## Headed to debt traps

Marginalised groups had to deal with financial hardship, income loss, reduce food consumption, and reach for their savings and take out loans to cope with the pandemic fallout.

A study unveiled yesterday warned that the members of the groups are at the risk of losing all their savings and falling into debt traps.

It said amid inadequate government support, a little over one in five households recovered from the downturn and the rest would need an average 13 months to be back to where they were before the pandemic.

The study, "Marginalised Communities in Bangladesh Dealing with Pandemic Fallouts: Findings from a Household Survey", raised the flag that the fresh Covid restrictions imposed recently were likely to add to their woes.

The marginalised cutting down on food consumption might affect hunger and nutrition indicators, said the Citizen's Platform for SDGs, SEE PAGE 2 COL 3

## Will act tough to save people

PM on Covid pandemic

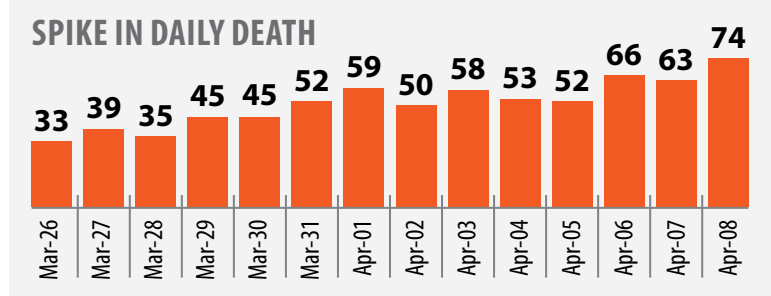

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said her government would take tougher steps to save lives of people amid the massive surge in the Covid-19 infection and deaths in the last few days. "Coronavirus has appeared as a pandemic. We are witnessing the blow. Although we have taken some measures to fight the pandemic, we might have to take tougher steps in future to save lives of the people and we must do it," she said.

The PM was addressing the concluding ceremony of the 71st foundation training course for fresh cadre service officers through a video conference from the Gono Bhaban. The participants were connected to the event from the Bangladesh Public Administration Training Centre (BPATC) and several other training centres. SEE PAGE 2 COL 6



## Record 74 deaths mark 2nd dose vaccine roll-out

The government yesterday started administering the second dose of AstraZeneca's Covid-19 vaccine amid a steep rise in deaths and infections. A total of 81,323 people received their second shot of the two-dose vaccine, according to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).

Besides, another 14,804 people got the first jab, taking the total number of first-dose recipients to 55,83,507.

Experts say the health emergency can turn from bad to worse anytime due to the continued relaxation of the restrictions imposed from April 5 to 11.

In the 24 hours preceding 8:00am yesterday, the DGHS reported 74 deaths -- the highest daily casualty since the first cases were detected on March 8 last year. It took the total confirmed death toll to 9,521.

The DGHS also reported 6,854 new cases yesterday, raising the number of active cases to 91,581. The positivity rate in that period was 20.65 percent, slightly lower than the previous day's positivity rate of 22.02 percent.

Prof Ridwanur Rahman, an infectious disease specialist, however said the daily death count hardly reflected the real picture.

"Around 60 percent of the patients dying in the hospitals dedicated for Covid-19 treatment were not tested. The deaths are not counted. The real picture might be more alarming," Prof Ridwanur Rahman told The Daily Star yesterday. SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

## Curbs eased the day DGHS wants them tougher

Malls, shops may now be open for 8 hours

The Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) yesterday wrote to the Prime Minister's Office, urging it to toughen restrictions in order to curb the transmission of Covid-19.

"We wrote to the PMO appealing for the enforcement of stricter restrictions like curfews," a top DGHS official, wishing not to be named, told The Daily Star.

He said health officials think it would not be possible to bring the situation under control otherwise.

DGHS officials met on Wednesday to discuss the pandemic situation of the country and then sent the letter that very day.

They said the way things are going in the name of restrictions are simply "suicidal" and the health department cannot afford such a setback.

The day the letter was sent, the government announced through a circular that shops and malls will be kept open for eight hours every day from today amid health experts' concerns.

Meanwhile, on that very day, country witnessed its highest number of Covid-19 deaths -- seventy-four people in just 24 hours till 8:00am.

The circular said shops and malls can be open from 9:00am to 5:00pm till April 13, on the condition of strict maintenance of health guidelines.

"Steps will be taken if health guidelines are violated," the circular read. SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

## A cause for concern

Experts say vaccines less effective against South African variant but it can reduce severity of Covid-19, mortality rate

The dominance of the South African variant of coronavirus in Dhaka is a cause for concern, but experts said mass inoculation should go on although early studies suggested that the available vaccines are less effective against the variant.

Inoculation will reduce mortality and morbidity rates, they said. There is no conclusive data in the world that says the Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine, which Bangladesh rolled out on February 7, does not work against the SA variant, they added.

An icddr study, published on Wednesday, analysed 57 samples between March 18 and 24, and found 46 or over 80 percent infected with the same SA variant. SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

By this year, digital ad revenues are set to account for over 50% of global money spent on advertisements. Reports suggest, 52% of all digital ad spending in 2020 was led by search and social media, i.e. Google and Facebook. Bangladesh, experiencing the second-fastest ad market growth, has been estimated to be worth US\$ 1,311 million (Tk 11,165 crore) in 2020. News organisations create content; Facebook and Google use the content to invite advertisers to their platforms.
