Tk 14,295cr cash, assets legalised

10,000 people pay Tk 1,439cr in taxes to legalise their undisclosed wealth

Undisclosed assets worth a staggering Tk 14,295 crore have been legalised in the first nine months of this fiscal year.

At least 10,034 people paid Tk 1,439 crore in taxes to legalise the record amount of assets, taking the opportunity the government gave aiming to boost the economy during the pandemic, said a high official at the National Board of Revenue (NBR) yesterday.

Some 9,693 people legalised assets by paying Tk 1,390 crore in taxes for their undeclared fixed deposit receipts (FDRs), saving certificates, cash,

They legalised assets worth Tk 13,860 crore. Of the amount, 90 percent was in cash, FDRs, saving certificates, etc, the official said.

Another 341 people, who had invested their undisclosed money in the share market, paid Tk 49 crore in taxes to make Tk 435 crore in investments legal. In 15 tax zones in the capital alone, some 4,885 people legalised assets

by paying around Tk 980 crore against their undisclosed FDRs, saving certificates, cash, and homes.

Another 204 legalised their share market investments paying Tk 34.02 crore. In four tax zones in Chattogram, 1,106 people took the government issued opportunity and paid around Tk 121 crore against their undisclosed FDRs, saving certificates, cash, and homes.

137 recruited at RU on last day of VC's tenure; ministry terms it illegal, orders probe; BCL men clash over recruitment

Outgoing Rajshahi University Vice Chancellor Prof M Abdus Sobhan violated a ministerial embargo by appointing 137 teachers and staffers on his last day in office yesterday, giving rise to daylong chaos and clashes on the campus.

After news of the recruitments leaked around noon, a clash ensued between leaders and activists of RU Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) who went to the campus to receive appointment letters and a city unit BCL group, which opposed the recruitments.

Shortly afterwards, the education ministry termed the recruitments "illegal" and formed a four-member committee headed by University Grants Commission member Prof Muhammad Alamgir to investigate the VC's action.

In December 2020, acting on a report of the UGC on corruption at the university, the education ministry had issued an embargo on all kinds of

"It appears [from the chaos] that the VC signed the appointment letters under pressure of the ruling party's student leaders, but it was only money that worked behind the last-minute corruption," said Prof Sultanul Islam, the convener of Teachers' Society against Corruption, which has been protesting irregularities at the public university.

"As we were protesting the VC's corruptions, many job seekers were pleading with us to stop and save them. Many told us that they paid [for the appointments] with money they gathered by selling off their lands and properties," he said. Earlier, the RU authorities under Prof Sobhan had called meetings of

the finance committee on May 2 and the university syndicate on May 4 to fulfil the requirements for approving recruitments.

But teachers and students foiled the attempt by staging protests and

requesting the committee members not to attend the meetings. The VC then requested RU Registrar Prof Abdus Salam to sign the

appointment letters, but the registrar denied the requests on Wednesday. SEE PAGE 2 COL 3

Dhaka seeks 4m doses from US

The government has sought immediate delivery of 4 million vaccine doses from the US, Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen said yesterday.

"We've sought immediate release of 4 million doses of vaccine," he told reporters after his meeting with US Ambassador to Bangladesh Earl Miller at his foreign ministry office, reports UNB.

This was the latest government effort to collect vaccines from alternative sources as the stock of Oxford-AstraZeneca jabs is running out fast, making the ongoing countrywide vaccine inoculation uncertain.

total of 10 to 20 million jabs of vaccine from the US. The foreign minister said the US government needs permission from the Food and Drug Administration to export vaccines which is a time-consuming process. "But

we need it immediately." Momen also said they have written to Indian External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar requesting for 3 million shots of vaccine to address Bangladesh's immediate need.



CTTC unit making list MOHAMMAD JAMIL KHAN

Counterterrorism officers are preparing a list of extremist speakers making provocative speeches online and at public

gatherings. Seven individuals have already been identified and the list is being updated, officers said.

The number of militant acts has fallen, thanks to crackdowns, but the threat of radicalisation is on the rise, said Saiful Islam, deputy commissioner of Counter Terrorism and Transnational Crime (CTTC) unit of police.

"The list we have been making contains the names of several leaders of Hefajat-e-Islam. We are working to bring to book the extremist speakers who are popular among militants," he said.

The speakers will be accused under the anti-terrorism act as "instigators".

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
