## Rights custodian not doing it right

Failed to solve half the cases filed over a decade; legal constraints render it even weaker when it comes to complaints against law enforcers

The National Human Rights Commission could not resolve nearly half of the cases filed with it over the last decade.

Between 2011 and June 2021, a total of 6,736 complaints were lodged with the NHRC, the nation's rights custodian, but the average case disposal rate over the decade was 55.11 percent. This figure is based on NHRC's annual report 2020 and additional data for 2021.

In addition, a recent report by Ain o Salish Kendra (ASK) analysed the commission's decade-long activities, and found that some of the main reasons behind the NHRC's deficit are an acute lack of manpower, and the founding law itself which restricts the commission from investigating any disciplined force, include the police and Rab.

Even as just over half of the overall cases were solved each year, only a fraction of the complaints against law enforcement agencies were resolved, said the report, titled "A decade of National Human Rights Commission Bangladesh: Efficacy, Existing Challenges and Opportunities."

"According to the Annual Reports of the last five years, only one custodial death complaint has been disposed of out of 26 custodial deaths. Of the 34 custodial torture complaints, only 10 has been disposed of; and of the 43 complaints of extrajudicial killings, only seven cases were disposed of," said the report.

According to the NHRC's 2020 annual report, 22 cases against the law enforcement agencies (including custodial torture, death, enforced disappearance and extrajudicial killings) were taken up by the commission and only three were resolved.

However, it is to be noted that seven of these cases were initiated by the NHRC on

## Govt to allow antigen test in pvt hospitals

The government is going to allow private hospitals and clinics to conduct antigen-based Covid-19 rapid testing in a bid to ease and expand the testing facilities.

Antigen-based testing facilities are currently available only at government hospitals. Private hospitals and clinics also want to have the facility in the wake of the recent spike in Covid infections, health officials said.

On June 1, the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) sent a letter to the Health Services Division of the health ministry, detailing the cost and other issues regarding the rapid antigen test.

The DGHS letter said the rapid antigen testing should be introduced along with the ongoing RT-PCR testing in private hospitals during the pandemic.

"We have sent a letter to the ministry, but are yet to get any response," Farid Hossain Miah, director (hospitals and clinics) at DGHS, told The Daily Star yesterday.

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## Khulna seeing the worst of pandemic

Country logs highest deaths in 7 weeks

With the Covid situation worsening further in Khulna division, the health directorate yesterday reported 82 deaths from the virus all over the country -- the highest in the past seven weeks.

Against this backdrop, the Epidemiology and Public Health Committee of the DGHS has again recommended that the government strictly enforce the health safety measures.

"We reiterated our previous recommendations -- strict enforcement of the health safety guidelines and increasing Covid tests in all areas where virus transmission is higher," Dr Abu Jamil Faisal, member of the committee, told the daily Star yesterday.

At a meeting on Saturday night, the committee discussed the Covid situation and status of implementation of its recommendations.

Of the 82 deaths yesterday, 32 were reported in Khulna division, according to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).

The Covid situation in the coastal division, however, is worse than what the DGHS data suggests, as the number of patients exceeded the capacity of at least three hospitals, including Khulna Medical College Hospital (KMCH).

The health services at the KMCH were in disarray as the rush of patients at the hospital from nearby districts rose significantly, reports our Khulna correspondent.

Many patients from Satkhira are coming to the hospital while the number of patients from Bagerhat, Jashore and other districts is also rising.

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## Pfizer shots in 3 centres in Dhaka from today

The government is going to vaccinate people with Pfizer Covid-19 vaccine in Dhaka's three vaccination centres from today.

The vaccine jabs will be administered at Sheikh Russel Gastro Liver Institute and Hospital, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University and Kurmitola General Hospital, said Dr Md Shamsul Haque, line director at the Directorate General of Health Services.

A total of 120 people will be given vaccine shots today at each centre, he said.

They will be observed for 10 days and if there is no adverse effect, then the vaccine jabs will be administered at the mass

## Another refugee influx on horizon?

With a civil war brewing in Myanmar, Bangladesh has much to worry about, as the face-off between the junta and the National Unity Government and its allies could result in a refugee influx once again, according to security and international relations analysts.

Cases of human trafficking through the sea may also increase, they added.

The insurgents in the frontier regions may attempt to take shelter within Bangladesh territory if Myanmar slips into a full-blown conflict. Rohingya repatriation, as well as the regional connectivity, may be at stake, they said.

The crisis began following the February 1 military coup that overthrew the elected MPs of the National League for Democracy (NLD). Leaders, including Aung San Suu Kyi, were arrested. Crackdowns on the demonstrators left more than 850 dead so far.

In mid-April, the elected NLD MPs, representatives from different ethnic

minority groups, including Karen, Kachin, Mon, Karenni, Chin, Kayan, and independent MPs, formed the National Unity Government (NUG) with Win Myint as the president and Aung San Suu Kyi as the State Counsellor.

The shadow government is seeking international recognition and bringing together pro-democratic forces, including numerous ethnic rebel groups, to reverse the military takeover.

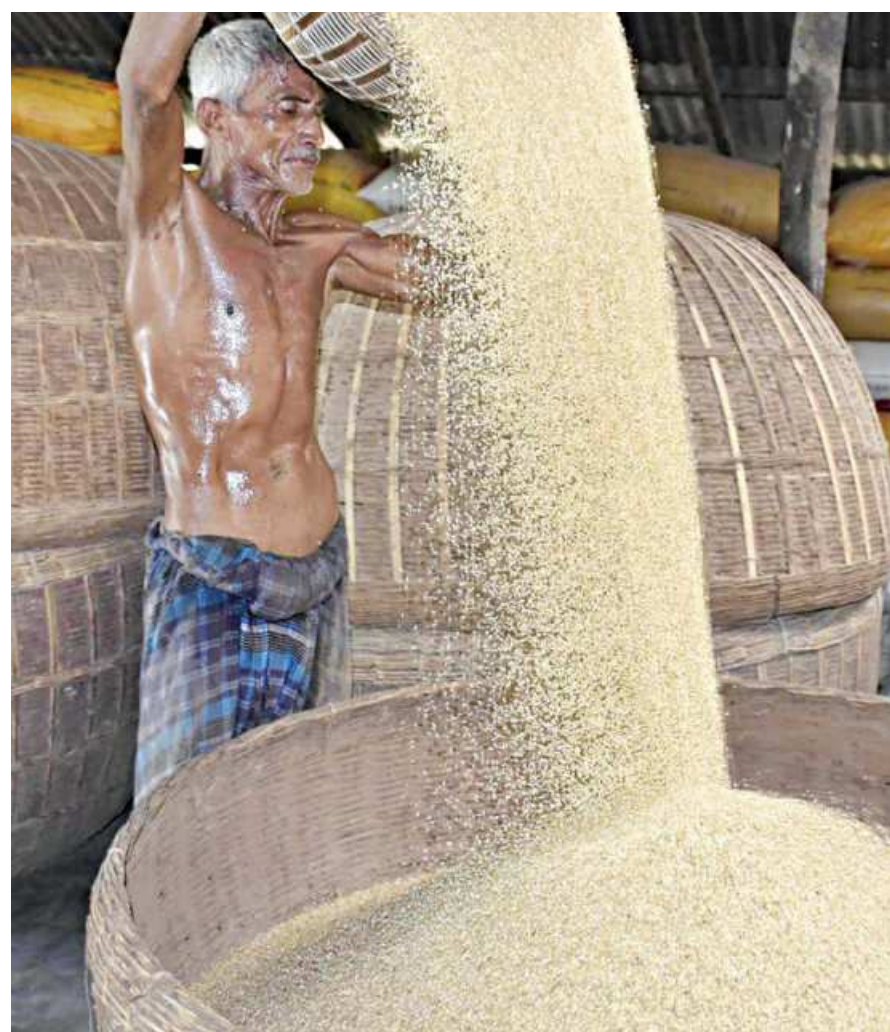
It also formed an armed wing named "People's Defense Force" (PDF) to launch a revolution against the military junta and signed an agreement with the rebel Chin National Front in this regard.

The junta, however, termed the PDF a terrorist organisation on May 8, raising the possibilities of further confrontations, said analysts.

Local media reported that there have been sporadic attacks in various parts of Myanmar.

The latest attack was on June 5, in which at least 20 people were killed by Myanmar's

## Teesta likely to swell later this month

Southeastern region braces for flashflood

The Bangladesh Water Development Board yesterday forecast a possible flood due to the swelling of the Teesta caused by heavy rainfall in upstream India.

Meanwhile, flash floods in Cox's Bazar and the Bandarban have also been forecast, as monsoon has begun full-fledged across the country.

Teknaf, Ukhiya, Ramu, Maheshkhali, Kutubdia and some places in Bandarban could be affected due to this flash flood, warns the Flood Forecasting and Warning Centre (FFWC) in a bulletin published on its official website.

"There is no chance of heavy flood this month. But in the first week of July, there will be a flood in the Brahmaputra basin," Arifuzzaman Bhuiyan, executive engineer of the FFWC, told The Daily Star. The bulletin issued
