Pandemic to be budget mainstay

Keeping in mind the possible impacts of the second Covid-19 wave, the government is going to attach top priority to vaccination, economic recovery, and life and livelihood of the poor in the upcoming national budget.

The size of the next budget, due to be placed in parliament on June 3, is likely to be Tk 602,880 crore, 6.14 percent higher than the original budget of Tk

568,000 crore for the current fiscal year, according to a draft budget proposal.

It will be finalised today at a meeting between Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, Finance Minister AHM Mustafa Kamal and top officials of the Finance Division, said finance ministry officials.

"The meeting will discuss the size of the next budget, priorities for fiscal 2021-22, revenue collection and measures to revive the economy amid the second wave of Covid-19," a top official at the ministry told The Daily Star yesterday.

If Dhaka joins Quad, it'll harm ties with Beijing

Says Chinese ambassador Li Jiming

Chinese Ambassador to Bangladesh Li Jiming has said Bangladesh should not join "Quad", a US-led initiative, and Dhaka's relations with Beijing will "substantially get damaged" if it joins the initiative. He termed "Quad" a military alliance aiming

against China's resurgence and its relationship with neighbours.

The ambassador said Quad is a "narrowpurposed" geopolitical clique, and Bangladesh should not join it as the country will not derive any benefit from the

The US, India, Japan and Australia are part of an informal strategic

alliance -- the Quadrilateral Security Dialogue, or Quad as it is known. "History has proved again and again such partnership surely damages our neighbours' own social, economic development and people's wellbeing," Ambassador Li said.

The Chinese envoy was speaking at a virtual programme with the members of Diplomatic Correspondents Association, Bangladesh (DCAB)

DCAB President Pantho Rahaman and General Secretary AKM Moinuddin also spoke at the event.

On April 27, Chinese State Councillor and Minister of National Defence Wei Fenghe met President Abdul Hamid. The two sides agreed to advance bilateral military cooperation.

5.92m students at risk of learning loss

Closure of schools causes huge impact on education, finds PPRC-BIGD survey

The Covid-driven school closure of over a year has put millions of the country's students at risk of learning loss, a new study has said.

Besides, it found that the unprecedented situation forced guardians to increase outof-pocket expenditure on their children's education as students had to attend coaching classes and private tuitions to continue their studies.

More than half the primary and secondary students had to attend such classes and tuitions during the closure, the study said, also pointing out that the pandemic was causing mental stress to all students.

Power and Participation Research Centre (PPRC) and Brac Institute of Governance and Development (BIGD) shared the study findings with journalists at a virtual press conference yesterday.

Family irked by poor probe progress

Family of the college girl found dead in a Gulshan flat has expressed frustration and dissatisfaction as police have not yet arrested or even interrogated Bashundhara Group Managing Director Sayem Sobhan Anvir, who stands accused of abetting her suicide.

"My sister was in a relationship with Anvir who promised her to marry and settle abroad. On April 26 morning, my sister called me and said Anvir would not marry her and had scolded her. She also said she is in trouble and an accident may happen anytime," said the victim's elder sister, who filed the case against Anvir.

"It is already two weeks since the body of my sister was recovered, but police are yet to collect the call record of Anvir's mobile phone," she told The Daily Star yesterday.

Police recovered the body hanging from the ceiling fan in her bedroom on April 26. Her legs were SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

Oli loses vote

Nepal's Prime Minister KP Sharma Oli lost a confidence



vote yesterday, triggering fresh political uncertainty just as the Himalayan nation reels from the pandemic.

Oli, 69, decided to seek a vote of confidence following months of feuding within his ruling communist party and coalition partners.

"If you want a stable parliament you should vote for the continuity of this government," he said in his address to the legislature before the vote.

Ansar Al Islam leader had links with Hefajat

Investigators claim

The spiritual leader of Al-Qaeda-inspired militant outfit Ansar Al Islam had connections with Qawmi madrasabased organisation Hefajat-e-Islam, said counterterrorism

Ali Hasan Osama, 27, who was arrested by Counter Terrorism and Transnational Crime (CITC) unit from Rajbari on May 6, took his oath from a top Hefajat leader. The investigators have also got a photo of the oath-taking event, they said.

Osama is now on a five-day remand in CTTC custody. Saiful Islam, deputy commissioner of CITC unit, said, "We have some information about the connections between Hefajat leaders and Osama.

We also got some digital devices and communication .. from Osama. These have been sent for forensic analysis. We may say more after getting the forensic report," he told

The Daily Star yesterday. Besides the Ansar Al Islam, investigators also claimed to have found some other militant outfits linked to Hefajat, including Harkat-ul-Jihad (Huji).

According to an intelligence report obtained by this newspaper, at least eight Huji leaders held posts in the 249-member Hefajat committee that had recently been

Mahbub Alam, joint commissioner of DB police, said, "In our investigation, we have got evidence of Hefajat's links with militant outfits."
