Twenty-one people were killed when extremely cold weather struck during an ultramarathon in rugged Gansu province in northwestern China, sparking public outrage yesterday over the lack of contingency planning. The 100-km race began on Saturday from a scenic area at a bend in the Yellow River known for its sheer cliffs and rock columns. The route would take runners through canyons and hills on an arid plateau at an elevation of over 1,000 metres. After kicking off at 9:30am, around noon on Saturday, a mountainous section of the race was hit by hail, freezing rain and gales that caused temperatures to plummet, officials from Baiyin told a news briefing yesterday. A massive rescue effort was initiated, with over 1,200 rescuers dispatched. A total of 172 people took part in the race. 151 participants had been confirmed safe.

Iran-IAEA nuclear sites monitoring deal expires

Iran's parliament speaker yesterday said that a three-month monitoring deal between Tehran and the UN nuclear watchdog had expired as of Saturday, Iran's state TV reported, adding that the agency would no longer access images of nuclear sites. The head of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), Rafael Grossi, was to hold a news conference later yesterday. He is in talks with Iran on extending the monitoring arrangement, which could affect talks between Tehran and six powers to revive the 2015 nuclear deal, the IAEA said.

Photos appear to show **Dubai's Sheikha Latifa**

Two pictures purportedly showing Dubai's Sheikha Latifa were published on an unverified Instagram account this week, months after the United Nations asked for proof that the royal was still alive. In February, the UN Human Rights Office asked for evidence about the daughter of Dubai's ruler Sheikh Mohammed

bin Rashid Al-Maktoum, after the BBC broadcast a video shot by Latifa saying she was being held captive and feared for her life. His 35-year-old daughter has not been seen in public since a foiled attempt to flee Dubai in March 2018. In February, Dubai's royal family released a statement insisting that Latifa was being "cared for at home". AFP is unable to verify the photos or when they were taken.

Bolsonaro fined for breaking Covid curbs

President Jair Bolsonaro must pay a fine for failing to adhere to state health safety regulations at a public event, the governor of Maranhao state said, as Brazil struggles to contain the Covid-19 pandemic. Health authorities filed the case against Bolsonaro "for the promotion in Maranhao of gatherings with no sanitary safeguards. The law applies to everyone," the governor of the northeastern state, leftist Flavio Dino, tweeted late Friday. Dino reminded the public that gatherings of more than 100 people are banned in his state, and the use of face masks is mandatory. The far-right Brazilian president opposes Covid confinement rules, and has attacked state governors who impose local health restrictions as "dictators."

Bombing ends, trauma persists

When an Israeli air strike targeted a security office near her home in Gaza this month, 10-year-old Zeina Dabous frantically scribbled a note and slipped it under her mother's pillow.

Mummy, my love, I am very very scared. If we all die, put us in the same grave all together so I can stay in your arms," she wrote.

"I want to wear my Eid clothes," she added, of the outfit she never got to wear for the Muslim celebration after Israeli air strikes on the Palestinian enclave started on May 10.

Though a ceasefire has since Friday halted the 11-day air raids, experts warn that children in the besieged coastal strip will likely carry the mental scars for years to come.

Psychologists say many are showing signs of depression, anxiety, behavioural disorders or irritability, and many are wetting their bed.

At home in Gaza city just before the bombing stopped, Zeina said she was constantly petrified and barely sleeping.

"They're always bombing," she told AFP. Zeina is one of around a million children living

in Gaza, according to the UN's children agency Israeli strikes on Gaza killed 248 Palestinians,

including 66 children, and have wounded another 1,900 people, the Gaza health ministry says.

Israeli air strikes also pounded the densely hateful generation.

Child cases fuel concerns

As India's second wave of Covid-19 continues its devastation, doctors and health experts have noted a rise in infections among children, fuelling concerns that children are more vulnerable to catching the disease.

Claims that the B1617 variant first detected in India disproportionately affects children, the only segment of the population ineligible for vaccination, have further fed the fears.

Daily infections are also shooting up in the Indian countryside, where public health services are scarce and already overstretched, in comparison to big towns, experts say.

"There is no scientific evidence and epidemiological data to say that a third wave of Covid-19 in India will affect mainly the children. All susceptible age groups are likely to be equally affected," said Dr Chandrakant Lahariya, an epidemiologist formerly with the World Health Organisation.

But public concern is pushing many states and the Indian government to set up task forces and exclusive Covid-19 care centres for children, and to issue advisories on preventing transmission from children.

More children have indeed been infected in India's second wave of Covid-19. The country does not keep national-level data on the ages of those who are infected. But

In Karnataka state, the number of children aged up to nine testing positive in the past two months has been 1.4 times the total number of infections from January to March 18. It was 1.6 times for the 10-19 age

The increase in deaths is less pronounced. While 28 children have died of the virus as at March 18, 15 have died in the two months since. Among adolescents, 46 had died as at March 18, and there have been 16 more since.

GAZA CEASEFIRE

In Maharashtra, the worst-hit state in India, 75,387 children were infected in the past month - an almost 51 per cent increase. But they form a small percentage of overall infections: Those aged under 10



made up only 3 per cent of infections, while those aged between 10 and 19 made up 6.8 per cent.

To dispel fears, the Indian authorities clarified on Tuesday (May 18) that a majority of children are asymptomatic and only a small proportion needed hospitalisation. Many states are testing more children, especially if they have been exposed to a family member with Covid-19.

Doctors warn that children can catch and spread the virus more easily.

Most children with Covid-19 get only mild diarrhoea or a cold, so adults tend to let their guard down when it comes to the young ones.

BBC journo apologises to William, Harry

Martin Bashir, the BBC journalist who tricked princess Diana into giving an explosive interview, yesterday apologised to Princes William and Harry, but said claims linking his actions to her death were "unreasonable".

A report by retired senior judge John Dyson published on Thursday found that Bashir commissioned faked bank statements that falsely suggested some of Diana's closest aides were being paid by the security services to keep tabs on her.

Bashir, 58, then showed them to Diana's brother Charles Spencer in a successful bid to convince him to arrange a meeting between himself and Diana and earn her trust.

Bashir told the Sunday Times he was "deeply sorry" to Diana's sons Prince William and Prince Harry.

'I never wanted to harm Diana in any way and I don't believe we did," he told the paper.

In it, Diana famously said "there were three people" in her marriage -- her, Charles and his long-time mistress and now wife, Camilla Parker-Bowles -- and also admitted adultery.

Bashir worked for the BBC as religion editor until he stepped down just last week, citing ill health, hours before Dyson's report was submitted to BBC bosses.

Former BBC chief Tony Hall, whom Dyson criticised for his "woefully ineffective" 1996 probe into Bashir's deception, resigned as

POST-COUP CRISIS IN MYANMAR

More than 125,000 teachers suspended

Rebels seize police post, kill 13 Date: 16/05/2021

More than 125,000 school teachers in Myanmar have been suspended by the military authorities for joining a civil disobedience movement to oppose the coup in February, an official of the Myanmar Teachers' Federation said.

The suspensions have come days before the start of a new school year, which some teachers and parents are boycotting as part of the campaign that has paralysed the country. A total of 125,900 school teachers had been suspended

as of Saturday, said the official. Myanmar has 430,000

school teachers according to the most recent data. These are just statements to threaten people to come back to work. If they actually fire this many people, the whole system will stop," said the official, who is also a teacher. He said he had been told that the charges he faces would be dropped if he returns.

The disruption at schools echoes that in the health sector and across government and private business. Around 19,500 university staff have also been suspended.

Meanwhile, fighters opposed to Myanmar's military junta seized a police station in the eastern town of Mobye yesterday and claimed to have killed at least 13 members of the security forces and captured four, local media said.

Mobye is around 100 km east of the capital Naypyidaw, but lies near territory held by some of the ethnic armed groups that have fought for greater autonomy for decades.
