

UN seeks \$943m to deal with Rohingya crisis

At a donor conference in Geneva, the UN has sought \$943m for the Rohingyas and host community in Cox's Bazar.

UNHCR Spokesperson Andrej Mahecic said, "The \$943m plan seeks to meet the needs of more than 880,000 Rohingya refugees and 472,000 Bangladeshis in the surrounding host communities in Cox's Bazar."

He made the statement at a press briefing in Geneva on Friday.

However, no clear-cut decision of the UN's engagement in Bhashanchar was made in the Joint Response Plan (JRP) 2021.

The UNHCR spokesperson said Bangladesh needed robust and sustained international support to ensure the safety and wellbeing of Rohingya refugees.

Mahecic said it must not become a forgotten crisis. Both Rohingya refugees and Bangladesh, having generously hosted them for decades, must see the world standing with the Rohingyas whose vulnerabilities have heightened due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Most of the nearly a million Rohingyas fled to Bangladesh following a military crackdown in Myanmar's Rakhine state in 2017.

Since late last year, the Bangladesh government relocated some 18,000 Rohingyas to Bhashanchar, where the government built a housing project for 100,000 Rohingyas.

So far, over 40 NGOs have been providing humanitarian assistance to the Rohingyas in Bhashanchar, but the government has been seeking UN funding.

Biman to stop flights to 3 KSA cities

Cites strict conditions set by Saudi Arabia

Biman Bangladesh Airlines will be forced to suspend all its flights to three destinations in Saudi Arabia from May 20 due to travel restrictions from the Gulf country, sources in Biman said.

"The Saudi government has given various conditions for Bangladeshi citizens and to the respective airlines to follow which we think won't be possible for us to follow. That's why we will be forced to suspend flights to Saudi Arabia," a top official of Biman told The Daily Star, requesting anonymity.

He also said Biman has stopped selling tickets to the three destinations -- Riyadh, Dammam, and Jeddah -- after May 19.

At present, Biman is operating 18 flights weekly to these three cities in Saudi Arabia.

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MAWA-BHANGA EXPRESSWAY Govt delays toll collection start

Toll plazas not ready for July inauguration

The road, transport and bridges ministry has stepped back from its decision to start collecting toll from vehicles using the Dhaka-Mawa-Bhanga Expressway from July this year, as structures required for it are yet to be readied.

No fresh date was fixed to start toll collection on the 55-kilometre expressway. However, it may start when the long-cherished Padma Bridge is open to the public, which is likely to be in June next year, officials said.

Until a new vendor is assigned for this work, the Roads and Highways Department (RHD) will collect toll from two Dhaleshwari Bridges from July onwards as the tenure of the current vendor will expire in June this year.

These developments came as the Road Transport and Highway Division (RTHD) on May 11 held a meeting over the construction of infrastructures and appointing vendors for toll collection on the Dhaka-Mawa-Bhanga Expressway -- the country's first ever expressway.

The meeting was called after the finance ministry last month approved a toll rate

TAJUDDIN'S 18-POINT DIRECTIVE

Tajuddin Ahmad, the prime minister of Bangladesh, issued an 18-point directive on May 14 outlining the tasks of the people in the Liberation Struggle. He urged that the people should not listen to rumours nor should they have doubts about the ultimate victory.

"Let the people remember that in war marching forward and retreating are of equal importance. The retreat of the liberation army from one point should not give the people the impression that we have abandoned our war against the Pakistan occupation forces," he added.

The prime minister said employees of government and semi-government organisations who had taken shelter elsewhere would be considered as holding their posts and were expected to help the Bangladesh government and the Mukti Fauj according to their capacity. Officers and men of the military and para-military organisations, whether in service or retired, should immediately report for duty at the nearest liberation army unit and should in no circumstances allow themselves to be exploited by the enemy nor should they cooperate with the enemy, said the directive.

It further said employees in the communication and transport system should not cooperate with the enemy. At the first opportunity they should vacate the enemy-held areas along with their means of transport.

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Stalker stabs woman to death

A woman was stabbed to death by a stalker in Gazipur's Tongi yesterday morning.

The 34-year-old victim from Jhalakathi had been living in Tongi with her two children following separation from her husband. She made a living by selling cooked food. Saizuddin, 70, a mechanic at a rickshaw garage, often stalked her, say police.

Yesterday morning, she went out to deliver food to customers. On her way back home, Saizuddin intercepted her in Duttapara area around 9:00am and gave her an indecent proposal.

As the woman turned it down, he stabbed her and fled the scene, said Md Sajal, sub-inspector of Tongi East Police Station.

Locals took the woman to a nearby hospital where the doctors pronounced her dead, he mentioned.

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New species of dinosaur identified in Mexico

A team of palaeontologists in Mexico have identified a new species of dinosaur after finding its 72 million-year-old fossilized remains almost a decade ago, Mexico's National Institute of Anthropology and History (INAH) said on Thursday.

The new species, named Tlatolophus galorum, was identified as a crested dinosaur after 80% of its skull was recovered, allowing experts to compare it to other dinosaurs of that type, INAH said.

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The heat to continue for a few days

A mild heat wave is sweeping Dhaka, Rajshahi, Khulna and Barishal divisions, said Bangladesh Metrology Department.

Besides, mild heat waves are also sweeping the regions of Rangamati, Chandpur, Maizidicourt and Sayerpur and it may continue, said the Met office in its regular bulletin yesterday.

Light to moderate rain or thundershowers accompanied by temporary gusty or squally wind is likely to occur at a few places over Mymensingh, Sylhet, Rajshahi and Dhaka divisions and at one or two places over Rangpur and Chattogram, divisions with moderately heavy falls at places over the country.

Weather may remain mainly dry elsewhere over the country.

In a regular forecast, it said the day temperature may rise slightly and night temperature may remain nearly unchanged over the country.

The maximum temperature of the country was recorded at 38.0 degrees Celsius in Jashore yesterday.

India's Covid-19 2nd wave 'slows'

Govt warns against complacency as cases fall for 3rd straight day

India reported a smaller rise in daily coronavirus infections for a third straight day yesterday, as the government said it was working to boost vaccine supplies to avert deaths beyond the pandemic toll of more than 270,000.

The number of deaths in the past 24 hours rose over 4,000 for the fourth time in a week, with yesterday's 311,170 new infections representing the lowest single-day

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
