World losts a Legend of Sustainable Microfinance and an Innovator. His legacy remains forever. Md. Shafiqual Haque Choudhury, Founder of ASA

was an icon in the world's social development. He enjoyed a rare distinction for developing a simple and sustainable microfinance model for poverty alleviation and women's empowerment and for making it as a grand success at home and abroad. About seven million poor people of Bangladesh are being directly benefited by the services offered by ASA presently. Beyond Bangladesh, 2.5 million underprivileged people of 13 countries in Asia and Africa derive benefit of microfinance service in pursuance of ASA methodology.

Md. Shafiqual Haque Choudhury's sudden demise on 12 February 2021 is a great loss for poverty alleviation endeavour in Bangladesh and in the world too. A remembrance meeting was organized on 24 March 2021 for commemorating his life, legacy, contribution, and mission. Dignitaries, renowned social development exponents of the world, colleagues, admirers and friends of late Md. Shafiqual Haque Choudhury joined the commemoration and paid tributes by outlining his extraordinary works and dedication. Excerpts are presented here.

First, he was intensely practical. When he devised the ASA method in the early 1990s, he himself designed the simple system, the branch layout and furniture everything. Always simplifying things to make them stronger, cheaper and more likely to succeed.

Second, he was extraordinarily transparent. When I wrote a book about ASA, I was amazed at his willingness to tell me the ASA's story in full, including the faults and errors as well as the successes.

This openness to the truth allowed him to see ASA's work as it really was what's an all. And this clarity of vision allowed him to lead ASA in a realistic way.

Thirdly, he had a very shrewd understanding of human character. And this often helped him to navigate his way through difficulties.
