LOCKDOWN

Govt announces nationwide strict shutdown from Monday for a week

The country will be put under a complete lockdown for seven days from Monday to stem the surge in Covid-19 cases.

This time, nobody will be allowed to step out of home except for emergencies, said a statement from the Press Information Department (PID) yesterday evening.

Later, Farhad Hossain, state minister for public administration, told The Daily Star that members of the army and the Border Guard Bangladesh (BGB) along with the police would be deployed to ensure proper enforcement of the lockdown.

This is the first time the government has used the word "lockdown" while announcing countrywide Covid-19 curbs, indicating the strict nature of the restrictions about to be put in place.

days in the face of a deepening health crisis.

Asked what they meant by a complete shutdown, Prof Mohammad Sahidullah, chief of the NTAC, said, "It means all should stay home. Everything will be closed except for emergency services."

The PID statement said all government and private offices, except for those providing emergency services, would remain closed during the seven-day lockdown.

"All vehicles, excluding those carrying essential goods, will be kept off the roads. Only ambulances and vehicles used for providing health services will be allowed to run," said the statement.

The press will also be out of the lockdown's purview, it said.

The details on how the lockdown will be enforced will be announced by

The lockdown was announced hours after the health directorate reported 108 deaths from Covid-19, the second highest daily deaths in the country since the first coronavirus case was confirmed in March last year.

The power and energy ministry proposed scrapping the projects as the construction work made no progress in years, State Minister Nasrul Hamid told The Daily Star.

With vesterday's figure, the death toll now stands at 13,976.

On the other hand, 5,869 new cases were found in the 24 hours, taking the total number of infected people to 878,804, says a press release of the Directorate General of Health Services.

The positivity rate also jumped to 21.22 percent yesterday, which is the highest in the last 69 days. On April 17, the infection rate was 21.46 percent, according to the Directorate General of Health Services.

Some 27,653 samples were tested across the country in 24 hours.

Among the 108 deceased, 75 were men and 33 women. Of them, one was aged SEE PAGE 2 COL 3

The coal-fired power plant in Payra is generating electricity while construction work in Rampal and Matarbari are making progress, the state minister said.

"Our current plan is to generate between 10,000MW and 12,000MW of electricity from coal by 2030," the state minister said.

The 10 discarded projects are among the 18 planned coal-fired plants that were approved after 2008.

"Now we are planning to use liquefied natural gas [LNG] and petroleum to generate power. But the government has yet to make a plan on how an LNG-fired power plant can be set up," he said.

The scrapped projects are: a 522MW plant in Munshiganj, a 282MW plant in Dhaka, 282MW in Chattogram, 1,320MW in Moheskhali, 1,320MW in Ashuganj, 1,200MW in Gaibandha, 1,200MW in

Matarbari phase-2, a 700MW Singapore-Bangladesh joint-venture, a 1,200MW CPGCL- Sumitomo Corporation jointventure, and a 1,320MW Bangladesh-

Malaysia joint-venture. The government may scrap one or two other power plant projects if the construction does not make desired progress, said an official of the ministry.

One unit of the 1,320MW power plant in Payra is generating electricity. It is a Bangladesh-China joint venture. Physical work is making progress for the 1,320MW plant in Rampal, 1,224MW in Chattogram, 307MW in Barguna, and 1,200MW in Matarbari and 1,200MW in Cox's Bazar.

Ad Shamim, 21, of the upazila's Baobari village, said Iftekhaer Alam, additional superintendent of police in the district.

about the Moderna vaccine shots. We will receive those in seven to 10 days," Health Minister Zahid Maleque told The Daily Star yesterday.

The doses will help intensify the ongoing vaccination campaign, he said.

The minister also mentioned that the first shipment of the Sinopharm vaccine shots that Bangladesh purchased from China will arrive in the first week of the next month.

Bangladesh is yet to approve Moderna Covid vaccine for emergency use, but health officials yesterday said it would get authorisation soon.

The Covax facility is a global initiative coordinated by the World Health Organization, the Vaccine Alliance Gavi, and the Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations.

It is working to ensure that low- and middle-income countries have equitable access to Covid vaccines.

Under the facility, Bangladesh was supposed to get this year 6.8 crore vaccine doses, which would cover around 20 percent of its population. But it has so far received only one consignment of 1.06 lakh doses of the Pfizer vaccine.

'EXTORTION MONEY' Food official assaulted by 'MP's men for refusal to pay' Two arrested

A government official of the food department was assaulted in Shaynalpara area in Natore's Bagatipara upazila allegedly by the men of the local ruling party lawmaker on Thursday night.

Sirajul Islam, officer-incharge of Bagatipara Police Station, said the victim -- Rafiqul Islam, OC LSD of Lalpur upazila -- filed a case in this regard yesterday morning.

Meanwhile, police arrested two accused --Mohammad Rasel, 35, and Mohammad Kalam, 34, in this connection.

The victim said he went to meet Natore-1 MP Shahidul Islam Bakul at his residence on Thursday as he was summoned over the phone.

"I discussed some official matters with the lawmaker and then he left the place," the victim said. After the MP, the victim also tried to leave the SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

PERILOUS JOURNEY TO EUROPE 264 Bangladeshis rescued in Med

They were adrift at sea after their boat broke down off Tunisian coast

At least 264 Bangladeshis were rescued in the Mediterranean off the Tunisian coast on Thursday when they were trying to sail across the sea to Europe, according to the Bangladesh embassy in Libya.

They were among 267 people found adrift in the sea which is widely used by traffickers as a route for illegal migration from North African countries to rich European countries, including Italy, Greece and Spain.

It was unclear which European country the migrants had intended to enter.

Tunisia's coastguard said the migrants, including three Egyptians, had been stranded at sea after their boat broke down, reports AFP.

Asaduzzaman Kabir, labour welfare counsellor at the Bangladesh embassy in Tripoli, yesterday said they were in constant contact with International Organisation for Migration (IOM), International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), and other local authorities in Tunisia regarding the wellbeing of the Bangladeshis.

Azzouz Samri, IOM's chief of mission in Tunisia, said: "We received a call from the authorities to assist a group of 267 people rescued at sea ... They were rescued and brought by the Tunisian national coast guard to the port of ELØ Ketef at Ben Guerdane locality. The IOM team in Tunisia provided food and medical assistance at the port, provided transport to a centre identified by the authorities for the confinement period of five days. The IOM Tunisia is also doing the Covid-19 RT-PCR test for the rescued."
