10тн D-8 Summit

Focus given on vaccines, economy

The D-8 countries have highlighted the importance of stronger cooperation on vaccine production, distribution and economic recovery in the aftermath of the coronavirus pandemic.

They also stressed the need for expansion of trade and commerce among them.

At the 10th D-8 summit, hosted virtually by Bangladesh yesterday, the D-8 leaders called upon the member states to cooperate in negotiations with the international pharmaceutical companies, which will give the members advantage in terms of quantities and prices of vaccines.

"All have expressed concern over the Covid-19 vaccine. They emphasised on production of vaccines as the pandemic appears to last for quite some time," Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen said at a virtual press conference after the summit.

"Our prime minister [Sheikh Hasina] said vaccine should be a public good and all should have equal access to it," he said at a time when the world faces a shortage of vaccine supplies amid rising cases of Covid-19.

The eight-member group, which includes Bangladesh, Egypt, Indonesia, Iran, Malaysia, Nigeria, Pakistan, and Turkey, established in 1997, aims to improve member states' position in the global economy, diversify and create new opportunities in trade relations, enhance participation in decision-making at an international level, and improve

In the face of recent violence by Hefajat-e-Islam, the police have beefed up security in different districts, including Dhaka.

Security posts have been set up at six police stations and six outposts of Sylhet Metropolitan Police. Policemen armed with light machine gun (LMG) have been deployed there.

Sylhet district police has also taken steps to build such security posts in 12 police stations of the district, said officials.

Meanwhile, several hundred additional policemen were sent to Brahmanbaria district police and security posts were set up at nine police stations of the district to avoid any untoward incident.

Besides, instructions were given to the police stations under Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) to step up vigilance and strengthen security measures, officials added.

3 Swechchasebak League men held in case under DSA

AL lawmaker sues them for 'defaming' him on Facebook

Three Swechchasebak League leaders from Chuadanga were arrested yesterday after being accused in a Digital Security Act case involving a local parliamentarian.

Solaiman Haque Joardar, the local ruling party lawmaker of Chuadanga-1, was "defamed" by the three men, who are also aligned with the ruling party, after they had uploaded on Facebook an edited version of a speech he had made.

The case was filed not by Joardar but Sahabul Hossain, the vice-president of Chuadanga BCL, with Chuadanga Police Station, accusing six named and 40-50 unnamed persons.

Hossain alleged that the edits distorted Joardar's speech.

"He delivered a speech of 16 minutes and 54 seconds at a workshop at Chuadanga's Shilpakala Academy on August 13, 2020. But Hossain accused in the case statement that the speech was deliberately cut short and edited," said Abu Jihad Fakrul Alam Khan, officer-in-charge (OC) of the station, quoting case statement. The Pakistan government said today that "anti-national elements" in Chittagong had been "destroyed" and that many of them had surrendered to Pakistani troops. The report about Chittagong was the first official acknowledgement that there had been strife in the city.

11 more killed in Myanmar

UK slams 'bullying' junta over London embassy standoff

Anti-coup demonstrators in Myanmar fought back with handmade guns and firebombs against a crackdown by security forces in a town in the northwest but at least 11 of the protesters were killed, domestic media reported

Initially, six truckloads of troops were deployed to quell protesters in the town of Taze, the Myanmar Now and Irrawaddy news outlets said. When the protesters fought back with handmade guns, knives and firebombs, five more truckloads of troops were brought in.

Fighting continued into yesterday morning and at least 11 protesters were killed and about 20 wounded, the media said. There was no word of any casualties among

That would take the toll of civilians killed by security forces to over 600 since the junta seized power from the elected government of Aung San Suu Kyi on February 1, according to the Assistance Association for Political Prisoners (AAPP). It had a toll of 598 dead as of Wednesday

Taze is near the town of Kale, where at least 12 people were killed in a similar clash between troops and protesters on Wednesday, according to news media and witnesses. Security forces fired live rounds, grenades, and machineguns on protesters who were demanding the restoration of Suu Kyi's government, AAPP said.

"Taze, Kale have many hunters in the jungle," said Hein
