# Worried, govt now plans tough steps

Worried that the Covid situation in Bangladesh could worsen with the Indian variant entering and the upcoming Eid travel rush, the government is contemplating stricter measures.

Extension of the ongoing shutdown of public and private offices until Eid; embargo on leaving work stations during the holidays; garment workers going on leave in phases; closing shops and malls after Eid are among the steps, said sources.

The authority would also beef up vigilance on the border to stop possible infiltration, trespassing, and illegal entry.

Although the government is likely to allow public transport to operate after May 5, it might suspend it a week after the holidays.

It might go for more drastic measures if the situation in Kolkata becomes something like that of New Delhi.

The Daily Star came to know about these possible steps after talking to several

- Shopping malls may be closed after Eid

government officials concerned, including those in the Cabinet Division.

A meeting is likely to be held on Sunday to finalise these measures and a circular would be issued following a nod from the prime minister, the sources said.

Restrictions were imposed on the movement of people and public transport to contain the second wave of Covid-19 on April 5. The restrictions have been extended until May 5 in phases.

## LPG price slashed by 7pc

The energy regulator has re-fixed the price of liquefied petroleum gas (LPG) of private companies.

Bangladesh Energy Regulatory Commission (BERC) yesterday reduced the retail price of LPG by around 7 percent. According to the new rate, retailers will have to sell 12kg gas in LPG cylinder at Tk 906, down from the existing price of Tk 975.

The new price will become effective from next month, BERC Chairman Abdul Jalil said while announcing the new price at a virtual press conference.

He said they re-fixed the price as per the new rate of the Saudi Contract Price for May.

## Local production with own funds

Mulls the govt over vaccines from other sources; approves emergency use of China's Sinopharm

The government is considering whether to locally produce Covid-19 vaccines with its own funds as the supply of Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine from India's Serum Institute remains uncertain.

The production will be funded by the Tk 10,000 crore allocated in this year's budget to combat the pandemic.

The government funds will be spent for either locally manufacturing the vaccine with the developers' assistance or an arrangement to co-produce with the inventors.
