UN rights body orders int'l probe

Israeli PM says decision 'shameful'; US voices deep concern

The United Nations Human Rights Council has agreed to launch an international investigation into alleged crimes committed during the 11-day conflict between Israel and the Islamist group Hamas in Gaza.

The independent investigation will have a broad mandate to look into all alleged violations, not just in Gaza and the occupied West Bank, but also in Israel during hostilities that were halted by a ceasefire on May 21.

Michelle Bachelet, the UN high commissioner for human rights, earlier told the council that deadly Israeli strikes on Gaza might constitute war crimes and that Hamas had violated international humanitarian law by firing rockets into Israel.

Israel rejected the resolution adopted by the Geneva forum and said it would not cooperate.

"Today's shameful decision is yet another example of the UN Human Rights Council's blatant anti-Israeli obsession," Israeli Prime Benjamin Netanyahu on Thursday said in a statement accusing the forum of whitewashing "a genocidal terrorist organisation".

Israel's foreign ministry said its forces acted "in accordance with international law, in defending our

Three more Hefajat men arrested

Law enforcers arrested three more Hefajat-e-Islam men from different places in Brahmanbaria in 24 hours till yesterday morning in cases filed over vandalism and arson attacks during protests over Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's visit to Bangladesh in late March.

With the latest arrests, a total of 506 people have been held so far in connection with the cases, said Brahmanbaria police in a press release.

Police said they identified those involved in vandalism and arson attacks after examining photos and video clips of the incidents that took place on March 26-28.

Meanwhile, Brahmanbaria Additional Superintendent of Police Rais Uddin has been transferred, a Police Headquarters notification said yesterday.

With him, a total of 20

Giant tortoise still alive 100 years after 'extinction'

Ecuador confirmed that a giant tortoise found in 2019 in the Galapagos Islands is a species considered extinct a century ago.

The Galapagos National Park is preparing an expedition to search for more of the giant tortoises in an attempt to save the species.

The turtle was found two years ago on Fernandina Island, one of the youngest and most pristine in the archipelago, during a joint expedition between the Galapagos National Park and the Galapagos Conservancy.

Scientists from Yale University then identified it

KHAGRACHHARI JAIL

Prisoner found dead in bathroom

A 26-year-old Tripura youth, who was arrested on May 16 in a case filed under the pornography act, was found dead inside the Khagrachhari district jail early yesterday.

The dead is Milon Bikash Tripura of remote Arun Para in Rangamati's Baghaichhari upazila, Executive Magistrate Sajjad Hossen of Khagrachhari district administration, who is also the Khagrachhari jail super, told The Daily Star.

Quoting the jailer Didarul Alam, the jail super said, "Milon was found hanging from an iron rod at the bathroom of an isolation ward around 4:00am. Some 22 inmates are kept at the ward." He was later taken to Khagrachhari Sadar hospital.

TAJUDDIN'S INTERVIEW

Bangladesh Prime Minister Tajuddin Ahmad said he failed to understand how the democratic governments of the world could support the dictatorial regime of Pakistan, which was crushing the democratic aspirations of the people of Bangladesh.

Tajuddin told a foreign correspondent in an interview, broadcast by the Swadhin Bangla Kendra: "We wanted to establish the democratic rights of the people of Pakistan and to that end, we tried our best. We made all peaceful attempts in this direction but Yahya's army, most shamelessly cracked down on the unarmed people of Bangladesh. We had no other alternative but to proclaim independence for the 75 million democratic Bangalees of Bangladesh."

The radio station, quoting Awami League leaders, said "Bangladesh is a free and sovereign country today and there is no scope for talks."

The AL leaders were commenting on a statement by the spokesman of the US state department about a formula suggested by an emissary of Pakistan President Yahya Khan for a settlement of the issue.

COVID VACCINE PRODUCTION

Momen seeks global support for LDCs

BSS, Dhaka

Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen has sought financial and technical support for Least Developed Countries (LDCs) to produce Covid-19 vaccines and other lifesaving medicines.

"Meaningful transfer of technology, access to aid for trade, exemption from intellectual property rights so that LDCs can produce Covid-19 vaccines and other life-saving medicines," he said.

The foreign minister delivered a statement virtually at the United Nations Headquarters in New York on Thursday, a foreign ministry press release said yesterday.

Momen was the keynote speaker at the thematic discussion on enhancing international trade and regional integration for the LDCs.

The foreign minister highlighted the importance of providing support to the graduating LDCs, including providing them with continued LDC-specific support for 12 years after graduation.

He called on the Developed and Developing country Member States of the UN to help the graduating LDCs for their smooth and sustainable graduation.

All 4 TMC leaders get interim bail

Eleven days after their arrest by CBI in Narada sting operation case relating to alleged graft, senior West Bengal ministers Firdah Hakim and Subrata Mukherjee, ruling Trinamool Congress (TMC) legislator Madan Mitra and former Kolkata mayor Sovan Chatterjee were granted interim bail by the Calcutta High Court yesterday.

The interim bail was given by a five-member bench of the High Court with condition that it is valid till the bench gives a final order in this case. The

South Asia crosses 30m Covid cases

Delhi declares black fungus epidemic; UK approves J&J vaccine

Coronavirus infections in the South Asia region surpassed 30 million yesterday, according to a Reuters tally of official data, led by India which is struggling with a second Covid-19 wave and a vaccine shortage across the region.

India, the second most-populous country in the world, this month recorded its highest Covid-19 death toll since the pandemic began last year, accounting for just over a third of the overall total.

The South Asia region - India, Bangladesh, Pakistan, Bhutan, Nepal, Maldives and Sri Lanka - accounts for 18% of global cases and almost 10% of deaths.

But there is growing suspicion that official tallies of infections and deaths are not reflecting the true extent of the problem.

The country's official tally of daily coronavirus infections has been falling in the past few days, offering hope that its second wave is ebbing. But there are serious concerns that many new infections are not being reported, largely due to a dearth of testing in the countryside.

As of yesterday, India has reported nearly 27.6 million cases and 318,895 deaths. Daily infections reported across India have more than halved from more than 400,000 earlier this month, according to official statistics.

Meanwhile, amid rising incidents of black fungus in the national capital, the Delhi government on Thursday
