# Despite good yield, growers not all smiles

A drought without incessant rains or severe storms have blessed four mango-producing districts in Rajshahi division with good yields but the region's farmers are yet to see good fortune.

Mango trees on 83,673 hectares of land in Natore, Naogaon, Rajshahi and Chapainawabganj are expected to yield 8.52 lakh tonnes of mangoes this year.

Last year, the region's mango production was 7.76 lakh tonnes after fruit loss during storms, Department of Agricultural Extension (DAE) officials said.

If no major calamity occurs till mid-July, the region's mango production is likely to increase by nearly one lakh tonnes this year, said Sirajul Islam, additional director of

### Dhaka fourth least livable city in world

Dhaka has been ranked the fourth least liveable city in the world by the Economist Intelligence Unit's annual global survey.

The EIU's Global Liveability Index ranks 140 cities based on more than 30 qualitative and quantitative factors across five broad categories: stability, health care, culture and environment, education and

infrastructure. Bangladesh's capital had ranked the third least liveable city in the EIU's Global Liveability Index 2019 and the second worst in the 2018 index.

This year, Dhaka has been ranked 137th among 140 cities with 33.5 points. It scored 55 in stability, 16.7 in healthcare, 30.8 in culture and environment, 33.3 in education and 26.8 in infrastructure.

### Mystery shrouds deaths of 2 kids in school

Parents of one say school to blame

The family of one of the two boys, who died after falling into a drainage pipe in their school, have accused the school authorities of negligence in duty in a case filed on Tuesday.

Abdul Quader Jilani, 12, and Mostafizur Rahman, 13, who were in sixth grade at Quantum Cosmo School and College in Lama, Bandarban, died on Monday, said

acting headteacher Shariful Alam. The school reopened about two months ago amid the pandemic with permission

from the education ministry. Mizanur Rahman, officer-in-charge of Lama Police Station, said, "It has to be thoroughly investigated how two sixth grader boys can die in a 13 inch pipe.'

Mostafizur's father Bulbul Mostafiz told The Daily Star that corporal punishment was rampant in the school and he often saw bruises on his son's body after he came home from school.

### Tikka Khan offers general amnesty

PAKISTAN DECLARES AMNESTY

The Pakistani Government offered today a general amnesty extending to military deserters and politicians and asked refugees to return home.

The offer, issued in Dhaka by Lieutenant General Tikka Khan, military governor of East Pakistan, omitted an earlier government statement that returning refugees would be carefully screened for "anti-state elements."

"It is an amnesty," Radio Pakistan said, "to all classes of people, such as students, labourers, businessmen, industrialists, civil servants, the armed forces and other law enforcement agencie political workers and leaders, who are welcome to come back.

It said reception centers had been set up along major routes in East Pakistan near the Indian border to receive returning refugees and provide food, accommodation, medical assistance and transportation to their homes.

"When they come," the government announcement said, "they will realise the falsehood of the propaganda of enemies of the

CDC of US says, lowers restriction levels of 110 nations

Bangladesh remains among the countries ranked highest for Covid-19 risk by US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) as the US national public health agency lowered restriction levels of 110 other countries and territories.

Bangladesh is currently on a "Level 4: Covid-19 Very High" rating which discourages all travel to, and recommends travel only for fully vaccinated individuals, according to the CDC website.

The CDC's new ratings, first reported by Reuters and posted on the CDC website on Monday, include 61 nations that were lowered from its highest "Level 4" rating, the agency confirmed to

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## Last US gold coin sells for \$18.87m



A 1933 US gold coin that was never issued after Franklin D Roosevelt removed America from the gold standard sold for a record \$18.87 million at a Sotheby's auction in New York Tuesday.

The auction house described the 1933 Double Eagle, the last US gold coin made and intended for circulation, as "one of the most coveted coins in the world" and it didn't disappoint.

The \$20 coin, designed by the American sculptor Augustus Saint-Gaudens, sailed past its pre-sale estimate price of between \$10 million and

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#### Macron vows to defy security fears after slap

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## US eases them for some countries

France, Belgium ease curbs; Russia reopens Covid hospitals after surge in cases

The United States eased travel warnings for dozens of countries as vaccinations boost hopes of a return to normal life, while France and Belgium further relaxed their Covid-19 restrictions yesterday, allowing restaurants and cafes to serve indoors.

With more than 3.7 million lives lost globally, many nations are still struggling to contain their coronavirus outbreaks. But the rapid vaccine rollout in wealthier parts of the world, including Europe, is allowing the return of some activities considered unthinkable just a few months ago.

French restaurants, cafes and bars resumed serving customers indoors yesterday, following a seven-month

"It's a pleasure to have a coffee inside. Normal life is gradually resuming," said transport employee Hammou Mraoui, enjoying a coffee in a bar in the Meudon suburb

With the easing of the curfew in France, venues are not only open, they're staying open later too.

The new measures also saw gyms open their doors to the relief of eager fitness buffs like Stephanie Moscoso.

"I put on the alarm clock this morning, it was super early, I saw the sun, I said to myself: this is the beginning of a new life!" said the 35-year-old, who hit her local gym in Paris at 8:00 am.

If all goes to plan, French authorities will drop the
