At least 50 dists now at high risk

The Covid situation is now going from bad to worse even beyond the bordering districts, raising the spectre of widespread virus transmission all

With both infections and deaths seeing a surge over the past two weeks, the number of high-risk districts rose to 50 yesterday from 36 on June 3, according to the health directorate data.

A district is considered a high-risk zone if the infection rate there is 10 percent and above.

Of the high-risk districts, the situation in those in Khulna and Rajshahi divisions is alarming in terms of deaths and cases.

Yesterday, the health directorate reported 60 deaths -- the highest since May 4 -- and 3,956 new cases -- the highest since April 22.

Alarmingly, the countrywide positivity rate jumped to 16.62 percent yesterday from 10 percent two weeks ago. The positivity rate was 14.27 percent the previous day. Amid the rise in virus transmission, the government yesterday extended

the nationwide restrictions on public and vehicular movement for a month, but allowed all government and private offices to stay open maintaining the health safety guidelines.

Experts say the government measures to tackle the Covid crisis are inadequate and a lack of coordination among its agencies could deepen

Living cost up

to blame, says consumers association report

The cost of living in Dhaka shot up by 6.8 percent in 2020 mainly because of the rising prices of daily essentials amid the pandemic, according to a report by the Consumers Association of Bangladesh.

Besides, the prices of different goods and services increased by 6.31 percent in the

capital last year, it said. CAB President Ghulam Rahman announced the findings of the report at a

virtual press conference yesterday. Last year's jump in living expenses was

the highest in three years, he said. As the cost of living increased, the income of lower- and lower-middle class

Govt moves to set up vaccine institute

In talks with South Korea, says PM

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said the government was going to sign an agreement with South Korea to set up an international standard vaccine institute in order to produce vaccines, including those against Covid-19, in the country.

"The present government has taken an initiative to set up an international standard vaccine institute aiming to produce vaccines, including those against coronavirus, in the country," she

told parliament while replying to a question from Awami League MP Ahasanul Islam Titu from Tangail-6.

The premier said "ratification, accession and approval" of the agreement by the Cabinet were under process.

Hasina said the government has taken steps to produce Covid vaccines in the country alongside collecting jabs from abroad with a view to check the spread of the virus.

She said talks at the government-to government level continued with the countries, who have developed Covid vaccines, for transfer of technology to Bangladesh to this end. The Leader of the House said the capacity of three local firms -- Incepta

Pharmaceuticals, Popular Pharmaceuticals and Healthcare Pharmaceuticals -- for production of Covid vaccines has already been assessed.

She said Globe Biotech Ltd is carrying out research on Covid vaccines. "The vaccine is now at the trial stage.

Accused Omi now a trafficking suspect

Sued under passport act after police conduct raid of recruiting agency

Tuhin Siddique Omi, an accused in an attempted rape and murder case filed by actor Pori Moni, was sued yesterday under the passport act by police who suspect he is involved human trafficking. Omi, 33, known as an influential

businessman in Dhaka's Dakshinkhan area and at different posh clubs in the capital, had tricked Pori Moni into going to the Dhaka Boat Club around midnight on June 9. There, according to the statement of the

case filed by the actor, businessman and former president of Uttara Club Limited Nasir U Mahmud physically assaulted her, and tried to rape her with the assistance o Omi and four unidentified persons.

While Nasir and Omi are currently being interrogated on remand by Detective Branch (DB) in a case filed under the narcotics control act, Savar
