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Khaleda can't go abroad

Law ministry says; highest authority still considering family's plea positively: sources

The government has turned down the plea from Khaleda Zia's family for allowing her to go abroad for better treatment, citing legal grounds.

"According to the existing law, there is no scope for granting the application for sending BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia abroad," Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal told reporters yesterday.

The law ministry gave this opinion after reviewing Section-401 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for the second time under which Khaleda's sentence was suspended once and she was provided with medical treatment, he pointed out.

The home boss had earlier said the government would actively consider the request on humanitarian grounds.

"The law ministry has informed us that Khaleda Zia can't go abroad unless her sentences are commuted. In the light of this, the application of Khaleda Zia's



family won't be granted," Asaduzzaman said at his Secretariat office yesterday.

He also said they would soon inform the BNP chief's family of their decision.

The minister mentioned that Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina gave Khaleda the opportunity to receive treatment at her convenience at home following suspension of her sentences on humanitarian grounds.

Khaleda later got infected with Covid-19 and was admitted to Evercare Hospital in the capital, he said.

Her brother Shamim Eskander then made a request for letting her go abroad for better treatment. "We sent the application to the law ministry for legal opinion," he added.

Earlier on May 5, Shamim met the home minister at his Dhanmondi residence and handed him the application.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday urged the countrymen not to put their near and dear ones' lives under threat by rushing to village homes to celebrate Eid-ul-Fitr.

"I know people are rushing towards villages on the eve of Eid-ul-Fitr. You may come in contact with the coronavirus on the ferry or in the vehicle on your way as you don't know who is infected with the virus and you bring it to your family, father-mother, grandfather-grandmother, brother-sister, and others. You can infect them and put their lives at risk," she said.

She simultaneously called for taking precautionary measures to be protected from the variant found in a neighbouring country that claims lives frequently.

Sneaked in thru' lax enforcement

8 India returnees found infected with double-mutant variant; whereabouts of 128 still unknown

The recent arrival of the double mutant Indian Covid-19 variant in Bangladesh is due to the lack of strict enforcement of institutional quarantine for those returning from India.

The government has found eight people infected with the Indian variant and all of them have entered the country through the Benapole land port.

Since April 26, around 2,500 Bangladeshis have entered through the busy port with Covid-19 certificates, according to the Jessore Civil Surgeon office.

Of them, 128 went to different places of the country including Dhaka for medical treatment without completing mandatory

14-day quarantine.

"Even if one carries a negative certificate, the person can be Covid-19 positive anytime. That's why a 14-day quarantine is recommended," Dr Sheikh Abu Hanif, civil surgeon of Jessore, told The Daily Star yesterday.

The Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research (IEDCR) on Saturday disclosed that it has found Indian variant in eight people, of which four are in Dhaka.

Soon after the announcement, the government extended the closure of borders with India for 14 more days since April 26.

Health officials said those who returned from India were supposed to stay in institutional quarantine. Instead, some of

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Covid death toll nears 12k

56 more die, 1,386 infected

Bangladesh reported 56 more coronavirus-related deaths and 1,386 new cases in 24 hours until yesterday morning.

The Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) said the latest fatalities took the country's death toll to 11,934 while the mortality rate remained static at 1.54 percent.

Besides, the DGHS said, the new cases were detected after testing 16,915 samples, pushing up the total case count to 773,513. Bangladesh has so far carried out 5,630,894 tests.

After a massive upsurge, the number of daily cases fell below 2,000 since May

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Metro rail trial run this month

The authorities may begin a test run of the country's first metro rail service later this month.

The test will on the basic functions of the systems. After this test, the authorities will operate the trains between four to five stations and then formally launch the service next year, they said.

Officials were asked to make preparations for the test run by May 24. Road Transports and Bridges Minister Obaidul Quader is expected to announce a date on Tuesday.

The minister is scheduled to visit the metro rail depot at the capital's Diabari to see in person the first metro train brought from Japan last month.

During a visit to the project site in Uttara, particularly the Uttara North and Uttara Centre stations on Saturday, this correspondent saw several hundred workers making preparation for the test run.

Mass Rapid Transit Line-6 or MRT-6, the country's first metro rail, is being built from the capital's Uttara third phase to Motijheel at a cost of Tk 22,000 crore.

Once complete, the metro train will be able to carry 60,000 people an hour, reducing travel time from Uttara to Motijheel to less than an hour despite having 16 stations. It now takes about two hours to travel the distance on a

Virus scare lost in home rush

Home-goers ignore warning, desperate to leave city; Eid shoppers crowd malls

As Eid-ul-Fitr draws nearer, people desperate to go back to their home districts have continued to leave Dhaka despite all hardships, while ignoring the restrictions the government imposed to curb the spread of Covid-19.

They have been waiting for hours under the scorching sun at ferry terminals, on roads. They have had to resort to detours and changing vehicles multiple times to go back home.

Some jumped on trucks, pick-up vans and many even walked long distances to get home.

They left the capital by any

means, oblivious to maintaining physical distancing, ignoring the prime minister's request to celebrate Eid where they are to help check the spread of Covid-19.

This rush has been continuing for the last three days.

Authorities have even suspended daytime ferries and deployed BGB troops, but the surge could not be stopped. Some even tried to cross the Padma on trawlers and boats powered by shallow-motor engines.

Even as people faced extreme hardships trying to go to their home districts, in the capital shopping centres and roads were crowded with shoppers and vehicles ahead of Eid amid the "lockdown".

The Eid shopping rush is going on in the backdrop of news that the highly contagious Indian variants of Covid-19 have reached the country.

Health experts said the Covid-19 situation in Bangladesh could worsen due to the increased public movement centring Eid. They had earlier warned that the situation could turn more dangerous once the India variant made its way here. **HOME RUSH CONTINUES**

Like the previous two days, people in the thousands heading home yesterday thronged the capital's inter-district bus terminals in Gabtoli and Sayedabad.

From Gabtoli, many went to

Amin Bazar on foot or on CNG-run auto-rickshaws to take a bus and other transport. There, transport workers and car rental service providers were calling for passengers and negotiating deals.

Many passengers went to Paturia ferry terminal in Manikganj or to Chandra in Gazipur by bus to avail other modes of transport that would take them closer to their homes in the north and south of the country.

Many who could afford it rented vehicles. Others changed vehicles multiple times to go to their destinations. Motorcyclists were seen carrying two passengers on

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
