Govt to take stock of them

To conduct survey to determine road capacity, find solution to traffic jam

The government is planning to find out how many vehicles operate in the capital as well as the capacity of its streets.

As part of the plan, the Accident Research Institute (ARI) of Buet and Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) will conduct a survey at different points of the city, aiming to find a solution for the perennial congestion.

The move follows a decision made by a home minister-led taskforce, formed to oversee implementation of 111 recommendations given by a high-powered committee to reduce road crashes and bring discipline on the roads.

Officials of the ARI and DMP held a meeting, and the ARI is now working on the technical and financial proposal for the survey. The proposal will be submitted in two weeks, ARI Director Prof Md Hadiuzzaman told The Daily Star on Wednesday.

Traffic congestion in Dhaka eats up 3.2 million work hours every day and the average speed of vehicles during rush hours was 7kmph, according to a 2017 World Bank report.

Experts say the situation deteriorated further in the last three years. Different government bodies, including the city corporations and police, had taken different initiatives in the past and failed to find a solution to traffic jams.

ACC for list of officials who own houses

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) asked the government to provide a list of its officials who own homes in "Begum Para" of Toronto, Canada.

"We're looking into the matter and sought a list from the government," ACC Secretary Dilwar Bakth told journalists yesterday at his office in the capital's Segunbagicha.

The ACC commissioner has already talked about the matter, he said. "Once we get [the list], we'll start working."

Yahya requests Nixon to persuade India

YAHYA'S LETTER TO NIXON Pakistan President

Pakistan President Yahya Khan, in a letter dated June 18, 1971,

drew attention of American President Richard Nixon to the "rapidly mounting threat to peace and security in the sub-continent". "In the last few days belligerent statements have

been made by the Indian prime minister and her cabinet ministers which amount to a threat of war," he added.

Yahya further said, "It makes it obvious that the speaker is determined to exploit the presence of displaced persons in India to aggravate a tense situation and justify military intervention in East Pakistan. Should Indian leaders be allowed to continue on this course, consequences would be disastrous not only for the sub-continent but for the entire region."

Yahya claimed that his government had taken adequate measures to ensure safe return of Bangladeshi refugees to their home. He further

Russia ready for further talks if US is willing

Says Putin

The Kremlin was guarded about future dialogue with Washington yesterday, a day after the first faceto-face meeting between Russian President Vladimir Putin and US counterpart Loe Riden

The two leaders met in Geneva on Wednesday to ease soaring tensions between Moscow and Washington, with relations at their lowest since the end of the Cold War.

Putin said Russia was ready to continue the talks provided Washington was also willing to do so.

"We are ready to continue this dialogue to the same extent as the American side is," Putin said in televised remarks.

Delta variant caused 50pc rise since May

Chinese expert says Covid origins probe should shift to US

The rapid spread of the Delta coronavirus variant has driven a 50 percent rise in infections in England since May, a large prevalence study led by Imperial College London found yesterday after Prime Minister Boris Johnson delayed the end of restrictions.

The government said the data supported Johnson's decision to push back the end of Covid restrictions in England to July 19, citing the threat of the Delta variant first identified in India, and the need to

vaccinate more people.

The latest round of the REACT-1 prevalence survey, conducted between May 20 and June 7, found prevalence was 0.15%, compared to 0.10% in the last set of data from late April to early May.

"Prevalence is increasing exponentially, driven by younger ages... and it appears to be doubling every 11 days. Clearly, that is bad news," Steven Riley, professor of infectious disease dynamics, Imperial College London, told reporters.

Although the PWD did not file any case against the duo, police conducted an investigation and submitted a report on Tuesday.
