Prof Sayema Haque Bidisha, an economics professor at Dhaka University and also the research director of South Asian Network on Economic Modeling (SANEM), has long been outspoken about the economic challenges women faced during the pandemic and what support they needed in the upcoming budget to address the challenges.

According to Sayema, since a large number of women have become "new poor" during the pandemic, this year's budget must have the option of increasing the coverage of the government's social safety net programmes, along with hiking the per-capita allocation, so that women who are currently living below the poverty line can be benefitted from the budget.

"This can simply be providing a sewing machine to a woman in a slum or arranging a small tea stall for her so that she can survive."

The DU teacher's recent study titled "Impact of Covid-19 on Women" showed that 16.1 percent of the female wage employees lost their jobs between March and December 2020, while almost 50 percent faced a pay cut.

There must be prioritisation of training on alternative livelihood for them, both in urban and rural areas, Sayema said.

The study also showed that around 63 percent of the self-employed women saw a decrease in their profit or sales during that period, while more than 33 percent had to close their businesses temporarily.

She said the government must ensure that these female cottage and micro-entrepreneurs can access the stimulus packages designed for them since they hardly access the formal banking channels.

"And for them, the entire process of disbursement should be sorted out again. For instance, the package money can be disbursed by the micro-financers as they have wide access to the grassroots female micro and cottage entrepreneurs," Sayema added.

Experts also said unpaid care work still being unrecognised is holding women back.

According to a recent study by Prof Sharmind Neelormi of Jahangirnagar University, about 78 percent of the women-headed households, mostly representing the informal sectors, faced an economic crisis during the pandemic due to job loss, increased household responsibilities, and interruption in childcare support services at the workplace.

It also showed that 75 percent of the homemakers used to spend 3-5 hours a day for household work before the pandemic. Of them, 37.8 percent spent more time on household work than they previously did.

For employed women, 85 percent spent more than four hours a day for unpaid care work.

channels, it has been seen that female students lag behind in participating in distant learning and online classes, compared to their male counterparts.

For example, a 2020 SANEM study shows that only 6.7 percent of femaleheaded households participated in online classes, and compared to male students, there were more challenges for female students in terms of unavailability of device, insufficient internet facility, lack of mental preparation, and not being accustomed to technology.

Prof Sayema said when a family in Bangladeshi society faces a scarcity of digital devices or internet connections, the male students will inevitably get the preference.

Experts also believe that the impact of the gender technology gap and learning deficiency, along with income loss of the families and an increasing number of child marriage, will cause a dropout of a large number of female students.

"This is why this year's budget must focus on bridging the gender digital divide by providing women with gadgets and connections in a subsidised way," said Shaheen Anam.

"Besides, the government should keep in mind that increasing the education budget will not necessarily solve the problem, unless there are enough interventions to bring them back to classrooms by ensuring stipends for them and incentives for their parents," she added.

Although child marriage has long been prevalent in Bangladesh, school closures, economic downturn, and interruption in support services for girls during the pandemic forced many parents to marry off their underage girls.

A 2020 Brac study found child marriage increased up to 220 percent in July-September last year. A quick assessment by MJF from April to October last year revealed that 48 percent of child brides were aged between 13-15 years.

The MJF study also showed that at least 5,089 respondents had unexpected pregnancies during the pandemic due to the demand of husbands and in-laws, husband's home-staying, and disruption in family planning services.

Family planning expert Monjun Nahar said the family planning budget must be increased, and the government must ensure proper utilisation of the budget, identifying the gaps and challenges.

GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE

Violence against women was more prevalent during the pandemic than ever before as leading rights body Ain o Salish Kendra (ASK) data shows at least 1,627 women were raped or gang-raped during the pandemic. Of the victims, 53 were killed after rape and 14 died by suicide in 2020.

Our own galaxy is hard to study as it is obscured by a fog of gas and dust. But researchers were able to penetrate the fog using the Chandra X-Ray Observatory, which sees X-rays instead of visible light.

The research, published in the journal Monthly Notices of the Royal Astronomical Society, gives the clearest picture to date of a pair of X-ray emitting plumes coming from the area near the black hole at the center of the galaxy.

Researchers were especially interested in the X-ray thread G0.17-0.41, which, according to Wang, reveals a new phenomenon."

"This is evidence of an ongoing magnetic field reconnection event. The thread, writes Wang, probably represents "only the tip of the reconnection iceberg."

Magnetic field reconnection events occur when opposing magnetic fields are forced together and combine, expelling lots of energy. These events produce Northern Lights, and are responsible for phenomena like solar flares.

"It's a violent process," Wang said.

Scientists now think that magnetic reconnection also takes place in interstellar space and occurs at the outer boundaries of the expanding plumes driven out of our galaxy's center.



To improve the revenue mobilization, the government should take effective measures to tackle tax evasion and money laundering, it said.

As of April, the rate of implementation of the total public expenditure was 42 percent of the annual target of Tk 567,999 crore.

Such a low level of budget implementation is seriously concerning at a time when the economy is ravaged by the adverse impacts of the pandemic, it added.

On top of that, only 48.7 percent or Tk 102,730 crore of the total outlay of Tk 209,272 crore was spent in the first 10 months.

Among the top 10 ministries and divisions, implementation remains the lowest in the Health Services Division, only 31.3 percent, said Towfiqul.

Given the increased pressure on the public health service sector in view of the Covid-19 pandemic, the current scenario is in stark contrast to the citizen's expectations and the realities of the demands on the ground, he said.

CPD Executive Director Fahmida Khatun said increasing the allocation for the health sector might not bring any good because of frequent irregularities and corruption.

The attention should rather be on implementing the current allocation

investigators told The Daily Star yesterday, adding that they got some vital information from them. They also said they were trying to identify and detain all the culprits involved.

Speaking to The Daily Star, police officials linked with the probe said they, along with the victims, have raided three "huts" adjacent to the bordering areas in Satkhira, where the women were kept before being trafficked.

The law enforcers detained at least 10 suspects for their alleged involvement in the crime.

The investigators suspect that nearly 5,000 women and girls, aged between 15 to 30, were trafficked through three points of the bordering districts in Satkhira, Jashore and Lalmonirhat over the last five years.

The criminals spent between Tk 15,000 and Tk 20,000 to take each victim to the other side of the border without passports and visas, they said.

After the video clip of a 22-year-old woman being tortured and sexually assaulted went viral on social media, Indian police on May 27 arrested properly, she said.

Senior scientific advisers believe that, where possible, working from home makes sense beyond June because it would cut the number of people who come into contact with each other.

On Sunday, the UK reported more than 3,000 new Covid infections for a fifth successive day. Prior to this, the UK had not surpassed that number since 12 April.

Asked on BBC Radio 4's Today programme whether the UK was already in a third wave of infections, Prof Gupta said: "Yes, there has been exponential growth in the number of the new cases and at least threequarters of them are the new (Indian) variant.

"Of course the numbers of cases are relatively low at the moment - all waves start with low numbers of cases that grumble in the background and then become explosive, so the key here is that what we are seeing here is the signs of an early wave.'

However, he said the number of people who have been vaccinated in the UK meant this wave would probably take longer to emerge than previous ones.

"There may be a false sense of security for some time, and that's our concern.

In China, authorities imposed fresh travel limits, cancelled flights and tested thousands of residents in Guangdong yesterday after the Indian variant of the coronavirus was reported in the country's most populous province.

Vietnam announced the suspension of incoming international flights to its capital and tightened restrictions in its biggest city, as part efforts to contain the coronavirus outbreak that has seen cases double in the past month.
