won't tolerate vendalism, arson in name of Islam

Says PM about Hefajat mayhem

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday told parliament that the government wouldn't tolerate arson and vandalism in the name of Islam.

"I can only tell that legal action will be taken against those responsible for such misdeeds and the law will take its own course," she said, delivering her winding up speech in the 12th session of the 11th parliament which prorogued yesterday amid the second wave of the pandemic

Meanwhile, Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal told parliament that those involved in recent violence and mayhem at different parts of the country have been identified.

In her valedictory speech, Hasina warned Hefajat-e-Islam, saying, "I tell them that they are playing with fire. If a house catches fire, the fire may spread to another house. Can't they understand this?

Chuadanga declared provisional capital

New York Times reported today that Chuadanga had been designated the provisional capital of independent Bangladesh. The designation was made by Dr Ashabul Haq Joarder, who was regarded as the leader of the resistance forces He called himself their chief

adviser, added the report. Dr Haq Joardar, reported New York Times, said fighting would continue until the new nation is consolidated.

The report further stated, "Unlike the case in other towns in the area, which were in the hands of disorganized groups of Sheik Mujib's supporters, there appears to be some order in this town of about 35,000 people. Many have left, but the town has yet to see any fighting.

Nasa's Ingenuity helicopter lands on Mars

Nasa's Ingenuity mini-helicopter has been dropped on the surface of Mars in preparation for its first flight, the US space agency said.

The ultra-light aircraft had been fixed to the belly of the Perseverance rover, which touched down on the Red Planet on February 18.

"MarsHelicopter touchdown confirmed!" Nasa's Jet Propulsion Laboratory tweeted Saturday. "Its 293 million mile (471 million kilometer) journey aboard @NASAPersevere ended with the final drop of 4 inches (10 centimeter) from the

Shop owners take to streets

VIRUS CURBS ON SHOPS

Demand they be allowed to keep stores open

Shop owners and employees of New Market, Bashundhara City Shopping Mall and Sadarghat areas in Dhaka took to the streets to protest the government's decision to keep all shops and malls closed during the seven-day restriction to contain Covid-19 surge.

Rajshahi Byabshayee Oikya Parishad, a platform of 110

businesses, also protested the government's move. All the groups demanded that the government allow traders to keep their shops open while maintaining health guidelines.

The seven-day restriction is set to be enforced from

Several hundred shop owners and employees of New Market and nearby markets and shopping malls blocked adjacent roads for two hours from 3:30pm in protest at the directive.

Witnesses said the protesters smashed windows of several cars while road closures caused severe traffic

Our main demand is to keep the market open for a few hours because our families depend on our income. If the shops are closed, that would bring on uncertainty in our lives. We want to keep the shops running while maintaining safety guidelines," said Sohel Rana, an employee of a shop at New Market.

Protesters said they had suffered a lot due to last year's closure. They do not want any repetition.
