New mothers skip check-up for fear of Covid

Thirty-one-year-old Mushfika Akter, a teacher at a renowned school in the capital, is currently in her eighth month of unplanned pregnancy.

However, due to the ongoing pandemic, like many pregnant mothers, Mushfika could barely visit a gynaecologist for antenatal appointments, even though she faced several health complications.

The mother of two said she used to visit the doctor every month for routine check-ups during her first pregnancy.

"But this time, from fear of the second Covid-19 wave, I couldn't make any appointments even though I am facing severe health issues like low haemoglobin levels and urinary tract infection. I find it even more risky as I haven't been vaccinated yet."

With her due date approaching, Mushfika is now considering giving birth at a local hospital in her village home as the risk of contracting Covid, according to her, is low there.

The situation is similar for 28-year-old Radifah Chowdhury, who is currently in the 14th week of her pregnancy, with no antenatal check-ups. According to her, she has been going through the most uncertain period of her life.

After getting pregnant without planning to within the first few months of her marriage, Radifah is panicking about her pregnancy. She decided to keep the baby after extensive talks with her husband and after consulting a doctor who strongly discouraged her to discontinue the pregnancy.

However, with so many uncertainties that came along with her pregnancy, she was recently diagnosed with depression and anxiety. And while maternal mental health is of high importance, she does not know

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ORIGINS OF COVID-19 Biden orders new probe

China fumes; India's health ministry says 2nd wave on downswing

China hit out at the "dark history" of the US intelligence community yesterday, after President Joe Biden ordered a probe into the Covid-19 origins which threatens to set the course for relations between world's top economies.

Washington is reviewing its diplomatic position with China on issues spanning trade, technological supremacy and rights, while it steps up efforts to hook Western democracies into a united diplomatic front against perceived Chinese aggression.

President Biden on Wednesday reopened a barely healed sore between the countries by ordering US intelligence agencies to report to him within 90 days on whether the Covid-19 virus first emerged in China from an animal source or from a laboratory accident.

The lab-leak theory, initially trotted out by Trump then dismissed as "highly unlikely" by a delayed World Health Organization mission to China, has resurfaced in recent days, driven by Washington.

Nixon asks India, Pakistan to show maximum restraint

NIXON'S LETTER TO INDIRA GANDHI

In a letter dated May 28, 1971, American President Richard Nixon urged Indian Prime Minister Indira Gandhi to continue to act with maximum restraint.

"I am also deeply concerned that the present situation not develop into a more widespread conflict in South Asia, either as a result of the refugee flow or through actions which might escalate the insurgency which may be developing in East Pakistan. The problems involved in this situation can and should be solved peacefully," said Nixon.

Nixon assured Indira Gandhi of continuing his government's effort to persuade Pakistan to ensure a peaceful political accommodation and restoration of conditions under which the refugee flow would stop and the refugees would be able to return to their homes.

"I feel that these approaches were at least in part behind President Yahya's press conference on May 24 and especially his public acceptance of international assistance, offer of amnesty to the refugees and commitment to transfer of power to elected representatives," added Nixon.

Nixon also pledged a generous contribution to the UNHCR relief fund for supporting the refugees who had taken shelter in India.

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High salinity threatens fish spawning in Halda river

The Halda river, the lone natural breeding ground of carp-like fish in South Asia, has seen a poor yield of eggs mainly due to heavy salinity in the river water this year.

Saline water entered the river from the sea due to cyclone storm Yaas. Besides, there was absence of favourable natural phenomena, including heavy torrential rain, gusty wind and thunderstorm, contributed to poor breeding of fish, said an eminent Halda researcher.

Brood fish spawned on Wednesday night followed by release of sample eggs on Tuesday night.

Several hundred egg collectors on both banks of the Halda in Hathazari and Raozan upazilas were frustrated as they expected more eggs this year for decreasing manmade

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Ancient Roman bath complex discovered in Spain

A highly-preserved ancient Roman bath complex has been discovered beneath the sand dunes of a Spanish beach.

Covid cases fall for 2nd straight day

1,292 infected, 22 die in a day

The number of Covid-19 cases continued to decline for the second consecutive day yesterday.

In the past 24 hours till 8:00am yesterday, a total of 1,292 people were tested positive for the viral infection in the country.

On the previous day, a total of 1,497 new cases were detected, according to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).

With the latest figure, the total number of Covid-19 confirmed cases rose to 794,985 in the country.

In the same 24 hours, a total of 22 people have died with Covid-19, up from 17 deaths of the previous day.

With this, the total number of deaths reached 12,480, and the death rate at 1.57 percent.

Meanwhile, the positivity rate has also continued to decline for the second consecutive day yesterday.

Israeli strikes on Gaza may be war crimes

Says UN rights chief

The UN high commissioner for human rights yesterday said that Israel's deadly strikes on Gaza might constitute war crimes and that Islamist group Hamas had violated international humanitarian law by firing rockets into Israel.

Michelle Bachelet said her office had verified the deaths of 270 Palestinians in Gaza, the West Bank and East Jerusalem, including 68 children, during violence this month. Most were killed in Hamas-controlled Gaza, where Israel fought militants for 11 days. The conflict ended with a ceasefire.

Hamas rockets killed 10 Israelis and residents. She was addressing a special session of the UN Human Rights Council, held at the request of Muslim states who have asked for a UN commission of inquiry to investigate possible crimes and to establish command responsibility.

The resolution, presented by the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation and the Palestinian delegation to the UN Human Rights Council, was set to be voted later yesterday.

The United States, Israel's closest ally, did not sign up to address the talks, where it has observer status, appearing to shun the ninth session held on Gaza since 2006.

"Regrettably, the self-professed global champions of human rights continue to shield the occupier from global accountability, and literally provide arms and ammunition for its widely reported war crimes and crimes of apartheid against the Palestinian people," Pakistan's ambassador to the OIC, Khalil Hashmi, said, speaking on behalf of the Islamic group.
